Their purpose has been to ensure that the project progresses toward its objectives, offering feedback, guidance on community-related matters, addressing implementation challenges such as traffic permits, gathering permits, reviewing project activities, and contributing to future project plans.

Over the last six months the project engaged with the Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) at the state level and the General Directors of the target localities conducted trainings that targeted community leaders, sheikhs, sultans and key staff of local government authorities on gender equality, gender discriminatory norms, GBV in order to raise their awareness to become proactive duty-bearers. In this regard the project team has facilitated five workshops which discussed the above-mentioned topics at the target localities levels, namely: Suakin, Toker, Port Sudan, Sinkat and Haya. The state Commissioner and the Minister of Social Affairs attended the final day of trainings and reaffirmed their support to the project and appreciated the significant role played by UNPBF and SOS Sahel Sudan organization to restore peace in Sudan. Also, both the social development minister (who chaired the meetings) and Humanitarian Aid Commissioner have participated actively in the project steering committee meetings. The project team held several meetings with a representative of the Youth Department and Head of cultural associations and sport clubs. The meeting agenda discussed the ways of collaboration between the project and the department of youth and concluded by agreeing to jointly conduct youth activities. The project collaborated with Red Sea University where consultants from the university facilitated the gender workshops. Also, the project coordinated with Quran University to provide training venues and services. The Governor of Red Sea participated in opening the Youth Sports Demonstration for Peace and Social Cohesion, which was conducted and organized by Organization for Peace, Development and Reconstruction. The event was witnessed by other government departments and local authority representatives, including the Director of Youth and Sports, Deputy Director of Social Development, Executive Director of Southern Administration Unit - Port Sudan locality and the director of Alshahanat Administration unit - Port Sudan locality. The event was held at Kalanayeb village. Also, the community leaders from Kalanayeeb and Habeela participated in the event, in addition to two soccer and cultural groups. The project rehabilitated Habeela Cultural Centre through collaboration with the department of Social Development, which established the centre and provided immediate approval for its rehabilitation.

Following the approval of the ToRs, the Project Management team selected a consultant who started collecting the baseline data on the 4th of June, after which he submitted the baseline report. The baseline survey was carried out to measure the status of all indicators in the results framework and to understand the starting point of key elements of the work against which later progress will be measured. This will enable project indicators at output and goal/outcome level to be measured and tracked. Among other key findings, the baseline survey provided comprehensive data on the participating youth organisations, which allows the project to select additional appropriate proxy indicators. The survey also updated the project logical framework, focussing on the outcome indicators that lacked baseline values. The beneficiaries' identification process has now finished, from which 25 CSOs have been selected for Training of Trainers: ten young women-led CSOs trained on Gender-Based Violence (GBV), women rights and the UN Security Council Resolution 1325 on women and peace and security while other fifteen youth - led CSOs (five CSOs out of them are young women led) were trained on Social Exclusion Analysis. The total participants trained were 60 participants including 45 females. Also, the key localities staff, community leaders, and native administration have been identified as project beneficiaries and accordingly they were trained in different topics such as accountability civic rights, young men and women rights. During this reporting period the Gender officer has dismissed from her position due to frequent absence from duties without prior notification therefore a new Gender officer has been recruited instead. Also, the capacity building officer resigned, so the project recruited a new capacity-building officer. Despite numerous challenges that the project implementation process faced, such as activity permits and restrictions on project team movement, the project has made significant progress in spreading peace and social cohesion messages among the communities of Red Sea State. This has been achieved through sponsoring various youth initiatives with different approaches and methods such as orientation workshops, drama plays sports tournaments, and cultural events as well as religious messages and radio programs. All these activities have been shared on social platforms, mostly Facebook and WhatsApp in addition to Sudan TV and Red Sea Radio. This raised awareness of the project among many CSOs - who are among the target beneficiaries of the project - and many tried to get access to the project support. Some people from outside the project have requested to expand the activities of the project to their areas and others requested support beyond the project scope such as livelihood and WASH interventions. As result of these activities, the project has made a significant breakthrough, for first time since last ethnic conflict between Bani Aamer and Beja some people from the Beni Aamer ethnic group participated in an event of peaceful coexistence in Deim Arab neighbourhood, which is the home of the Beja tribe. Also, the project funded a sport tournament initiative at Dar Alneim neighbourhood inhabited by Beni Aamer where young multiethnic teams participated. Along with heads of different government departments, the Governor of Red Sea participated in the opening event of Youth Sports Demonstration for Peace and Social Cohesion in October 2024. The event was held at Kalanayeb village in Port Sudan locality. The project has supported ten CSOs institutionally, including through the provision of office equipment such as desks, cabinets, chairs, printers, and photocopiers. The project also has rehabilitated one social and cultural centre at Habeela neighbourhood and did cost estimate for the rehabilitation of two more social centres. This support is providing women and youth with the foundation to implement peace initiatives and the space to engage with grassroot communities, contributing to their role as leaders in Red Sea State. The project has offered space for women to speak their minds at training venues and consultation meetings at the field level. For all activities that the project has so far implemented, particularly the capacity-building trainings, the project team made sure that the women were equally as represented as the men. 19 out of 30 participants were female in all TOT trainings. Ten women-led CSOs exclusively were trained in genderbased violence and social exclusion. Duty-bearers at this state and locality level have received training workshops on accountability, civic rights, political participation and the rights of young men and women. Moreover, community leaders, sheikhs, sultans and key staff of local government authorities have received training on issues such as gender equality, gender discriminatory norms, and GBV to raise their awareness to become proactive duty-bearers. The project through training sessions has created a space of dialogue and conversation among groups of young men and women to discuss their issues openly and freely. The project has brought together under one roof members of ethnic groups and native administration members who used to conflict and let them jointly discuss youth related agenda and as well discussing ways to avoid future conflict and peaceful co-existence as well as reform of social fabrics. The project conducted a variety of tailored training workshops which had a significant impact in strengthening the capacities of a diverse group of youth in various civic education matters, peace building, political participation, leadership and democratization. Joint sport tournaments were organized by two CSOs where youth sports team of different cultural and ethnic backgrounds participated. The two teams of Civic Education and Social Peace which were formed by the project have conducted 14 outreach training workshops. The project has sponsored a program of social media platform called Elbejawi Intentional channel, which was established by a young digital creator called Adam who leads a team of young activists. The channel programs are posted on different social media platforms such as Facebook, YouTube and Tiktok. The platform broadcasts different topics in social, culture, sports and politics. The platform has a program that reflects social issues and suggests solutions through carefully selected guests who can contribute to reforming social fabrics that have been affected by the last ethnic conflict. The project has contracted the Elbejawi platform to execute six episodes through interviewing influential people from the ethnic groups with experiences of conflict. During the broadcasting the channel interviewed more than twelve persons representing different ethnic groups, mainly Beja, Nuba and Beni Aamer. The episodes focused on the root causes of tribal conflict and ways and plans to avoid that in future. The guests are community activists, tribal leaders, and native administration leaders. The channel reached more 200,000 viewers.

