Please limit your response to 3000 characters The Project launched its inaugural steering committee with the H.E. Executive Governor of Borno State – (Co-Chair) and Mr. Matthias Schmale, UN Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator i.e. – (Co-Chair) in October 2023. Other members include the Attorney General of the Federation and Minister of Justice, Minister of Budget and Economic Planning, Chief of Defense Staff, Inspector General of Police, Donor Representatives from FCDO, Switzerland and Germany with the EU as an observer, and UN Agencies.
In August and November 2024, the Peacebuilding Fund (PBF) held its 2nd and 3rd Steering Committee met marking a pivotal step in strengthening partnerships and advancing regional stabilization in Northeast Nigeria. Hosted by UNDP Resident Representative Ms. Elsie G Attafuah, chaired by UN Resident Coordinator Mohammed Malick Fall and Co-Chaired by Borno State Governor Prof Babagana Umara Zulum. The meeting brought together donor representatives, senior government officials from Borno State, and leaders from UN agencies. The meeting set a collaborative foundation to align international support with local priorities, ensuring every dollar contributes to meaningful change. A progress update on PBF expenditures and revised workplans were presented and endorsed by the Board. Endorsed workplans incorporated State priorities and enhanced measures for streamlined coordination. Ms. Elsie G. Attafuah, reaffirmed UNDP Nigeria's commitment to coordinating impactful programming, emphasizing strong partnerships to deliver sustainable results.
In addition to the Political-level Steering Committees held to date, the consortium has also held several project steering meetings at the technical level. The Technical Committee comprises of the Borno State Deputy Governor, the Borno State Commissioner for Women Affairs, the Commissioner of Local Government and Emirate Affairs, the BSMWASD Commissioner, National Commission for Refugees, Migrants and IDPs, the Peace and Development Advisor of the RC Office, Programme leads from the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) and the International Organization for Migration (IOM).

The project has engaged with Government on both State, Federal and Local Government levels by closely coordinating with the National Counter Terrorism Centre (NCTC) within the Office of the National Security Advisor (ONSA). Regular meetings were held to brief the NCTC Coordinator on the progress of various Disarmament, Demobilization, Rehabilitation, and Reintegration (DDRR) projects, including the Peacebuilding Fund (PBF) initiatives. A notable meeting occurred on October 14, 2024, where the consortium met with the NCTC Coordinator to discuss the latest developments and the upcoming Steering Committee for the PBF and UN Offer projects. This engagement underscores the project's commitment to aligning federal efforts with DDRR goals.

Later in October, after three meetings between the Borno State Government and UNDP to clarify the scope of the UN Offer and the PBF projects, the Governor provided endorsement for their implementation. Key issues like workplan revisions and the repurposing of funds were discussed, provide a foundation for technical reforms that align with the region's stabilization and development goals. Additionally, the evolving needs of local communities, reflected in the project's challenges, underscore the importance of creating a flexible plan that adapts to the shifting dynamics of stabilization efforts. These collaborative efforts and continuous engagement with state authorities are crucial steps. Additionally, the project team continues to work closely with the Hon. Zuwaira Gambo, Borno State Commissioner for Women Affairs to address technical issues critical to the project's success.

At the local level, the project team continuously engaged with the Executive Chairman of Bama Local Government Area (LGA), His Royal Highness the Shehu of Bama, and other local officials to advance reintegration activities. These efforts focus on providing inclusive socioeconomic and livelihood opportunities for beneficiaries, fostering resilience and stability in the community, and ensuring all stakeholders are well-coordinated and involved in the process.

The project has made considerable progress in reintegration services for beneficiaries in transit camps and preparing host communities for reintegration, laying a strong foundation for reconciliation. Beneficiaries received briefings to understand available services, roles, and the reintegration process. Health assessments and counselling were conducted to address immediate physical and mental health needs, alongside civic education, life skills, and psychosocial support, which fostered active community engagement. Participants also reconnected with families through family tracing, an essential step in the reintegration process. They received training in livelihood and income-generating skills, tailored to local needs, supporting their economic independence, and contributing positively to the host communities. These efforts have strengthened participants' resilience and self-sufficiency, ensuring more stable transitions back to community life.

