The project Steering Committee did not meet over the past six months - its first meeting was held on April 29, 2024.

As defined in the project document, and the JSC ToR adopted at the first JSC meeting, the Steering Committee is cochaired by the UN Resident Coordinator and representative of the Prime Minister's Office of the Government of Montenegro. In addition to the co-chairs, members include the Representatives of the participating UN Agencies in Montenegro - UNDP, UNESCO, and UNICEF.

The first JSC meeting, held on April 29th, 2024, was an opportunity to adopt the JSC ToR, the project workplan, and the proposal of the project locations – 5 local municipalities. The JSC members underscored the project's significance for the country, highlighting the importance of its key components– dialogue, civic engagement, collective action, countering divisive narratives, and enabling trust, as well as the importance of working at the local level. They also highlighted the commitment of Montenegro and UN to the common goals and the Agenda 2030, which go hand in hand with the acceleration of the European integration process. In that context, sustainable development is one of the government's top priorities, with focus on strengthening the resilience of the society and transparent institutions committed to citizens.

Keeping in mind that the Steering Committee meets at least once a year (as per the Project Document) with a mandate to provide strategic direction, oversight, and guidance, the next meeting is planned for February 2025. At this time, the 2025 annual work plan, implementation progress to date, and baseline report will be available for the Steering Committee's review.

The Prime Minister's Cabinet is the key focal institution for the project. The Cabinet was highly responsive and committed to the project, including through the main inception milestone - Joint Steering Committee establishment and its first meeting. On behalf of the Government of Montenegro, the Prime Minister's Office has reiterated its unwavering support for the project, emphasizing Government's commitment to the Agenda 2030 and European integration. In this context, sustainable development remains one of the government's top priorities, with a focus on strengthening societal resilience and ensuring transparent institutions dedicated to citizens. The other key institutional partners were introduced to the project and preparatory activities are carried out with institutions such as the Council on the Rights of the Child, Parliament, including Women's Club, Protector of human rights and freedoms of Montenegro, Ministry of Human and Minority Rights, Ministry of Education, Science and Innovation, and the Bureau for Education, Ministry of Culture and Media and its Directorate for Media, Ministry of Justice and Centre for Mediation all of which supported the project and are partnering in the implementation of specific activities. Five municipalities (Bar, Bijelo Polje, Pljevlja, Podgorica and Ulcinj) were selected to participate in program activities as target communities, covering all 3 regions of the country and more than half total population. All municipalities expressed great interest to participate in the programme and high levels of commitment for partnership towards the project goals and enhancing social cohesion. They have welcomed the unique nature of the programme that enables participatory design and co-design of specific activities/interventions based their unique needs. The local self-governments have already established a strong local infrastructure - they have formed diverse teams for the project implementation. The project thus created a foundation for effective collaboration and coordination at the local level.

The project staff in all three agencies has been engaged. UNDP successfully recruited the Programme Manager, Communication and Outreach Associate and Project Associate. As for the UNESCO team, in addition to the Programme Specialist for Culture and Education and the M&E Officer who oversee the project, the recruitment of the Project officer has been completed. Alongside the existing UNESCO operational team, a Youth Empowerment Associate Officer has been appointed to further support the project's implementation. UNICEF existing staff has been engaged in the project implementation. When it comes to the Joint staff, Joint Project Coordinator and Joint M&E Officer have been recruited.

The Joint Project Team (JPT) has been meeting regularly, including meetings with the Heads of Agencies and the Resident Coordinator. The Joint Project Team membership and working protocols have been defined and adopted by implementing agencies. Besides programme focal points, the JPT includes M&E and communications specialists and focal points. Project work plan has been designed through the thorough project review and sequencing of all project activities, ensuring planned synergies and identifying synergetic effects. The JPT has also drafted M&E plan as well as Communications Strategy, including project info sheet, branding and visual identity.

Major partners, vendors and experts for most of the activities have been either contracted or open calls have been published with partners to be contracted by the end of the year.

The JPT has also selected project locations - 5 municipalities that will be project community-beneficiaries based on the criteria outlined in the project document. Those are Podgorica, Bar, Bijelo Polje, Pljevlja and Ulcinj, covering all 3 regions of the country and more than half total population. JPT has held meetings will all municipalities, and they have all welcomed the project and expressed high levels of commitment for partnership towards the project goals and enhancing social cohesion. The local self-governments have already established a strong local infrastructure – they have formed diverse teams for the project implementation. The project thus created a foundation for effective collaboration and coordination at the local level. This setup has already proven to be efficient and essential in facilitating smooth implementation and ensuring the local ownership and full participation of local communities.

