- 1. Held meetings with the Ministry of Gender, Child, and Social Welfare and other government entities and Civil society to validate, launch, and disseminate the South Sudan Women's Charter to position women's priorities and concerns in the permanent constitution.
- 2. Worked with the Ministry of Youth and Sports and the Ministry of Gender to finalize the South Sudan Youth "constitutional" Charter which positions youth's priorities and concerns in the Permanent Constitution.
- 3. Conducted meetings and workshops with the Reconstituted -National Constitutional Review Commission (NCRC) to:
- develop internal governance instruments including rules of procedures, organogram, and plan of action for the commission as well as preparation of the operational budget for the commission.
- Engaged with the NCRC to provide support in various aspects such as renovating the NCRC Juba-based office and providing internet service.
- The project engaged with the National Constitutional Review Commission (NCRC) to prepared for capacity building of the NCRC to take place on 26th 28th November 2024 on gender-responsive public participation through engaging constitutional-making experts from South Africa and Kenya. The experts will provide comparative experiences of constitution-making from the perspectives of South Africa and Kenya to provide key insights for the NCRC to design, review, and execute a robust, inclusive, and meaningful civic education and public consultations, with emphasis on the inclusion of women, youths, and persons with disabilities.
- 4. Held briefing meetings with the Ministry of Peacebuilding to update on the status of project implementation.
- 5. Held discussions with Juba University School of Law (government university) and South Sudan Human Rights Commission to discuss the development of position papers for thematic issues that will inform the content and text of the permanent constitution once drafting commences.
- 6. The project also engaged the Women Parliamentary Caucus (WPC) of the Transitional National Legislative Assembly on 09/10/2024 to support learning exchange opportunities with Kenya and Uganda on the gender-responsive constitution-making process to provide key insights for the WPC to understand their role as of part of the Constituent Assembly in deliberating and adopting a gender-responsive South Sudan's Permanent Constitution as well as supporting women's participation in the Constitution Making Process. Benchmarking constitution mission for WPC to Kenya and Uganda is planned for 12th 15th November 2024

Contracting of 18 CSOs and media organizations as implementing partners has been completed. The last the four (4) CSOs to disseminate and provide civic education and awareness on the constitution-making process in the three regions of South Sudan will end mid-December 2024. The latest of partners included Centre for Inclusive Governance, Peace and Justice (CIGPJ) contracted in September 2024 to support the capacity strengthening of the constitution-making process bodies including the NCRC and the Women Parliamentary Caucus of the Transitional National Legislative. The CSO is supporting the development of four (4) of the position papers with women providing comparative analysis on contentious constitutional issues from a gender perspective and continue strengthening the women-led coalitions for the Constitution Making Process established in Yei, Wau, Yambio, Torit, and Juba to conduct civic education. It will also lobby for women participation and use the South Sudan Women's Charter to advocate for the inclusion of women's priorities in the Permanent Constitution with collective voice. Additionally, three local partners are in the process of finalizing three (3) additional position papers focusing on an issue of relevance to the constitutional context of South Sudan

The project has completed the recruitment of all project staff. The last of the recruitment related deployment of the Senior Gender Advisor in October 2024 to support the work of the constitution-making institutions including the NCRC which has now been completed. The NCRC welcomes the deployment of the Senior Gender Advisor as fundamental to support the work of engendering the Permanent Constitution-Making Process.

The project through UNESCO has contracted the Union of Journalists of South Sudan (UJOSS) to continue building journalists' capacity in ethical reporting, fact checking, gender responsive reporting, conflict sensitive reporting and general reporting on the constitutional making process. The Association for Media Development in South Sudan (AMDISS) has been contracted to support activities with duty bearers on raising awareness on Freedom of Expression, Access to Information and understanding the role of the media during the constitution making process. In addition, the project contracted media houses such as Samaritan FM Radio, the Radio Community and the Catholic Radio Network to strengthen efforts on promoting access to information and educating grass root communities on the CMP and encouraging public participation during national consultations on development of the permanent constitution.

The project is on track towards some of the outcomes and off-track in more outcomes areas and thus classified as OffTrack. Following the establishment the National Constitutional Review Commission (NCRC), in November 2023, the project has been actively supporting its mandate. This support includes hosting a small committee of the NCRC leadership and ten members, at the UNDP premises, to discuss and adopt the NCRC budget and submitted to the Government. The tools of operation have now been adopted and being utilized for the function of the commission's work. However, besides the formation of the NCRC, the rest of the mechanisms, including the Constitution Drafting Committee (CDC) and National Constitution Committee (NCC) are not formed yet. However, with the NCRC now established, process for the formation of subsequent mechanisms will follow. One of the inhibiting factors leading to delays in the formation of the CDC are related to delays in allocation of resources by the Government. The project can only cost share the through payment international drafting experts and the government remunerating the national experts. The project is advocating with the government to have the national drafting experts constituted.