The socio-economic reintegration program has supported 1000 women, including 400 from transit camps and 600 from communities, engaging with LGA chairpersons and traditional leaders to establish selection criteria, ensuring support for the most vulnerable. Women benefited from counselling, life skills, vocational training, and apprenticeships aligned with their interests. Practical training covered various livelihood skills, including food vending, goat rearing, poultry farming, and micro-gardening, which were locally relevant and ensured sustainable income generation. Gender-sensitive approaches in training fostered cohesion between women from transit and host communities, creating an environment of shared goals and mutual support that strengthened social ties. Local NGOs and CSOs have been actively engaged to build capacities for socio-economic reintegration, reconciliation, and MHPSS. Targeted training workshops addressed networking, advocacy, and integrated planning. Training of Trainers (TOT) workshops supported skill transfer, strengthening local reintegration capabilities and promoting long-term sustainability. The capacity-building initiatives have equipped local organizations to implement and advocate for inclusive policies effectively, advancing the project's impact on socio-economic resilience.

Government staff across six ministries received training on information, financial, and administrative management, M&E, gender inclusion, conflict resolution, and psychosocial support. This enhanced capacity has strengthened staff knowledge and provided technical skills needed to operationalize the CBRR policy. Partnering with international organizations and civil society groups ensures these efforts align with best practices. The Ministry of Women Affairs and Social Development was further supported by sensitizing the Commissioner to international standards in screening processes, securing the ministry's endorsement, and appointing a coordination focal point to oversee data collection in Bama.

Partnerships with local civil society and women-led organizations have been reinforced, enhancing their advocacy and technical skills in peacebuilding and reintegration efforts. The project has made progress in advocating for the endorsement and implementation of policies, such as the CBRR, crucial to establishing a comprehensive framework for reintegration at the local level.

Promoting gender equality and women's empowerment was central, with specific vocational training provided to women in non-traditional trades, including metalwork, welding, and carpentry. This training challenged traditional gender norms and enhanced employability. GBV-safe spaces offered crucial support to adolescent girls and women, providing individual and group activities alongside specialized services. Reintegration support for women included skills training in line with their preferences, which improved their self-esteem, livelihood potential, and financial stability. Women's empowerment was also supported through leadership and entrepreneurship programs, enhancing their role in decision-making within the community. Weekly community sessions addressed gender-based issues, promoting behavioral change and fostering inclusivity. These efforts contributed to a secure environment where women could thrive, supported by five newly established livelihood cooperatives, providing economic benefits and encouraging women's active economic engagement.

The youth-focused elements include sports-based peacebuilding activities which fostered unity among IDPs, host communities, and former associates, reinforcing peaceful coexistence. Civic education empowered youth as active citizens and encouraged community participation, building social responsibility and resilience. Vocational training and apprenticeships addressed youth unemployment by equipping them with sustainable livelihood skills. A two-day knowledge-sharing workshop in Abuja convened 35 participants from UN agencies, government, civil society, and traditional leaders from conflict-affected regions. Participants exchanged insights on the Borno Model, a framework linking local reintegration efforts with counter-terrorism strategies. This workshop strengthened cross-regional collaboration, aligning policy responses with practical needs and enhancing reintegration outreach across affected states.

A key meeting of the Technical Committee on the Review of Existing Legal Frameworks for DDR/PCVE reviewed the "DDR Bill, 2023" and draft "DDR/PCVE Policy, 2023," with 18 officials from the Ministry of Justice, OSPRE, and ONSA, was held. Establishing a national DDR law and policy aims to strengthen legal frameworks that address victim needs, fulfill international obligations, build community trust, and support sustainable peace.

