(Note: In this report Search will also highlight some of the project progress that was made in the second half of November and December 2024 and was not reported in the last annual report since it was due by the 15th of November 2024).

Search had to make changes to the NCE proposal in January and the project NCE was signed on February 19, 2025, so we could not implement any activities in the first few weeks of the year. Although the project was delayed at the beginning due to these delays in finalizing the NCE request submitted in December 2024, followed by fund illiquidity status, the project still made tangible outcome level progress. The project strengthened the capacity, coordination, and strategic relationships among women-led and women-serving civil society to advance peacebuilding through the successful execution of 12 Psychosocial Support (PSS) Sessions in Blue Nile and Kassala states, 6 Coalition Building Forums in Kassala and South Kordofan states, and 12 Peace Coffee Ceremonies in Kassala and South Kordofan states. The psychosocial support sessions have increased knowledge, skills and confidence of 323 women leaders in women-led and women-serving civil society organizations in Blue Nile (10 communities) in December 2024 and Kassala in May 2025 to implement effective peacebuilding initiatives after addressing the trauma that remains one of the psychological barriers for meaningful women's participation in peace initiatives. In addition to the group sessions, the PSS sessions also identified some cases that required referral to more specialized interventions, which represented 15% of the participants in Blue Nile PSS sessions. These cases were successfully referred for follow-up with specialized service providers. In Kassala, approximately 30% of the participants had experienced trauma related to conflict, displacement, or domestic violence, which confirms the relevance of the project interventions in responding to real community needs. The 371 women who attended the Coffee Sessions in South Kordofan (Dilling and Debeibat areas) and the 147 women who attended the Coalition Building Forums in Blue Nile and South Kordofan during November and December 2024 had the opportunity to access safe platforms to engage in mutual support and peer learning. The project also engaged male stakeholders (33 male community activists) in the coalition building forum who have discussed their thoughts about the barriers preventing women from having effective coalitions, and they showed strong commitment to support the civil society efforts for more women inclusion in peace and security in Sudan. Below are some of the identified barriers preventing meaningful women coalitions:

Most women are not skilled to advocate for their issues, or market their capabilities.

Low economic opportunities for women businesses.

Negative community insights about women

Low self-confidence

Under the second project outcome: increase the understanding, acceptance of, and support to women's rights and the positive benefits of women's inclusion among male authorities and community leaders, the project worked toward positively transforming the broader perceptions of women's rights and women's leadership through Gender Sensitivity training that was carefully customized to the male dominated communities in Kassala conducted in February 2025 for 20 participants from Kassala civil society (8 women, 12 men). During the gender sensitivity training, participants shared the mind shift they felt about the importance of women inclusion, and they addressed the gender sensitivity in the current context in the eastern states in Sudan specially in the distribution of humanitarian aid. Hajer, one of the gender sensitivity training participants said "The obstacles to mainstreaming gender in Eastern Sudan are significant, particularly in rural areas. The ongoing conflict has further exacerbated the situation, making women's participation in decision-making increasingly vulnerable and contributing to their exclusion from humanitarian aid distribution."

Therefore, in the reporting period, the project critically contributed to both of the project outcomes of increased capacity and coordination among women civil society leaders and positively shifting community perception about women's inclusion.

The project mainly targeted women civil society leaders with conscious consideration of engaging male allies. For example, despite that the majority of the coalition building participants were women, and they discussed different aspects of how to enhance networking and coalition building among women-serving and Women Led Organizations, the activity also engaged male stakeholders who shared their own perspectives on the topics.

Another reflection of project inclusion is that all the implemented activities considered the intended participation of internally displaced people and members of the communities hosting them, as well as people with disability in some areas. Such as the gender sensitivity training in Kassala, where some of the participants were people with a disability, and in one of the coffee sessions in Aldebeibat area in South Kordofan, where 6% of the participants had a disability.