Many of subsequent activities requires that the NCRC is fully functional. The NCRC, upon being established is in its formative stages and subsequent actions can only be supported once it commences full operation. For instance, activities under Outcone II, requiring undertaking inclusive and gender responsive public consultations with state and nonstate actors and receive public submissions. The NCRC has not began public consultations at national and sub-national levels, for reasons that it is still assembling and reviewing its public participation manuals, requires capacity building on public participation, and is waiting for funds disbursement from the Government to support the nation-wide public participation. However, NCRC is expected to launch the civic education and public consultations manuals by early December 2024 to enable it to commence the public participation in early 2025. Additionally, the support to the Constitution Drafting Committee (CDC) to draft a gender responsive and human rights compliant constitutional text consistent with the R-ARCSS, there has made slow progress because the NCRC has not yet established the CDC. The NCRC has indicated that now offices for CDC has been completed, the formation of the drafting team will be constituted by March 2025. Additionally, the Constitutional Conference (NCC) to debate and adopt the final draft constitutional text to be submitted to the Constituent Assembly for final adoption can only be constituted after the drafting of constitution. The NCC has not yet been established as envisaged under the Constitution Making Process Act, 2022 which can only be after the draft constitution is completed.

On awareness and capacity strengthening aspects, the project, in partnership with Union of Journalists of South Sudan (UJoSS) and State Ministries of information kicked-off capacity building trainings for forty-five journalists (10F and 35M) in Pibor and Ruweng Administrative Areas. The training conducted aimed at equipping journalists with skills and knowledge on ethical reporting, fact checking, gender responsive reporting, conflict sensitive reporting and reporting on the constitution al making process.

In addition, the project in partnership with Association of Media Development in South Sudan (AMDISS and the R-NCRC, conducted a capacity building workshop for 99 (69M and 30 F) duty bearers (members of the RNCRC, NEC and media managers) on Freedom of Expression, Access to Information and understanding the role of the media during the constitution making process in Juba and Wau. The engagement aimed at rallying support from duty bearers to commit to support freedom of expression and access to information for journalists and the public during the constitution making process. From the capacity building exercises, there is more appreciation of the importance of the constitution making process as well as the need for a new permanent constitution in South Sudan. Further, the media organization committed to pushing the government and key stakeholders to expedite the process of drafting of the constitution as key governance tool for the country. Some of the themes and issues being discussed alongside the benchmarks of the R-ARCSS include the contentious issues i.e citizenship, federalism, land-tenure others. Also, the postponement of the election to 2026 was also intricately linked to elections and the function of the National Election Commissions.

Following the establishment of the National Constitutional Review Commission (NCRC), in November 2023, the project has been actively supporting its mandate. This support includes hosting a small committee in February 2024 of the NCRC leadership and ten members, at the UNDP premises, to discuss and adopt the NCRC budget to be submitted to the Government. The government approved the submitted budget in May 2024, which is now awaiting approval from the National Legislature (TNLA).

The project organized and supported a five-day induction workshop for the NCRC facilitating its first full quorum meeting from January 22nd to 26th 2024. The workshop discussed, adopted, and internalized the basic internal operational documents of the NCRC, which included the NCRC action plan, the civic education plan, the budget, the organogram, and the internal rules of procedures.

Despite the formation of the NCRC almost a year after the passage of the CMP Act 2022, other mechanisms are still being established. Since November 2023, the NCRC has not begun substantive work on the constitution drafting process due to limited resources provided by the government. Additionally, the NCRC offices and facilities in Juba are currently unusable. Hence, the actual Constitution-making process, as per the NCRC leadership, will commence on an 18-month action plan adopted by the NCRC, upon receiving some financial resources from the government to launch the process of civic education and public consultations and appoint the Constitution Drafting Committee (CDC). The latter is expected to start by December 2024. The budget approved by the government amounts to USD 25 mil expected to cater for operations needs of the NCRC including salaries the NCRC, the twelve (12) national experts of the NCRC and day to day running of the commissions. Additionally, the National Assembly has approved fiscal budget 2024/25 in which a portion of this allocation is expected to support the NCRC needs but has not officially been disbursed to NCRC for utilization.

Additionally, the project has supported the NCRC in renovating its Juba-based office to have a convenient space from where commission would operate from. The construction and renovation work commenced in mid-May and were finalized in September. Additionally, the project has equipped the renovated premise with the supply of essential furniture and computers to facilitate the operational capacities of the commission; alongside provision full internet service across the NCRC offices.

