The project team has engaged with authorities in River Nile, especially the Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) and Ministry of Social Welfare, throughout the reporting period. Several meetings were held to introduce the project and funding, types of the community support projects (CSPs) targeted for implementation, partners who have been selected to implement, emphasize that the selection of CSPs would be based on priorities identified via consultations with the communities and processed prior and post implementation how monitoring and evaluation
would be carried out to gauge the effectiveness of the CSPs. Government authorities were requesting for continued emergency assistance as priority, however after further discussion on the need for stability and social cohesion and sharing the inputs received from consultations with communities, they understood the need and are supportive of the project's approach.

As of October, IOM is in the process of contracting NIDAA a second time under the project to implement livelihoods and income generation priorities that were identified by communities through the workshops.  UNHCR started engaging Addition for Disaster Assistance & Development (ADD) as early as March to discuss about the project and contracted ADD in August to collaborate with IOM and implement the community-based support projects in the target locations. Kick-off meetings took place with HAC and the Ministry of Social Welfare. These meetings provided an overview of the project, PBF as the donor, the expected timeline, and the coordination requirements with relevant authorities. A consultative workshop with government technical sectors (Education, Water, Social Welfare, and Health) was also held to present the project, discuss priorities, targeted areas, target groups, and the budget allocated.

#### Project progress summary

In this reporting period, UNHCR and IOM prepared a no-cost extension and reprogramming request with the support of the PBF Secretariat, which was approved by the Peacebuilding Support Office in August 2024. This request proposed to utilize all remaining unspent funds to implement Community Support Projects (CSPs) under Output 2.2, after project implementation was disrupted in Darfur and Khartoum by the conflict that broke out in April 2023. The CSPs are small-scale, community-based, and community-led projects aimed at benefitting all communities and fostering peaceful co-existence in the targeted locations, prioritized according to needs identified using a community-based planning approach, discussions with local authorities in River Nile State, and joint feasibility assessments.

In September, IOM implementing partner Sudanese Development Call Organization (NIDAA) led two community-based planning (CBP) workshops in the target localities of Atbara and Ed Damer. The purpose of the workshops was to inform the planned community support projects (CSPs) by identifying key needs and priorities for building social cohesion between displaced and host communities through equitable access to basic services and livelihoods.

In Atbara, a 3-day workshop was held from September 17 to 19, and included a total of 48 participants (31 female, 17 male), including 41 participants from host and IDP communities, and 7 participants from government agencies and humanitarian organizations. The workshop concluded with the appointment of a community committee comprising 9 members (4 women, 5 men) to oversee the implementation of remaining activities and ensure community ownership and relevance to the context. In Ed Damer, a 3-day workshop was held from September 21 to 23, and included a total of 48 participants (22 female, 26 male), including 42 from host and IDP communities, and 6 from government entities. A community committee was also established in Ed Damer to oversee remaining activities, comprising 8 community members (4 women, 4 men.) In both workshops, participants were carefully selected to represent a diverse range of perspectives from both host and displaced communities, and included community leaders, representatives from local NGOs, and technical line ministry staff with expertise in relevant sectors.

In October, following the conclusion of the workshops, NIDAA shared a first draft of the community action plan (CAP) reports, outlining the priorities identified by the communities within five key sectors: livelihoods, WASH, Health, Education, and Shelter/Non-Food items. The CAPs will inform the community support projects (CSPs) to be prioritized and implemented by IOM and UNHCR's implementing partners for the remainder of the project.

The workshop activities were organized in such a way to maximize interaction between members of different communities, and to identify possible "connectors" among them even amidst the challenging context. Thus, while the workshops were intended to identify future initiatives to increase equitable access to social services and economic opportunities, the inclusive and participatory nature of the workshops themselves yielded numerous positive interactions between the different groups that contributed to enhancing their relationships. As such, the workshops functioned as both a means and an end to help improve social cohesion in the target communities, and a crucial step towards a community-driven approach to addressing the complex challenges faced by communities affected by the conflict.

Additionally, in October, IOM implementing partner Social Inquiry shared three draft thematic briefs building on the data that was collected in Darfur and Chad in previous reporting periods prior to the outbreak of conflict. This followed previous discussions on how to re-purpose the existing data analysis to be of use for actors working in or on Darfur, the cross-border response, and with Sudanese refugees in Chad, as per the revised no-cost extension document. The briefs will comprise 1) an analysis of peacebuilding needs before April 2023, 2) an analysis of safety, security, and access to justice before April 2023, and 3) an analysis of the living conditions of nomads before April 2023. The draft briefs are currently under review by the project team and will be finalized in November 2024.

The questionnaire included gender issues as potential responses to some questions (for example, with regards to incidence of violence and reasons for marginalization). Due to the quotas incorporated in the sampling strategy, the project team can identify insights that correlate to certain gender or age groups. Under outcome 2, the project team ensured gender diversity during the community-based planning workshops in September 2024, with 55% of participants (53 out of 96 total) being women. The workshop also included dedicated discussions on gendered components of tensions and social cohesion in the project's target areas, such as differing levels of access to basic services for women and young women as compared to men. IDPs, host communities, community leaders, local NGOs, local authorities **River Nile state continues** to host some of the highest numbers of IDPs within Sudan. This includes a sizeable proportion of individuals who fled from **Khartoum following the** outbreak of conflict in April 2023, as well as significant numbers of more recently displaced individuals from other conflict-affected states such as Sennar and Gezira. This displacement has significantly affected intercommunal relations and social cohesion within River Nile state, particularly due to the increased competition over limited basic services (ex. water sources, health care facilities) and livelihoods and income-generating activities. While host communities in River Nile were often initially welcoming towards recent arrivals, the protracted nature of the crisis has led to growing tensions over time. The communitybased planning and consultation workshops organized by the project in September 2024 were an opportunity for different communities, both host and displaced, to collectively discuss and prioritize their common needs and priorities, and to identify those initiatives that could most positively contribute to enhancing positive relations between them. The workshop participants were carefully selected to represent a diverse range of perspectives from both host and displaced communities, and included