The project has made significant strides in promoting gender equality, women's empowerment, and youth inclusion. In the return communities, sensitization workshops raised awareness about the PBF approach and the Borno model. Weekly sessions focused on gender-based issues, challenging harmful practices like discrimination against persons with disabilities and promoting behavioral change. Women were empowered through leadership training and decision-making roles, enhancing their self-esteem, social status, and contributing to gender equality. Counselling services supported female beneficiaries in mental health recovery, equipping them with improved coping mechanisms for reintegration.

Female ex-associates were trained in non-traditional trades, including metalwork, welding, carpentry, agriculture, and literacy, expanding their employability and challenging gender norms. They also learned sanitary pad production, improving hygiene and creating a sustainable income-generating activity. Protection against gender-based violence and the establishment of livelihood cooperatives ensured women's safety, supporting their active participation in economic activities and promoting financial independence.

Youth inclusion was prioritized through life skills training in areas such as financial literacy, communication, and problem-solving, empowering youth to navigate daily challenges. Youth leaders were included in decision-making, ensuring their needs and perspectives were considered. Vocational training and apprenticeship opportunities supported youth in building sustainable livelihoods and reducing unemployment. Psychosocial support helped young people cope with past trauma while building resilience for future challenges.

Civic education and life skills training empowered youth to engage as active and informed citizens, fostering responsibility in democratic processes and community development. These initiatives ensured the project was responsive to youth needs, promoting their active participation.

The project emphasized gender inclusion in peacebuilding efforts, especially through its activities surrounding the International Day of Peace, which involved stakeholders, including government, civil society, and international partners. Women were actively engaged in peacebuilding and reconciliation discussions, ensuring their perspectives shaped the Borno Model. Gender-sensitive approaches to reintegration were promoted, ensuring equal opportunities for both men and women to participate in and benefit from peacebuilding initiatives.

The project will also support the 16 Days of Activism campaign, aiming to raise awareness of gender-based violence, promote the empowerment of women and girls, and advocate for stronger legal frameworks and policies. Activities will amplify women's voices in peacebuilding, highlight their roles as agents of change, and advocate for gender-sensitive measures in recovery and reintegration. The campaign will mobilize communities to challenge harmful gender norms and promote equality and justice.

The project has made significant strides in community-based reconciliation and reintegration successfully facilitating the reintegration of former associates into their communities, advancing reconciliation and reducing the stigma linked to their past affiliations. By offering comprehensive support services including gender-based violence protection and economic empowerment, relapse into armed groups is minimized, fostering peacebuilding. Participants are connected to sustainable livelihood opportunities, enhancing their economic independence and supporting long-term development goals. This not only benefits individuals but also strengthens the social and economic resilience of the wider community.

Perception surveys conducted indicated a positive shift in community attitudes toward peacebuilding and reconciliation, with an increased sense of cohesion and trust. This shift is largely attributed to the inclusive nature of activities and events that promote social interaction and collaboration.

Data from perception surveys further show notable progress in the rehabilitation and reintegration of former NSAG associates in Borno, a large percentage of men and women in host communities agree that legal procedures have delivered justice for crimes committed by former NSAG members.

In Monguno town, a 22-year-old woman with a mobility impairment relied on begging for survival and faced social isolation

and depression due to her condition. With support from the IOM DDRR program, she received mobility aids but continued

begging until she was selected for an IOM project funded by the Peace Building Fund. Given business startup kits, she opened

a provision shop, ending her dependency on begging. Her newfound independence restored her dignity, transformed community perceptions, and empowered her to support her family. This success story illustrates how empowerment initiatives can profoundly change lives, offering economic independence, renewed dignity, and community acceptance.

A teen mother/ former associate:

Nineteen-year-old Falmata, who had lived in captivity alongside her parents before her rescue, faced a difficult situation

resulting from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) while in the camp. The long-term effects of PTSD, stemming from physical

abuse, psychological torture, forced labor, harassment, and sexual assault she endured, took a toll on her mental health at the

Hajj transit center. Falmata began experiencing flashbacks, difficulty sleeping, anxiety, angry outbursts, and difficulty

concentrating, among other symptoms, while living among her peers in the Hajj Transit center. "After receiving livelihood and

civic education training," she said, "I'm grateful for the support because I've learned how to make things like necklaces,

earrings, hand bands, and many other items with beads. I'm even trying to convince my husband to allow me to continue with

my education when we exit the camp so that I can become something worthy in the future."