During the reporting period, the project collaborated with the Ministry of Gender, Child, and Social Welfare and the Ministry of Youth and Sports together with Youth and Women leaders to finalize the development of the South Sudan Youth Charter. The Youth Charter final draft is under review and will be launched and disseminated towards the end of November across South Sudan to all relevant parties, specifically the National Constitution Review Commission and the Constitution Drafting Committee (CDC)-upon its establishment. The Youth Charter will be used as an advocacy tool to call and ensure youth rights are included in the permanent constitution.

In respect of the deployment of a Senior Gender Advisor to the Constitution Making Process bodies including the R-NCRC, the project finalized the onboarding and deployment of the Senior Gender Advisor in October 2024, to support the work of the constitution-making institutions including the NCRC to perform their mandated roles regarding constitution-making. The Gender Advisor will be responsible for mainstreaming gender into the content of the permanent constitution during the drafting process.

The project onboarded additional implementing partner- Centre for Inclusive Governance, Peace and Justice (CIGPJ) in September 2024 to support the capacity strengthening of the constitution-making process bodies including the NCRC and the Women Parliamentary Caucus (WPC) of the Transitional National Legislative Assembly (TNLA); support commissioning of four (4) position papers with women providing comparative analysis on contentious constitutional issues from a gender perspective; and continue strengthening the women-led coalitions for the Constitution Making Process established in Yei, Wau, Yambio, Torit, and Juba . The Women Coalition Networks conduct civic education, lobby for women participation, and will use the South Sudan Women's Charter to advocate for the inclusion of women's priorities in the Permanent Constitution with collective voice during the drafting process when commenced. In the same vein, the three (3) CSOs, through community outreaches, radio programmes and dialogues, were able to reach over 500,000 (51%F) with tailored messages on the process of and the importance of the

constitution as is linked to critical elements of the Revitalised Agreement on the Resolution of the Conflict in the Republic of South Sudan (R-ARCSS) of which the constitution is key.

At the community level, the project in collaboration with the Ministry of Gender, Child, and Social Welfare (MGCSW) and Ministry of Peace Building together with women leaders finalized the development of the South Sudan Women's Charter in May 2024 and was officially launched on 29th May 2024, followed by the production of 3,000 copies and their dissemination and distribution of a total of 2,200 copies. The distribution was done in partnership with UNMISS, Women Parliamentary Caucus, National Transformational Leadership Institute (NTLI) of the University of Juba, Ministry of Gender, Child and Social Welfare, and CSOs. The project made the Charter accessible online by publishing it at UN Women Africa publication site and facilitated the MGCSW to officially submit copies of the Charter to the NCRC, National Elections Commission (NEC), and Political Parties Council (PPC) on 30/09/2024.

The finalization and dissemination of the South Sudan Women's Charter ensures gender equality and women's empowerment. The Charter contains gender issues under twelve (12) thematic areas to be considered by the NCRC for inclusion in the constitution-making. The thematic areas include Women's participation in politics and public life; Education and Training; Marriage and Family; Property Ownership and Inheritance; Health and Reproductive Rights; Economic and Social Welfare Rights; Equality and Freedom from Discrimination; Special Protection of Elderly and Persons with Disabilities; Protection against Gender-Based Violence; Access to Justice; Environment, Natural Resources, and Climate Security; and Public Finance Management Reforms. Woman and youth also actively participated in the development of the Youth Charter to be validated in November 2024.

Through the provision of grant to the South Sudan Democratic Engagement Monitoring and Observation Program (SSUDEMOP), the project established women-led coalitions for the constitution-making process in Wau (Northern Bar-El-Ghazal State) and Yambio (Western Equatoria State) on 23rd – 24th January 2024 and Yei (Central Equatoria State) and Torit (Eastern Equatoria State) on 23rd – 24th February 2024. These locations were chosen because had not been considered in the previous awareness and in the end endeavour have the all the ten (10) states and three (3) and Administrative Areas are covered with awareness and civic education on the constitution. These coalitions are aimed at conducting civic education, lobbying for women's participation, and using the South Sudan Women's Charter to advocate for the inclusion of women's priorities in the Permanent Constitution with a collective voice. To ensure gender responsiveness and youth inclusion, the attendance evidence revealed that 50 (45F, 5M, including 19 youths aged 24 to 34) from 25 women and youth-focused CSOs participated in the establishment of the coalition in Wau, 56 (49F, 7M, including youths aged 21-34) from 25 women and youth-focused CSOs participated in Yei, and 51 (36F, 15M, including youths aged 18-34) from 25 women and youth-focused CSOs participated in Torit.

Moreover, a CSO was provide with a grant aimed to support the capacity strengthening of the constitution-making process bodies including the NCRC and the WPC, support commissioning of four (4) position papers with women providing comparative analysis on contentious constitutional issues from a gender and continue strengthening the women-led coalitions for the Constitution Making Process established in different locations to support engendering the Permanent Constitution Making Process by building capacities on gender-responsive CMP, issuing of position papers to influence inclusion of contentious gender issues, and guaranteeing women's meaning participation in the CMP with collective voice.

