To support UN response to the rampant conflict related sexual violence in Sudan, the Advisor revived the MARA working group which serves as a mechanism to ensure monitoring and documentation of CRSV cases in Sudan. Finally, the Advisor developed an adaptive flexible annual workplan to guide her interventions. The re-programmed Outcome 4, aimed at enhancing women's empowered participation in peacebuilding processes in Sudan through advancing the Women, Peace and Security Agenda, has demonstrated significant progress, underscoring the potential for meaningful impact on the ground. By enhancing gender mainstreaming within UNCT processes, notable strides have been made, including the establishment of a Gender Thematic Working Group comprising representatives from all UN agencies in Sudan, as well as the successful mainstreaming of gender perspectives in the development of the Interim Cooperation Framework. To strengthen attention on women peace and security a Women Peace and Security Task Force was formed in May 2025 as a specialized task team operating within the framework of the Gender Thematic Working Group. The Task force comprises of 12 UN agencies, designed to foster a more coordinated and effective approach to delivering on the WPS agenda in Sudan, thereby reinforcing the existing efforts to integrate gender perspectives in humanitarian, peacebuilding and development responses in Sudan.

WPS capacities for 174 UNCT staff and partners were built within the reporting period. Specific sessions with tailor made content for specific groups were conducted with the PSEA network members, programme teams in UNHCR and PBF and MPTF team members reaching 174 (150 women and 24 men) participants, who received knowledge and practical skills on WPS and its importance in the current context of Sudan, gender analysis, planning, monitoring and reporting. This training will impact the overall WPS agenda within UNCT programming, as participants will integrate the WPS agenda into their activities, designing and planning.

On 8th May 2025, in collaboration with the office of the UN Personal Envoy for Sudan, UN Women and other regional actors, a virtual networking and lesson learning for Sudanese women peacebuilders (both at local and diaspora level) was organized. Sudanese women were able to learn and network with women peacebuilders from similar contexts such as Libya, South Sudan and DRC. Networking is critical for enhanced coordination among WPS partitioners and this will empower the WPS agenda and women participation in Peace process. Lessons learned sessions will ensure that future WPS activities have greater impact