In order to ensure quality of monitoring of the project progress towards the set Outcomes, the baseline survey has been designed and launched. The survey has been done through the baseline questionnaire with the project participants as well as through the KAP Survey on general population, which will serve as the control group and overall measuring of the project indicators. The baseline survey among project participants has been launched and will be implemented in succession, following the timeline of beneficiaries' engagement. KAP Survey has been launched and data should be available in November.

To improve capacities of children, adolescents, young people and women for meaningful civic engagement and inclusive dialogue (Output 1.1), some of the groups have been specifically empowered. UNDP has engaged 60 #NextGen, progressive and empathetic leaders for common good from all 5 municipalities. Their capacities for meaningful contribution to dialogues as well as for authentic leadership for common good, social cohesion, gender equality and addressing hate speech are being raised. UNICEF has built capacities of 220 children and adolescents for civic participation and social cohesion, and empowered them to participate in the local dialogues and contribute to the social cohesion pledges. UNICEF has also ensured that 5,000 parents provide their views of the education system, peer violence, social cohesion, conflict prevention and resolution, as an input to design the activities that will be deployed in schools from November 2024. To enhance the skills, capacities and resilience of children, adolescents, parents/caregivers, and teachers through civic education programmes, UNICEF has provided support and training on peaceful conflict resolution and violence prevention for 58 children and 51 parents who required support with conflict issues in school and community.

UNESCO has launched a capacity development program to enhance the quality of education and strengthen teachers' pedagogical skills in addressing critical media and information literacy challenges such as fact-checking, artificial intelligence manipulation, and combating stereotypes, prejudices, and hate speech. By fostering media and information literacy, the program promotes respect for human rights and emphasizes evidence-based decision-making and problem-solving in diverse settings. Tailored capacity-building initiatives for diverse groups of teachers across 5 project locations will facilitate the achievement of these objectives.

The project has been successfully engaging local communities in dialogue for the common good (Outcome 1) through the launch of the robust local dialogues' platforms by UNDP. To ensure local ownership and sustainability, UNDP has established local resource groups in all 5 municipalities, which serve as the local advisors, partners, sounding boards and sustainability champions for the project outcomes and methodologies. The groups will also act as the monitoring mechanism for the implementation and sustainability of the local community vision of common good resulting from dialogue platforms. Local dialogues platforms have been successfully launched and implemented in Bar and Bijelo Polje, where 169 people have collaboratively identified issues and designed solutions for the common good and social cohesion in their towns. The recommendations stemming from the Dialogues will be the core of the Social Cohesion Pledges and sets of policy measures that are to be adopted by the local governments and state institutions, thus contributing to creation of inclusive, gender responsive, rights based, people and child responsive social cohesion policies (Outcome 2).

The dialogues' participants reflected the diverse demographics of local communities, including women and men, people living in rural areas, children and adolescents, people with disability, decision-makers, thus providing an inclusive opportunity for meaningful participation and building the sense of being heard and valued. To ensure the design and implementation of the social cohesion Pledges and related policies, local governments representatives were actively engaged in local dialogues, exemplifying accountability, collaboration and commitment to common good and social cohesion. The municipality of Bar has already committed to integrate several proposals from the local dialogue into the municipal plan and budget for the 2025.

The power of direct involvement and co-creation between citizens and institutions has proved to be an excellent model resulting not only in people centred solutions, but also high level of responsiveness of local authorities, based on their own commitment but also compelling, human, real-time and real-life feedback and dialogue with citizens. The dialogues methodology has been meticulously designed to not just serve to the project purpose, but in a long-term, to enable dialogue between people and between people and institutions and provide people-centred solutions and policies in any given area or topic. The joint nature of the programme has reflected in ensuring children and adolescents participation by UNICEF as well as UNESCO taking part in the final panel discussion on the dialogues recommendations.

