SORD organized two training workshops on Gender Based Violence prevention and protection in Deim Saad and Yara of Geissan locality, the workshops were attended by 23 male and 23 female community leaders. Revived two women's protection networks in Kurmuk and Baw to facilitate transfer of survivors to receive health, psychological, and legal services. Provided GBV prevention, protection of survivors, and the GBV referral system, services, and pathways.

SORD convened four training courses in Geissan (Yara and Deim Saad) and in Baw localities (Samsur and Derang) on leadership, negotiation skills, advocacy, and accountability. 68 women from the four communities attended the trainings. SORD convened one dialog forum between the community and women organizations in Geissan Locality, in which women Agenda in Natural Resource Management (NRM) and Women's Rights and negotiation skills were deeply discussed, in addition, it conducted two advocacy campaigns at State level through community radio using local language. One participant in each PBF project target communities was selected. Topics discussed in the episodes included women rights and NRM, protection and effective participation. SORD also conducted one training workshop at State level targeted 30 participants from service providers (health Cader and psychologist to assure that they get acquainted with all procedures of referral pathway to survivors from GB).

Briefly describe the main activities carried out by the Implementing Partner

The main activities for FPDO were facilitation of women's access to justice in three localities (Baw, Al Kurmuk and Geissan), and building the capacities of police sectors. The target beneficiaries are police personnel, justice sectors, prosecutors, paralegal, community leaders and women groups.

Between January and October 2024, FPDO succeeded to deliver training to 130 police personnel (20 female, 110 male) from different sectors, (prisons, investigators, and judiciary). The main issues discussed on the three workshops were international and National laws, the investigation of GBV cases and Women's Rights. These workshops discussed all challenges faced by women survivors from GBV to access justice in Blue Nile (socially, economic and lack of police facilities). In addition, they conducted special training to justice sector which targeted 36 participants (12 female, 24 male) including lawyers, prosecutors, and legal aid providers, participants gained useful information, increased their knowledge on how to support and stand with survivors to access justice.

Initial internal meetings for endline data collection have begun, and drafting of the endline data collection terms of reference (ToRs) is in progress. These ToRs will be shared with project partners for endorsement before engaging a consultant to conduct data collection and processing. The project's terminal evaluation ToRs, developed jointly by the partners, were reviewed and cleared by the PBF Secretariat.

A second no-cost extension, approved in October 2024, extends the project end date to 28 April 2025. This extension allows UN Women to construct two women's centers, conduct endline data collection, finalize policy dialogues, and allows UNEP to complete the gender, conflict, and climate security assessment report. These activities faced delays due to conflict-related challenges.

The processes for constructing women's centers in Alkaili and Samsur, in Al Kurmuk and Baw localities, are ongoing. A lengthy bidding process and approvals have been completed, and a construction company has been selected. However, security challenges, difficulties obtaining construction materials, delayed government clearance, and heavy rainfall blocking access to Geissan and Kurmuk have prevented the project team from transporting all necessary materials to the sites, delaying the construction beyond the initial extension period.

Two policy dialogue forums were conducted to address women's agendas. In Geissan Locality, community members and women's organizations discussed NRM, women's rights, and negotiation skills. The second forum, with women's organizations and community groups, covered topics of NRM, peace, socio-economic issues, and protection. Two advocacy campaigns were held at the state level via community radio in Ingasana, Funj, and simple Arabic.

At the state level, a training workshop targeted 30 service providers, including health personnel and psychologists, to familiarize them with GBV referral pathways. Three training workshops were conducted for 130 police personnel on national and international laws, GBV case investigation, and women's rights, addressing challenges faced by GBV survivors in accessing justice in Blue Nile. Additionally, a special justice sector training targeted 36 participants (12 female, 24 male), including lawyers, prosecutors, and legal aid providers, raising awareness on supporting GBV survivors in accessing justice.

The procurement of two tractors is complete, with transportation to Blue Nile pending improved road and security conditions. The procurement of medical equipment for Samsur's health clinic laboratory has been finalized, with the equipment delivered to the community.

The justice sector's capacity was strengthened to support SGBV survivors, providing legal advice and ensuring perpetrators are held accountable. Trainings focused on international/national laws, GBV investigations, women's rights, and challenges in accessing justice.

The Capacity of service providers, including health workers and social staff, were trained on survivor-cantered approaches, data handling, referral systems, initial care challenges, GBV stigma, and aligning response services like the GBV hotline for better support and care.

Women-led organizations integrated into community structures, contributing to discussions on women's issues, strengthening GBV prevention and protection networks, and improving referral systems for survivors. This initiative promoted social stability by addressing GBV within Natural Resource Management and empowering women in peacebuilding. Two training workshops focused on leadership, negotiation, and advocacy skills, community responses to GBV, survivor protection, and strengthening the GBV referral system and pathways.