Constitutional Review Commission (NCRC) on November 3, 2023, as mandated by the Constitution Making Process Act of 2022. The NCRC was reformed to include 57 members plus one ex-officio member. Of the 57 members, 19 are female (including the Vice Chairperson), accounting for 33.5%, while 38 are male (including the Chairperson), making up 66.5%. This reconstitution of the NCRC represents a meaningful advancement at the institutional level in alignment with Outcome 1 of the project.
The reconstitution sets the stage for advancing the process of creating a permanent constitution. This includes conducting multi-phase civic education and public consultations on various constitutional issues, as well as recruiting members for the Constitutional Drafting Committee (CDC) responsible for drafting the constitutional text. As the main body overseeing the constitution-making process, the establishment of the National Constitutional Review Committee (NCRC) required broad support and consensus from key stakeholders. This reflects a collective commitment across political divides to work together in establishing a new constitution as the supreme governance framework for the country.
With partnership with the CSOs, and media organization through community outreaches, radio programmes and dialogues, were able to reach over 500,000 (51%F) with tailored messages on the process of and the importance of the constitution as is liked to critical elements of the Revitalized Agreement on the Resolution of the Conflict in the Republic of South Sudan (R-ARCSS) of which the constitution is key. For example, through partnership with Samaritan FM Radio, 1 new Women and 1 Youth listeners club were established in Pibor composed of 30 members (15 women and 15 youth). The listeners clubs have promoted have boosted women and youth participation in and through the media in Pibor in making sure that their voices are heard with reference to constitution making process.

This project aims to ensure the sustainability of its interventions and seeks to scale up the activities into the third phase of the constitution making process which involves the debate and final adoption of the permanent constitution by the Constituent Assembly and subsequent civic education. The project is being implemented in close collaboration with the government, particularly the MOJCA and R-NCRC and will continue to work with the additional statutory bodies like NCC. The NCRC are already seeking additional matching funds from the national consolidated fund and international donors giving them a greater stake in the success and sustainability of the process. Adopting the permanent constitution will end activities in the process of drafting it which will not need further support. The project will strengthen CSOs, the media, community structures and networks of women and youth groups. As such, the project will foster local ownership at the national, state and community level, increase the sustainability of the results long after the project ends and lay a foundation for open and democratic participation in governance and building a culture of constitutionalism in the future.

Also, to ensure sustainability, national organizations/CSOs, have been empowered to implement and advocate for an inclusive gendered constitution making process. For instance, through the project, the Union of Journalists of South Sudan (UJOSS) has gone ahead to strengthen its presence and network in eight states namely: Eastern Equatorial State, Western Equatorial State, Northern Bahr El Ghazal State, Western Bah El Ghazal State, Unity State, Upper Nile State, Warrap State and Jonglei States to bolster media monitoring and continued advocacy for a conducive media environment and the safety of journalists during the constitution making process and implementation of the peace agreement across the country.

To support sustainability for community radios, Pibor FM Radio staff were supported with a 7-day intensive training on basic journalism skills in news gathering, interviews and production to diversify information/data, to promote balanced reporting and use fact checking tools. In addition, they were supported with equipment such as editing software, computers, recorders e.t.c to improve production of news, information gathering and sharing information. The skills extended to the journalists has boosted better production and sharing of information, news desk and gender have been set-up at the station.

The NCRC has assumed office with significant delays since the passage of the CMP Act 2022 and the formation of the NCRC in November 2023, almost a year later. Moreover, the NCRC, since its formation on November 2023, has not yet started any substantive work concerning the constitution drafting process and this is attributed to the fact that the NCRC has no resources to utilize, as the government has not done disbursed funds for the operation of NCRC Hence, the actual Constitution making process, as per the NCRC leadership, will commence on an 18-month action plan adopted by the NCRC, upon finalizing the renovation works being conducted completed in September 2024 and receiving some financial resources from the government to launch the process of civic education and public consultations, and appoint the Constitution Drafting Committee (CDC). The NCRC is to practically commence actual activities on civic education neither the formation of the drafting committee.

Additionally, PBF support to the Constitution Making process in South Sudan remain the main largest contribution towards these efforts. Other bodies that have supported the CMP processes included IGAD and Japan, support of which was towards holding of capacity strengthening workshops for the NCRC. The activities relating to support to the Constitution Making process mechanisms will have to wait until such a time the mechanisms are formed. While this far, only the NCRC has been formed. The formation discussions on the formation of CDC has started to be started by March 2025. In this case, the project will be requesting a No Cost Extension to continue supporting the critical elements of the project beyond December 2024.
