Working with partners, UN Women will address the following key challenges:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There is a persistent demand for timely, reliable gender data in conflict and crisis settings, which is often missing. • Rapid assessments lack gender expertise and capacity, limiting their effectiveness. • Where available, gender data are usually incomplete, inadequate, irregularly collected, and often fail to reflect diversity and intersectionality. • Local women's organizations face barriers in engaging with the gender data ecosystem, limiting their influence and access.

	Envisioned Impact					
	<p>The ultimate impact of this project is that more women and girls will benefit from and participate in the gender-responsive humanitarian response and peace initiatives, as guided by gender analysis in crisis and conflict settings.</p> <p>By 2027, this project will increase the availability, analysis and use of high-quality, timely gender data in crisis and conflict settings. In the six pilot countries in this project, the data will drive gender-responsive policies and programming to address the needs of diverse women and girls in crisis-affected regions. Further, the project will make gender data on crisis and conflict easily accessible and encourage greater data use to the humanitarian coordination system, response stakeholders and peacebuilders. It will also drive transformative investment in gender data for greater insight into the diverse experiences of women and girls in crisis and conflict settings.</p>					
	Role of CRAF'd Funding					
<p>CRAF'd funding is integral to the success of this project through providing the human resources needed to implement the data collection and analysis in six pilot countries, develop an interactive gender data platform data in crisis and conflict, and engage in knowledge-sharing and capacity building with local and regional networks. While UN Women is well-positioned to lead this project, with partnerships spanning 1,600 women's organizations in crisis zones and a convening role on gender issues within the UN, the CRAF'd funding serves as a catalyst to boost this project which will eventually scale up into a global public good over time.</p>

Title	Text

Gaps and challenges to be addressed

- Demand for timely and reliable gender data in conflict and crises remains significant as such data is frequently absent.
- Existing data and analysis are scattered across various platforms, vary in quality and lack uniformity of the data that is being collected.
- System-wide rapid assessments often lack gender expertise and capacity to ensure its use is lacking.
- Even when gender data are available, they are often delayed or incomplete and fail to account for the diversity of women's and girls' experiences.
- Local women's organizations face significant barriers to amplify women's voices and engage with the gender data ecosystem on their own terms, thus their valuable expertise and contributions are not always sufficiently tapped into by other actors.

Urgency

- Gender data is essential for designing targeted interventions that address gender-based violence, health, economic security, and other critical and differentiated needs of women and girls. Without this data, humanitarian and peace efforts risk overlooking the gendered impact of crises and conflicts, leading to ineffective or inequitable responses.
- The urgency of addressing this gap is compounded by the fast-paced nature of emergencies, where timely data is crucial for quick decision-making. Without accurate, gender-specific data, interventions may fail to protect women and girls from increasing vulnerability during crises. The lack of such data can also undermine long-term recovery and resilience efforts, making it imperative to prioritize timely and reliable gender data collection in conflict and crisis settings.

Key deliverables

To address the above, the project will seek to deliver the following:

- Interactive web-platform presenting visual, dynamic high-quality, timely, and consistent gender data/analysis.
- Standardized methodology to produce Gender Analysis Reports on Crisis and Conflicts, so that they are available in the identified six contexts (standardization and quality assurance).
- Capacity building and capacity sharing of women's organizations and other humanitarian/WPS actors to produce and use gender data.

Scope

The time period under this project (24 months) is envisioned as an initial phase of a longer-term and sustained effort to address the above identified problems. Specifically, by 2027, UN Women and its partners will seek to ensure that high-quality, timely gender data and analysis is produced on a standardized basis and is used by key stakeholders at the global level and to inform gender-responsive policy and programming to meet the needs of diverse women and girls in conflict and crises settings such as CAR, Haiti, Myanmar, Sudan, the Occupied Palestinian Territory, and Lebanon and to promote investments in the collection and use of data in WPS and humanitarian action, including the participation of local women's organizations.

Stakeholders

- Women's organizations operating in conflict and crisis settings
- Donor community
- International organizations and UN agencies NGOs, research institutions and National Statistics Offices

UN Women will build on its long-lasting partnerships with local women's organizations, networks and the feminist movements, and leverage its membership in and function across inter-agency fora (such as the secretariat of the [Informal Experts Group on WPS](#), co-chair of the Inter-Agency Standing Committee's [Gender Reference Group](#), and others) to amplify what is produced through this initiative. UN Women will proactively also bring the voices and experiences of diverse women affected by conflicts and crises at the center of the highest levels of global decision-making and local level coordination mechanisms across the nexus in conjunction with its efforts to amplify the data and analysis generated through this initiative. In parallel, UN Women and its partners will also seek to raise awareness around the need for greater investment in this area of work amongst the donor community by using this project as best-practice example to showcase the value of generating gender data and analysis that can enable stakeholders to be more efficient and better target those most in need and furthest left behind amidst increasing needs and limited resources.