Community awareness on women's rights and gender equality was raised through radio broadcasts in local languages, linking women's issues to natural resource management. Dialogue forums strengthened connections between communities and justice systems, discussing women's agendas in NRM, GBV protection, rights promotion, and negotiation skills.

Two dialogue forums were held between women's organizations and community groups, focusing on women's roles in NRM, peacebuilding, socio-economic development, and protection. Women's groups facilitated engagement on GBV prevention, peacebuilding, NRM, and economic empowerment with key stakeholders.

Community Assets: The funds initially allocated for peace centres and water yards in Bau and Geissan were reallocated to equip the Samsur health facility and purchase two tractors for Yara and Diem Saad. The tractors will be delivered once roads to the Blue Nile are accessible. The health facility is now fully operational, equipped with medical equipment, electrical appliances, and furniture, providing essential services to the community.

Cooperative Committees: The six cooperative committees, each with 50 women, meet monthly to pool resources and provide loans for activities like bread making, food, and crop production. This boosts household incomes, fosters collaboration, and builds trust, positioning women as key stakeholders in promoting peace within their communities.

Community Management Committees (CMCs): The six Community Management Committees (CMCs) in Kurmuk, Bau, and Geissan oversee projects and manage community assets. They facilitated access to project sites, including restricted areas, leveraging local knowledge and relationships to aid implementing partners. Acting as intermediaries, the CMCs consulted with communities and local authorities, enabling project activities to proceed even amid security challenges.

Peacebuilding Committees: Six peacebuilding committees engage communities in dialogues, sporting events and the sharing of folk tales that significantly contributed to enhancing social cohesion, fostering peace, and effectively resolving conflicts within the communities.

Vegetable farm and nurseries: In Deim Saad and Samsur communities, 50 women are engaged in the production of tree seedlings and vegetables which will be sold to communities earning them a source of income.

Coffee chats for Women: Six coffee chat sessions for 120 women to discuss peacebuilding issues were conducted in Geissan and Kurmuk localities. The coffee chats broke down social barriers and build trust among women. These informal gatherings provide platforms for women's participation in peace processes to openly discuss community concerns, share experiences, and address local concerns. The sessions strengthen women's roles as peace advocates in their communities, by building networks, and contribute to conflict prevention and resolution.

*

Show Club for Youth: A showroom was built in Alkaili and another rehabilitated in Gambarda, each equipped with a TV, tables, and chairs. Managed by 100 youth, these clubs generate income by charging community members to watch football, news, and entertainment. They offer neutral spaces for peaceful community interaction.

The gender, conflict, and climate security report: Final draft serves as a working document for Sudan's dynamic context, explored four pathways linking climate, environment, and security.

Climate change and conflict are contributing to livelihood insecurity, and maladaptation. Communities have experienced significant loss of land due to conflict and insecurity, the expansion of mechanized agriculture, and the impacts of climate change.

Mechanized farming, land policies, environmental degradation, and climate change increase competition for natural resources in Blue Nile, exacerbating conflict and displacing vulnerable populations.

Climate change and conflict increase the risk of SGBV. Many communities reported cases of SGBV linked to wider societal gender inequalities that are exacerbated by resource scarcity and unpredictability owing to environmental challenges.

Regional and international tensions over water management pose risks for Blue Nile. Blue Nile is at the centre of regional geopolitics regarding the construction of the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam, which sits about 20 kilometres south of Blue Nile State in Ethiopia.

The study recommends five strategies:

- Promote climate-smart livelihoods for economic and environmental security.
- Strengthen community-based mechanisms to protect ecosystems.
- Strengthen inclusive governance for natural resource management, focusing on women and marginalized groups.
- Enhance protection and reporting for SGBV.
- Promote transboundary cooperation on environmental management

The gender-balanced and youth-dominated Community Environmental Action Planning (CEAP) committees, Community Management Committees (CMCs) and women groups established earlier, played vital roles in project implementation through facilitation and direct collaboration with the implementing partners specially during the current crisis. This collaboration cemented the leadership qualities of these community structures. The capacity building of women on Gender based violence (GBV), the restocking of small ruminants, the work of women cooperatives, seedling nurseries contributed to the economic empowerment of women and youth in the project sites.

The six cooperative committees of 50 members in all the project sites are composed of 100% women address genderspecific barriers to credit and lending. 38% of peacebuilding committee members are women, enhancing both inclusivity and the effectiveness of peacebuilding and conflict resolution mechanisms within communities. The mobile maintenance training included 33.3% women participation while 20% women farmers received certified seeds of sorghum, okra and cowpea contributing to improved food security and livelihoods for communities. 50 community members involved in the management of two tree nurseries in Samsur and Yara are 100% women, seedling production and marketing is another income generating activity further supporting women's financial independence and empowerment. Women's economic self-reliance has led to broader social transformation; breaking traditional gender barriers, fostering economic development. Their participation in economic activities has built cross-community networks and simultaneously expanding their influence as advocates for peace in their communities.