In September 2024, Search for Common Ground Sudan facilitated a Gender Sensitivity workshop in Kassala State, targeting influential community actors, including religious leaders, political figures, and emergency committee members. The workshop aimed to address deeply rooted gender norms and promote inclusive leadership. One notable outcome was the public transformation of a highly respected local Imam. Initially adhering to traditional norms that excluded women from religious discourse, he openly acknowledged during the workshop that he had never permitted women to attend his teaching sessions, reflecting prevailing conservative views. However, after engaging with the workshop content and peer dialogue, the Imam publicly committed to integrating women into his religious programs. He stated, "After the gender sensitivity workshop, I understood what it truly means to mainstream gender... I am now committed to including women in my teaching programs and will use my platform to advocate for it."

This shift carried tangible influence. In Kassala's conservative Muslim communities, Imams hold substantial authority and legitimacy. His endorsement of women's participation in religious and public life helped catalyze broader acceptance within the community. Since the workshop, women have begun attending his sessions, and the Imam has actively supported the inclusion of women in mosque-based initiatives.

The following qualitative result was drawn from a story of change collected during this reporting period, while the corresponding activity was implemented in September 2024:

In Kassala State, eastern Sudan, social structure followed old, conservative rules. For generations, women's voices were rarely heard beyond the walls of their homes. Community leaders, politicians, and religious figures decided what was proper for women and girls, and they insisted that females belong in the background. Any woman who dared step into public life, especially on religious platforms, faced harsh judgment and stigma. In this world, the idea of women speaking up or taking part in community life was almost unimaginable.

A significant shift of attitude began quietly, in a space where community leaders gathered for a Gender Sensitivity workshop in September 2024. The event, organized by Search for Common Ground Sudan, brought together influential religious figures, political leaders, and members of emergency committees-people whose words could influence the entire community.

Among them sat a respected Sheikh, an Imam whose authority was woven into the very fabric of his community. For years, his beliefs had been unshakable: women belonged at home, far from the circle of religious teaching. He never questioned it; it was simply the way things were. "I have never allowed women to attend my teaching programs. It wasn't even something I considered. In our community, women were expected to remain indoors and had no need, even concerning their faith, to engage publicly," he admitted, echoing the old norms.

But as the workshop unfolded, something shifted. The Imam listened, perhaps for the first time, to stories and perspectives that challenged the boundaries he had always accepted. He began to see how excluding women from public and religious life had quietly stifled the community's growth. "After the gender sensitivity workshop, I understood what it truly means to mainstream gender, and how this is affecting our community. I am now committed to including women in my teaching programs and will use my platform to advocate for it," he shared, his voice carrying both humility and resolve.

He went on, "Although I had been part of informal discussions about women's inclusion before, I was never convinced. Now, I am well prepared to champion women's issues within our religious and community programs, using my missionary work in mosques."

The Imam's transformation was more than personal. In a place where tradition is law, his public commitment sent sparks of hope through the community. His endorsement of women's inclusion opened doors for dialogue and acceptance, challenging old barriers and building new bridges of trust, especially in such a Muslim community where Imams hold significant influence. Their perceived strong religious authority allows them to shape people's decisions in both personal and public aspects of life.

To ensure sustainability beyond the life of the project, Search has prioritized capacity strengthening and local ownership among both civil society and community leaders. A total of 728 women leaders from women-led and women-serving organizations have been trained across Blue Nile, South Kordofan, and Kassala states, with many now actively integrating gender-sensitive approaches into their organizational planning. In a May 2025 Pause and Reflect session, participants reported applying gender concepts in their work and challenging discriminatory norms in their communities. Additionally, 371 women engaged in Coffee Ceremonies and 147 women participated in Coalition Building Forums, fostering peer networks that will persist as support systems after project closure. Male allies have also shown signs of sustained commitment: 33 male community activists joined coalition forums and 20 religious and civic leaders completed Gender Sensitivity Training, with one influential Imam now publicly advocating for women's inclusion in mosque-based teaching. These shifts in attitudes and behaviors—particularly among authority figures—lay the groundwork for ongoing inclusive peacebuilding led by local actors. Several partner CSOs are now incorporating gender sensitivity into their annual work plans, demonstrating institutional uptake that will extend the impact of project investments well beyond February 2026.