Assumptions

The project assumes that:

- During the project implementation period, geopolitical instability and safety issues in the six crisis/conflict setting are manageable and would not hinder data collection efforts.
- Women's rights organizations and women-led organizations, who are the major contributors to primary data collection, have the ability and readiness to strengthen their capacities in the data collection, analysis and use of gender data and analysis
- UN Women's Gender Analysis in Crisis and Conflict Settings Toolkit, serving as a standard methodology, and data quality assurance guidance will be utilized by UN Women and its partners to increase data quality and timeliness
- UN Women will have access to existing humanitarian data networks in the six crisis/conflict settings and engage them in this project
- Humanitarian response and peace actors that have access to reliable and timely gender data and analysis will utilize them to make informed decisions about addressing gender in humanitarian responses

If these assumptions remain in place, the logical framework of this project would be:

IF UN Women produces timely and quality gender data and analysis in crisis and conflict settings

THROUGH

A.1 utilizing standardized methodology and toolkit with needed contextualization to collect both quantitative and qualitative data to examine how crises/conflicts uniquely affect women, men, boys, girls and marginalized populations and their needs

THEN, the intermediate outcome 1 will increase the availability of timely and quality gender data and analysis to inform system-wide humanitarian, peace and security programming, and its policy engagement and advocacy of UN Women and its partners in humanitarian, peace and security related inter-agency initiatives and mechanisms

AND IF UN Women strengthens partnerships with local women's rights organizations and women-led organizations in conducting gender data collection, gathering their voices, and producing gender analysis in crisis and conflict settings

THROUGH

B.1 strengthening the technical capacities of local women's rights organizations and women-led organizations in gender data collection, analysis, and use

B.2 gathering their perspectives and assessment of gendered impacts and needs and consulting with them in data validation and recommendations

B.3 facilitating opportunities for local women's organizations to amplify these recommendations in key decision-making spaces such as Humanitarian Country Teams and peace negotiations

THEN, the intermediate outcome 2 will enhance the participation and leadership of humanitarian, peace and security actors, especially women's rights organizations and women-led organizations, in the global crisis data ecosystem enabling them to amplify their advocacy efforts, including with the donor community

ADDITIONALLY, IF UN Women produces a web-platform "Women Count in Crisis and Conflict" disseminating quality and timely gender data, analysis, and associated advocacy products with target communication strategies

C.1 disseminating quality and timely gender data, analysis, dashboards, and country profiles
C.2 targeted communication strategies

THEN, the intermediate outcome 3 will enhance public access to gender data and analysis in crises and conflict for use by humanitarian and peace and security actors for more effective, tailored, and gender-responsive humanitarian responses and peace

Overall, the impact would THEN be more women and girls benefit from and increasingly participate or lead in gender-responsive humanitarian response and peace initiatives guided by high quality gender analysis in crisis and conflict settings that will be consistently available.

Methodology

The methodology outlined in the toolkit in details follows a six-step process, with highlighted stages requiring more time and resources.

1. Plan: Defines the purpose, scope and intended use of the analysis in humanitarian and peace efforts in collaboration with key partners, avoiding duplication and leveraging strengths.

2. Find: secondary data review where gendered humanitarian data is readily available, reducing the need for primary data collection, particularly in high-risk situations. Technological tools, including Standard Data and Metadata eXchange (SDMX) where feasible, will support extraction and use of data.

3. Collect: multi-methods that integrate quantitative/qualitative data while ensuring ethical practices, including data protection. UN Women will use Toolkit resources, such as questionnaires or guides for Focus Group Discussions (FGDs) and Key Informant Interviews (KIIs), through the Kobo Toolbox to collect and analyze the data. These include:

o [Rapid Gender Assessment Surveys \(RGAs\)](#):

o *Qualitative Assessments:* FGDs and KIIs with Safety Audit Tools to assess risks and inform mitigation.

o *Secondary Data Review or Integration:* Data sources from national statistical systems, international organizations, humanitarian networks, and digital platforms.

o *Community-led Data Collection:* CSO proximity to local communities allows for faster access to affected populations and better contextual understanding.

4. Analyse: The gender analysis focuses on key areas of population and coverage, spatial and temporal scope, sectoral and thematic focus, intersectionality, and comparative analysis.

Descriptive and inferential statistics to identify trends, disparities, and gendered impacts. Cross-tabulations and correlation analysis will be undertaken to uncover relationships between key gender variables and crisis indicators. Comparative analysis will also be done to benchmark findings across different crisis contexts, ensuring lessons learned inform future interventions. STATA, R, or Python will be used to conduct the statistical analysis.