For all activities that the project has so far implemented, particularly the capacity-building trainings, the project team made sure that the women were equally as represented as the men. 19 out of 30 participants were female in all TOT trainings. Ten women led CSOs exclusively were trained in gender-based violence and social exclusion. Duty-bearers at this state and locality level have received training workshops on accountability, civic rights, political participation and young men and women rights. Community leaders, skeikhs, sultans and key staff of local government authorities have received training on issues such as gender equality, gender discriminatory norms, and GBV to raise their awareness to become proactive duty-bearers. The project through training sessions has created a space of dialogue and conversation among groups of young men and women to discuss their issues openly and freely. The project has brought together under one roof members of ethnic groups with experiences of conflict who are now jointly are discussing the youth related agenda and as well discussing ways to avoid future conflict. The project activities linked the youth to local authorities where coordination has now started between the youth and the local authorities. For this phase it is informal coordination, but it is planned to form a coordination committee at the locality level next January if the local authorities agree.

This reporting period the project has made significant progress in spreading peace and social cohesion messages among the communities of Red Sea, through sponsoring various youth initiatives with different approaches and methods such as orientation workshops, drama plays sports tournaments, and cultural events as well as religious messages and radio programs. 31 initiatives were funded in total. The initiatives covered topics in peace such as peaceful co-existence, social cohesion, sport and culture, combating drugs, and vocational training such household electricity. Also, some initiatives targeted intermediate and secondary schools - both girls and boys. The project has allocated budget to fund initiatives proposed by the target CSOs therefore the project started to support some CSOs in different peace issues and youth and women empowerment activities. All these activities have been shared on social platforms, mostly Facebook and WhatsApp. This has raised the awareness of many youth CSOs about the project, many of whom tried to win funding opportunities offered by the project. Some CSOs which are from out the target area of the project requested support and extension of the project to their area. Other have requested support beyond the project intervention such as livelihood and WASH. For the first time, ethnic groups with experiences of conflict participated together in events organized by the project. For example, a group of Beni Aamer participated at Deim Arab, a neighbourhood inhabited by Beja People, and the following days the Nazir of Beni Aamer visited the nazir of Amaar Ar at same area. The Governor of Red Sea participated in opening youth initiative event of Youth Sports Demonstration for Peace and Social Cohesion was conducted and organized by Organization for Peace, Development and Reconstruction the event was witnessed by other government departments and local authorities' representation, including Director of Youth and Sports, Deputy Director of Social Development, Executive Director of Southern Administration Unit - Port Sudan locality and the director of Alshahanat Administration unit - Port Sudan locality. The event was held at Kalanayeb village. Also, the community leaders from Kalanayeeb and Habeela have participated in the event besides two soccer and cultural groups.

The project has sponsored a program of social media platform is called Elbejawi Intentional channel, which was established by a young digital creator is called Adam who leads a team of young activists. The channel programs are posted on different social media platforms such as Facebook, YouTube and Tiktok. The platform is broadcasting different topics in social, culture, sports and politics as well. The platform has a program that reflects social issues and suggesting solutions through carefully selected guests who can contribute to reforming social fabrics that have been affected by the last ethnic conflict. The project has contracted the Elbejawi platform to execute six episodes through interviewing influential persons from the ethnic groups with experiences of conflict. During the broadcasting the channel interviewed more than twelve persons representing different ethnic groups mainly Beja, Nuba and Beni Aamer. The episodes focused on the root causes of tribal conflict and ways and plans to avoid that in future. The guests are community activists, tribal leaders, and native administration leaders. During this reporting period the project has made significant progress in spreading peace and social cohesion messages among the communities of Red Sea. Through sponsoring various youth initiatives with different approaches and methods such as orientation workshops, drama plays sports tournaments, and cultural events as well as religion preaches and radio programs. The project so far funded 31 initiatives which reached 12851 participants in total.