To ensure that national and local institutions respond to the citizens recommendations and adopt social cohesion policies (Outcome 2), UNDP and UNICEF have ensured partnerships and commitment of the main institutional stakeholders that will play key role in ensuring the feedback loop and accountability of institutions for ensuring policy and programmatic response to the citizens recommendations voiced through dialogue platforms (Output 2.1). These partnerships include local self-governments and local parliaments, the National Council for Sustainable Development, Prime Minister's Office, Ministries, and Women's club of the national Parliament. With the aim to strengthen institutional capacity and mechanisms for the monitoring of hate speech, violence and other social

conesion issues, partnership with the Protector of Human Rights has been established by UNICER, supported by the Human Rights Adviser, and UNDP. UNDP has also partnered with Ministry of Human and Minority Rights to build institutional capacities to ensure women's participation and counter hate speech, violence, sexism, misogyny and backlash related to gender equality. UNESCO, in partnership with the Ministry of Culture and Media, initiated the establishment of a mechanism for close coordination aimed at combating hate speech, online harassment, and disinformation, aligned with Montenegro's Strategy for Media (Output 2.2.).

Local Civic Dialogues involved diverse groups including children and young girls and boys. Approximately 24% of all participants were children. To ensure the meaningful participation of children and the respectful discussion, they were capacitated through the empowerment activities before the dialogue, while experienced facilitators guided conversations to ensure children and adolescents feel and are included at equal basis with adults. Local Dialogues used interactive methods like visual aids and art to help children and adolescents to express their views comfortably. Also, breakout groups were set up with mixed-age group with facilitators ensuring their voices are heard, while providing them with the opportunity to meaningfully engaged in discussions alongside the adults.

The high percentage of women (67,5 %) participating in local dialogues on social cohesion reflects a positive step towards gender equality, as it ensures that women's voices and perspectives are actively included in shaping community dynamics and addressing local challenges. Women's participation in these dialogues brought critical insights on issues related to social cohesion, ensuring that the needs and concerns of women, alongside those of other community members, are represented and addressed. The specific focus has been on engaging the groups that are facing intersectional vulnerability such as women belonging to the Roma population. To do so, dialogues were designed to accommodate different preferences in the ways of expressing opinions: in small groups, individually, in the plenum.

While designing capacity building activities, special care has been taken to leave no one behind and to include vulnerable groups including children, adolescents and youth, people with disabilities, people living in rural areas, Roma, LGBTIQ+.

The Project has put a special emphasis on gender and age analysis of incoming baseline data. The KAP survey has a specific section on Gender Equality, which will ensure valuable insights to be further integrated in the project activities.

Local Dialogue participant/beneficiary -a woman belonging to Roma community The Local Dialogue event marked a turning point for a Roma woman who had long felt overlooked and frustrated in her efforts to secure support for herself and her family. As a single mother, she had faced relentless challenges, from losing state financial support to navigating a maze of unresponsive institutions. Each time she sought help, she was redirected to yet another institution. When she heard about a local dialogue event, she decided to attend, hoping it might bring some help. But, this event wasn't like the other workshops or training sessions she had attended, she says. Other events were often limited to capacity-building within and for Roma people only. This time, the gathering included people from different backgrounds and communities, all coming together to discuss shared issues in their town. As she joined others in group work, sitting shoulder to shoulder, she felt an unfamiliar yet comforting sense of belonging. By hearing other people talking about similar challenges, she finally felt she was not alone—there were others, people from other communities, who shared her experience. These dialogues weren't just about solving her problem; they were about building trust and breaking down barriers. For many Roma women, this was the first time they felt comfortable sharing their thoughts with people outside their community. She recalled her initial hesitation, how she had

been too shy to introduce

"Other events I was invited to were often just focused on building capacity of Roma community members. This time, it was different—the gathering included people from all backgrounds and communities, with the aim to come together to discuss shared issues. And we, Roma peole, were at the table. The organizers were so warm and welcoming; they made me feel like I truly belonged."

Local self-government representative

One of the high level political representatives of the municipality remembers the days back in the 1980s, when he was a university student in another city and that was a period of strong civic activism. Back then, they fought for everything, he recalls, but today, people are much more passive. In his current role as a decision maker, he fully supports any effort to encourage more civic engagement and to motivate citizens to be more active. But he faces a challenge. He witnessed many public debates that people attend motivated by their own particular political interests and with negative energy and constant unconstructive criticism that lead nowhere. Although he has participated in similar community events before, he noted that this Local Dialogue took a unique approach in engaging people and bringing together diverse groups: older generations, RAE population, children, young leaders, people with disabilities, representatives of local institutions. This allowed many people to express their concerns, not only the most vocal ones. The novelty is in inclusiveness and innovative outreach that has real potential for future community-building efforts. Secondly, he highlighted that in contrast to some other public debates that devolve into personal or political conflicts, this event encouraged constructive dialogue focused on solutions using

innovative methodology.