Data quality checks will ensure robustness of the estimates. Statistical tests on significant differences of means will also be conducted to inform the findings on the gender-differentiated impact of humanitarian and crisis setting.

At present, natural language processing models (NLP—LIAMA) are utilized within the UN Women's Arab States region for qualitative data analysis. Particularly for qualitative data, big data and AI techniques will be used to analyze the primary data collected, assess public sentiment and emerging issues, and track narratives around gender-specific impacts.

We are considering using:

1) Topic modelling (Latent Dirichlet Allocation) to identify the most pressing issues from the audio and/or text transcripts collected from the KII and FGD interviews.

2) Lexicon based sentiment analysis to assess public attitudes and emotions related to crisis response, policy decisions, and gender-sensitive issues.

Combining topic modelling with sentiment analysis, identifies thematic concerns and emotional responses to crisis.

o Intersectionality and comparative analysis: include topic modelling and sentiment analysis while incorporating metadata (e.g., location, gender) to understand how experiences differ by gender in humanitarian settings. This can extend to intersectional analysis (e.g., gender x age x region).

By integrating survey data, qualitative insights, and secondary sources, this approach will strengthen evidence-based decision-making for gender-responsive crisis response and recovery strategies.

4. Write: A gender analysis report will highlight trends and gaps, and provide actionable recommendations for crisis response across humanitarian and WPS coordination efforts. Templates available in the Toolkit will ensure clarity in reporting.

5. Share: The Women Count in Crises and Conflict site will use open, interoperable data standards to facilitate broad use. Data will be published in machine-readable formats (CSV, JSON, XML) with metadata documentation for usability..

The project will also include a case study of lessons learnt and recommendations for data protection and sharing protocol in humanitarian and conflict situations to help guide future initiatives. UN Women will also institute a systematic tracking of how the project data and outputs are being used to inform responses, including through the regular production of data stories.

Alignment with and Commitment to CRAF'd Principles

Prioritizing Needs and Inclusion of Crisis Affected Women and Girls

By working closely with women's organizations in conflict and crisis settings to prioritize the needs of women and girls, UN Women seeks to amplify the needs and voices of women and girls to drive meaningful, data-driven policy changes. This initiative emphasizes local capacity building and capacity sharing, equipping women's organizations with skills and tools needed to collect, analyze, and leverage gender data and analysis to advance their own priorities in humanitarian, peace & security decision making spaces.

Data Protection and Ethics

Having reliable data collected in line with methodological, safety and ethical standards, without putting women at greater distress and risk of violence is of utmost priority to UN Women whose processes are based on the highest standards of privacy and data protection as outlined in [UN Women's Personal Data Protection Policy](#), the [IASC Operational Guidance for Data Responsibility in Humanitarian Action 2023](#), the [UN Development Group key principles for data privacy, data protection and data ethics](#), and the [Principles Governing International Statistical Activities](#). Individual data collected about natural persons and legal entities, or small aggregates that are subject to national confidentiality rules, will be kept strictly confidential and be used exclusively for statistical purposes. Data collection tools, including surveys, shall require informed consent and the data collected will be stored in dedicated UN Women servers with high security measures.

Data Access

Provision of free, publicly accessible data and tools will be key, and the project will enable adaptations of new tools to specific contexts and user-groups generating new datasets. A standardized gender analysis methodology and toolkit that fills a current gap in the global gender data ecosystem, particularly as it pertains to protracted crises and conflict settings, will be available on UN Women's website and capacity-building forums, especially for women's organizations. Gender Alerts, interactive dashboards, and databases will feature on the 'Women Count in Crises and Conflict' public site, with datasets shared on regional websites, HDX and other platforms. The Women Count in Conflict site will ensure interoperability by leveraging the existing capacities of UN Women's Data Hub through the use of APIs and using the latest industry standards.

Sustainability and Co-Financing

While CRAF'd provides essential support, to ensure longer term sustainability of this initiative, we are actively seeking co-financing opportunities across a diverse donor community. The ability to mobilize resources during this phase will be crucial towards the sustainability and success of this initiative and UN Women will also seek to utilize the CRAF'd community to secure more awareness and support to this important area of work.

Enhance WPS/HA Data Collection

UN Women offers the CRAF'd Data Ecosystem significant new opportunities to expand its impact and use through the entities ongoing work in the gender data, humanitarian action and WPS spheres. At the same time, CRAF'd offers UN Women the opportunity to enhance its WPS/HA data collection and use methodologies to benefit the broader crisis/conflict response system.