1. An assessment was implemented during June 2024 with a sample of 345 women targeted by the Community based rehabilitation pilot for women. These individuals were located in Bama, Jere, Maiduguri and Monguno.
2. Joint monitoring visit by all IPs in Bama: The mission focused on updating key stakeholders and monitoring project activities to strengthen communication and ensure effective oversight. The team engaged with local leaders, including HRH the Shehu of Bama, the LGA Chairman, and the Brigade Commander of 21SAB Bama, providing them with project updates. The monitoring team visited implementing agencies, interacted directly with beneficiaries, and assessed activities related to mental health and psychosocial support, reintegration, and livelihoods. Additionally, the team engaged with beneficiaries who received livelihood kits in March 2024, gathering feedback and success stories. This mission improved communication and reporting with local authorities, enhanced project oversight, and confirmed alignment of activities with broader objectives. Stakeholders suggested that future visits should continue regularly and recommended revisiting the PBF strategy to increase the support ratio to at least 1:5 due to the population size in impacted areas. They also proposed that PBF projects establish a cap-making center in Bama for training and trade, leveraging the community's expertise in cap production. Additionally, there is a need to provide clothing items for children emerging from the bush to Bama.

Community-Led Peace Committees and Networks: Community-led committees and networks have been established to empower residents in conflict mediation and peace promotion. These committees are trained to manage emerging conflicts, address root causes, and sustain peace independently, ensuring community ownership and continuity in peacebuilding efforts.

Socio-Economic Initiatives to Support for Livelihood and Economic Revitalization: By supporting livelihood programs and entrepreneurship training, the project provides alternative income sources for beneficiaries, reducing resource-based conflicts, poverty, and unemployment. This strategy helps communities maintain economic stability, which is essential for long-term peace. The project has revitalized local economies in conflict-affected and reintegration communities through cash grants, agricultural inputs, vocational training, and start-up kits. This economic support has empowered over 1,000 conflict-affected women and reintegrated individuals, reducing dependency on humanitarian aid and fostering economic self-sufficiency.

Strengthening Local Institutions: Local government institutions have received capacity-building support, enabling them to effectively manage the reintegration process and sustain peace initiatives independently. This builds a stronger governance framework that can continue to support peacebuilding beyond the project's lifespan. Collaboration with Borno State Government on the Borno Model: The project aligns with the Borno Model, an established state policy focused on Disarmament, Reintegration, and Reconciliation (DDR). This partnership creates a sustainable framework for reintegration that is supported and managed by state policies, ensuring that peacebuilding efforts continue after project completion.

Event 1	Joint Monitoring Mission in Bama	This mission aimed to update key stakeholders on ongoing project activities, strengthen communication, and ensure effective oversight. The team engaged with prominent local leaders, including HRH the Shehu of Bama, the LGA Chairman, and the Brigade Commander of 21SAB Bama, providing updates and gathering feedback. Monitoring activities included site visits to implementing agencies and interactions with beneficiaries to assess progress in mental health and psychosocial support, reintegration, and livelihood initiatives. The team also gathered insights from beneficiaries who received livelihood kits in March 2024. Overall, the mission improved communication with local authorities, reinforced project oversight, and validated that project activities align with community objectives	- Enhanced Communication: The mission improved communication and reporting with local authorities, promoting better stakeholder alignment and transparency Strengthened Oversight: Direct visits to project sites and beneficiary interactions enabled more effective oversight and allowed for a firsthand assessment of impact Stakeholder Feedback: Local leaders recommended regular continuation of such visits. They suggested adjusting the Peacebuilding Fund (PBF) support ratio to at least 1:5 due to the large population in impacted areas Community Support Needs: Stakeholders proposed establishing a cap-making center in Bama to support community training and trade, capitalizing on local expertise. They also highlighted the need for clothing items for children transitioning from remote areas.