"Only in this type of positive environment can positive results emerge. We lack these kinds of local dialogues, where people are not focused solely on their own particular, often political, interests but are genuinely interested in finding solutions for the community."

The innovative dialogues methodology has been meticulously designed to not just serve to the project purpose, but in a long-term, to enable dialogue between people and between people and institutions and provide people-centred solutions and policies in any given area or topic. The methodology relied on the innovative tools and approaches such as human-centred design, sense-making, etc. The power of direct involvement and co-creation between citizens and institutions has proved to be an excellent model resulting not only in people centred solutions, but also high level of responsiveness of local authorities, based on their own commitment but also compelling, human, real-time and real-life feedback and dialogue with citizens. This was recognised and particularly stressed out by the local decision-makers attending the events. The high level of engagement was facilitated by a variety of inclusive methods. ### 1)M&E Plan Developed.

Under the leadership of Joint M&E Associate, the Joint Project Team (JPT) has drafted M&E plan, which includes the actions planned for the successful monitoring of the progress towards the planned Outcomes and Outputs, as well as foreseen risks, context and catalytic effects monitoring. The plan also includes relevant action towards deployment of the final evaluation. Furthermore, it contains Metric Framework which provides detailed description of each indicator (definition), responsible agency for indicator value reporting, tools for data collection, reporting frequency, unit of measure and methodology for indicator value calculation. It is therefore serving as a Performance Indicator Reference Sheet. The Metric Framework is crucial as it establishes a clear, structured approach to tracking and evaluating progress, ensuring consistency and clarity in data collection.

2) Baseline data collection through Knowledge Attitudes and Practices (KAP) survey and Programme participants survey.

The baseline data collection in under way and it is being collected on target group (through Programme participants survey) and comparison group (through KAP survey). The purpose of KAP survey is to provide data on groups similar to direct beneficiaries for the comparison purposes, but also to provide a snapshot of the situation in 5 selected municipalities and guide future programming. The estimated completion date is December 2024. The purpose of the Programme participants survey is to provide baseline for the group targeted by programme interventions and track the progress made. We are using rolling baseline approach, where data collection occurs as participants are enrolled. This approach accommodates the different timeframes across different project interventions and ensures that baseline data is captured as close as possible to the start of each participant's involvement in the project.

### 3) Observation of the Local Dialogues

The observation method is employed to assess the depth of meaningful engagement of dialogue participants, contributing valuable data for indicator assessment by cross-verifying with participants' self-reported perceptions; and second, to monitor enabling factors that support meaningful participation, aiding facilitators in identifying and addressing any challenges real time. Observation covered local dialogues in selected municipalities where these dialogues have been implemented to date (Bar, Bijelo Polje). Efforts are continuously invested in creating spaces for the potential catalytic effects of the programme. In the reporting period, the programme has unlocked the following catalytic processes:

The success of the dialogues for common good model and methodology as a means of citizen engagement has led to discussions between UNDP and Association of Municipalities of Montenegro on institutionalizing it across other municipalities. This model not only ensures continued community participation but also facilitates the engagement of additional stakeholders at the sub-national level, strengthening national ownership of social cohesion and development processes.

UNICEF has leveraged on the partnership with Ministry of Education to advocate for the integration of programme results into the upcoming National Education Reform Strategy (2025-2035): The implementation of Civic Education and Socio-Emotional skills programs will inform and potentially be integrated into the Government of Montenegro's Education Reform Strategy for the next 10 years period. This will create a momentum for structural change and ensure that social cohesion and peace values are embedded within the national educational framework.

In partnership with Ministry of Culture and Media, UNESCO is supporting implementation of the national Media Strategy, by providing support to several initiatives related to ethical reporting and hate speech in media. This will enable long-term, sustainable, whole society action and results in ensuring ethical and responsible reporting and media space safe from harmful narratives and hate speech.

The programme has embedded sustainability in its methodologies and partnerships. Programme locations were chosen to ensure diverse social groups in five towns are involved in dialogues that foster a shared vision, collaboration, public trust, respect for diversity, and resilience against divisive narratives. Municipalities across northern, central, and southern regions, covering half the country's population, have welcomed the unique nature of the programme that enables participatory design and co-design of specific activities/interventions based their unique needs, which contributes to the local ownership and sustainability.