UN Women's Approach

As a global thought leader on promoting gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls, UN Women has established lasting networks and collaborations with lead data providers, NGOs, research institutions and statistical offices. UN Women works in close partnership with other UN entities including OCHA, DPPA, DPO, OHCHR, WFP, UNFPA, UNHCR, IOM, UNDRR and WHO. Moreover, through the Women Count programme UN Women has built strong multi-sectorial partnerships, to reinforce the gender data ecosystem within national statistical systems. These initiatives are elaborated below.

i. Collaboration with national statistics offices

Utilizing its experience of working with NSOs in 99 countries and territories, UN Women will work closely with National Statistics Offices to:

- Provide training, technical support, and resources to ensure high-quality, relevant gender data to build capacity for gender data collection and analysis.
- Analyze national statistics laws worldwide to clarify how legal provisions support or hinder gender data production, access, and use. Utilizing this information to create legal frameworks to help countries modernize their statistical legislation and integrate gender-sensitive provisions
- Develop frameworks to Assessment of data and capacity gaps linked to gender statistics to inform national strategies for the development of statistics, ensuring that gender data is mainstreamed.
- Connect data producers with stakeholders and service providers who can leverage the data to drive impact.

ii. Close collaboration with grassroots women's organizations and networks

This coordination will enable women's organizations active engagement in the data ecosystem by building their capacity, levels of engagement in the decision-making processes of conflict/crisis response and improve their abilities to address the needs of the communities they serve.

iii. Global system leadership

As the lead entity in global coordination mechanisms on women, peace and security and as a member of Inter-Agency Standing Committee, UN Women is also at the center of promoting and monitoring the use of gender data and analysis to ensure that the specific needs of women and girls are identified and adequately addressed in any crisis response. This is done through UN Women's development of system wide policy, guidance and accountability mechanisms, as well as through ongoing provision of open-access data and analysis by UN Women itself.

iv. Data visibility

UN Women's existing data hub is one of the organization's most visited platforms and will be leveraged to present the data in accessible and user-friendly ways through dashboards and impact stories. This will facilitate greater data use and impact. Further, a dedicated conflict and crisis platform will be built on the data hub to drive attention to gender data in crisis settings and increase data availability alongside efforts to widely disseminate this information.

Data Platform

UN Women's data hub - 'Women Count in Crises and Conflict' - was created by the Women Count programme in 2019 and has evolved into one of the organization's most visited sites. In fact, it now constitutes one of the three pillars of UN Women's corporate digital presence. By presenting crisis and conflict data on this platform, and keeping it updated regularly, the project not only elevates the data created as part of this project but ensures its accessibility and visibility for a broad audience of data users as a timely and reliable resource for crisis and conflict gender data that the global community can use in gender-responsive planning, programming, and resources allocation. In addition, the datasets will be uploaded in HDX to enhance broad access and use of the data and information by the humanitarian system.

Leveraging Data Collection by Others

UN Women will leverage/joint assessments conducted by other actors minimizing duplication, risks, and costs. UN Women will contribute through analyzing datasets to identify the gendered impacts.

Data Maintenance and Quality Assurance

All data on UN Women's data hub is maintained through a combination of API integration and manual input. Dashboards will pull together data from official sources, combined with data collected by UN Women.

Increasing Accessibility

The Data Hub is currently mobile-responsive and designed according to ADA guidelines.

Open Data Principles

The Data Hub abides by open data principles with open access to datasets through downloadable CSV files, API to enhance access to our data and resources (in collaboration with UN Women's corporate digital team) and seamless integration, and publishing methodology providing access to metadata where available.

Plans to Sustain the Project Beyond CRAF'd Funding

UN Women will continue to advocate for the increased donor funding into highly practical planning tools such as the ones contained with this programme. Emphasising the research backed point that gender targeted programming and inclusion of crisis affected women and girls leads to more cost efficient and effective humanitarian response. Demonstrating the added value of this programme's approach through the success of this initial phase will provide a powerful proof of concept to encourage additional investment in the programme for replication in more crisis contexts worldwide.

Using diverse and representative datasets, audits, and aligning analysis with ethical principles will further reduce bias. Establishing robust data validation and quality assurance measures across the project enhances reliability, while fostering partnerships with women-led organizations will promote joint ownership and contextual relevance. Strict data protection protocols will safeguard privacy and security. Additionally, the project will invest in technical capacity to train and strengthen local expertise.</p>

Cost Effectiveness	<p>Cost Effectiveness</p> <p>By leveraging existing partnerships, including UN agencies, women-led organizations, as well as the expertise of global non-profit partners such as Kobo and iMMAP, UN Women will ensure economical use of resources to avoid any duplication of work.</p> <p>UN Women will also contribute funds available from global ongoing projects to share costs in addition to tapping into active country and regional level project with shared priorities around gender data and analysis. At the global level, this includes leveraging synergies with the 'Localized Gender Accountability in Humanitarian Crises – Phase II' project funded by the German Federal Foreign Office as well as with a 'Strategic Partnership Framework' programme covering work across the humanitarian-development-peace nexus supported by the Government of Sweden.