Traditionally the native administration is male dominated with no women. The peacebuilding committees before the project were made up of 100% men, however now due to the project the peace building committees comprise 38% females across the three localities. Likewise, women's representation in the community-based organizations used to be insubstantial, but now the CEAP committees are made up of over 50% females and the cooperative groups are 100% women. This is huge change towards women's empowerment in leadership and economic empowerment. Moreover, youth are taking great leadership roles in the community issues whereas in the past, the elderly were the ones who spearheaded these issues.

Community Management Committees (CMCs) were instrumental in maintaining project activities amidst the ongoing war in Sudan. The established six CMCs active engagement was witnessed in facilitating implementation, linking communities with project stakeholders, and ensuring continuity of project activities. In areas where direct access for the project team was restricted due to the conflict, they organized distribution points for agricultural inputs and facilitated distributions.

The project's impact on peacebuilding was profound; training sessions empowered peacebuilding committees, fostering community cohesion. Socioeconomic infrastructures became platforms for meaningful peace-oriented dialogues. Effective communication between the native administration and the SPLM/N Al Hilu affiliates contributed to reduced tension. Notably, in Kurmuk locality, interactions between Al Kaili communities and SPLM/N Al Hilu affiliates demonstrated progress, particularly evident in joint market access and the exchange of goods.

In Geissan locality, the peace committee played a crucial role in mediating crossline conflicts, resulting in the safe release of three implementing partner personnel detained for suspected operations across the conflict lines. Collaborative dialogues, mediations, and agreements with SPLM leadership facilitated the secure release of the detained staff.

Traditionally, the native administration was male-dominated with no women. Before the project, peacebuilding committees were made up of 100% men, but now 38% of members across three localities are women. Women's representation in community-based organisations was minimal, but now over 50% of CEAP committee members are women, and cooperative groups are 100% women. This marks a significant shift towards women's leadership and economic empowerment. Additionally, youth are now taking on leadership roles in community issues, whereas the elderly previously led these efforts.

Gisma Omer, 28 years old, CEAP and CMC member from Derang of Baw localities says "Before this project, women lived under the impacts of war, and gender-based violence (GBV), likes rape and harassment with fear and silence. Norms discouraged us from speaking out, and absence of response or support for survivors. Through my participation in the project's training workshops and dialogue forums, I gained knowledge about GBV laws, referral pathways, and survivor services. The project also equipped me with practical leadership, advocacy, and negotiation skills, enabling me to engage with community leaders, service providers, and male allies

.These new skills empowered me to take active roles in my community, participating in community-based protection networks, environmental action committees, and local governance structures. I learned how to raise awareness on GBV within my family and community through frequent discussions during public gatherings, such as weddings and condolences, which led to noticeable changes in men's attitudes towards violence. The knowledge I acquired not only gave me confidence but also strengthened my ability to coordinate with justice actors to ensure survivors access justice and protection.

Motivated by this transformation, I joined with other women to form a feminist group in Derang, where we regularly meet for coffee gatherings to discuss issues, share experiences, and strategize solutions. These meetings, initially inspired by the dialogue forums, have evolved into informal support networks where women feel safe to voice their concerns. The project's emphasis on peacebuilding and economic empowerment also helped us align our advocacy efforts with broader community initiatives, such as natural resource management (NRM) and social stability activities.

The knowledge, confidence, and networks I developed through the project have empowered me to break the cycle of silence and fear. I am now actively advocating for GBV prevention, protection of survivors, and women's economic empowerment in collaboration with local leaders and service providers. The project has enabled us to establish sustainable support systems, ensuring that women in our community have both the tools and the confidence to thrive.

In Diring area, Bau locality, women like me faced numerous challenges due to the war and oppression, including rape, harassment, and displacement. These issues left many women living in fear and silence, with traditional norms and fear of scandal preventing them from speaking out. Recognizing the need for change, we aimed to empower women and girls to assert their rights. When UN Women initiated a dialogue forum for women and men leaders in Derang, I saw an opportunity for progress. Despite initial resistance, I worked tirelessly to encourage women to attend. Through perseverance, we managed to increase participation and expand women's knowledge about their rights. Together with others, we formed a feminist group in Derang, advocating for women's issues and fighting against injustice. The group continues to meet regularly, allowing women from villages to discuss their issues, strengthening the community's ability to address gender-based challenges. As a result, women are now empowered, no longer silent or afraid. I recommend expanding these efforts across the Blue Nile region to help all women affected by conflict