One of the core activities, the local dialogues for common good, is co-created with local actors and seeks to identify processes where dialogues can be integrated as a long-term tool and space for dialogue among people and between people and local authorities. Each municipality has a resource group to act as advisors, partners, and champions for sustainable project outcomes. Local resource groups in all 5 municipalities have been established, serving as the local advisors, partners, sounding boards and sustainability champions for the local dialogues' outcomes and methodologies, enhancing the programme's capacity to integrate local insights and resources into the process. The groups will also serve as the monitoring and championing mechanism for the implementation and sustainability of the local community vision of common good that will be collectively designed through dialogue platforms.

The power of co-creation between citizens and institutions has proved to be an excellent model resulting not only in people-centered solutions, but also high level of responsiveness of local authorities, based on their own commitment but also compelling, human, real-time and real-life feedback and dialogue with citizens. The dialogues methodology design has been a meticulous and comprehensive process, which was implemented with a view of developing a methodology that will not just for the project purpose, but in a long-term, enable dialogue between people and between people and institutions and provide people-centered solutions and policies in any given area or topic. Sustainability is further supported through school-based curricula on civic education, socio-emotional skills, conflict resolution, and human rights education.

All institutional partners have shown strong commitment to advancing social cohesion through this partnership. #### **Event 1**

Baseline data collection on target beneficiaries

Baseline data with project beneficiaries has been collected so far from participants of two local dialogues. The data collected relates to project outcome-level indicators covering topics such as perceptions of respondents' competence to understand and participate in political processes, feelings of being engaged, valued, and heard by institutions, interpersonal trust and solidarity, and trust that institutions will respond to their recommendations, among other areas.

While adults tend to exhibit higher levels of political efficacy and trust in institutions, there is a significant need to engage and empower younger individuals to develop their confidence and involvement in the political process. This analysis underscores the importance of addressing internal efficacy as a precursor to external engagement and trust in political institutions. Adults, both men and women, report relatively similar, high mean scores for their perceived confidence in his or her own abilities to understand politics and to participate in the political process (internal political efficacy). However, male minors report the lowest mean score (2.39), indicating a potential gap in confidence or belief in their political understanding and participation compared to their female counterparts. The highest scores in adult men suggest that as individuals mature, their confidence in their understanding of politics increases, possibly due to greater life experiences and political exposure, including the lower participation of women. On the other hand, when it comes to the feeling that they have a say in what institutions do (local and national level), there is a difference between adults and children. Across both genders, minors exhibit lower mean scores than adults, indicating that younger individuals feel less engaged, valued, and heard by the institutions. When looking at the

#### **Event 2**

Observation of the Local Dialogues

The aim was to evaluate the meaningful engagement of dialogue participants (Outcome 1 Indicator) and identifying real-time factors that facilitate or hinder participation.

Local dialogues brought together people reflecting the diverse demographics of local communities, including women and men, people living in rural areas, children and adolescents, people with disability, decision-makers, thus providing an inclusive opportunity for meaningful participation and building the sense of being heard and valued. All groups demonstrated a high level of engagement, both in group activities and plenary discussions. Participants from the Roma community engaged in discussions to the extent they felt comfortable, with facilitators respecting individual levels of participation. Observations indicated that children were especially active in presenting their group work, displaying confidence and ease in discussing topics related to social cohesion. Special attention should be given to encouraging their engagement in group settings, where they interact with adults, to ensure their voices are consistently heard and valued. The high level of engagement was facilitated by a variety of inclusive methods. Group work strategies were tailored to accommodate all age groups and abilities, using activities that encouraged active participation from everyone. For example, it involved creative exercises that promoted selfexpression, as well as structured dialogues. Visual aids and simplified language were used to make the concept of social cohesion accessible to

everyone, ensuring the presentation was interactive and easily understood across all ages and backgrounds. To ensure the design and implementation of the social cohesion Pledges and related policies, local governments representatives were actively engaged in local dialogues, exemplifying accountability, collaboration and commitment to common good and social cohesion. Additionally, the presence of local institution representatives appeared to motivate participants to share their perspectives even more openly. The power of direct involvement and cocreation between citizens and institutions has proved to be an excellent model resulting not only in people centred solutions, but also high level of responsiveness of local authorities, based on their own commitment but also compelling, human, realtime and real-life feedback and dialogue with citizens. The dialogues methodology has been meticulously designed to not just serve to the project purpose, but in a long-term, to enable dialogue between people and between people and institutions and provide people-centred solutions and policies in any given area or topic. This was recognised and particularly stressed out by the local decision-makers attending the events
