This project aims to address grassroots peacebuilding challenges in West Darfur by establishing seven Community-Based Conflict Resolution Mechanism Committees (CBCRMs). The project is being implemented in the administrative units of Eish Barra, Tendelti, and Geneina—areas historically marked by instability and intercommunal tension. By restoring trust and confidence within and between communities, the initiative seeks to indirectly enhance security and stability in adjacent localities and border areas with Chad.

- 1. Operational CBCRMs: Community-based mechanisms actively resolving local conflicts.
- 2. Peace Dividends Delivered: Tangible benefits that encourage coexistence and collaboration.
- 3. **Women's Empowerment**: Inclusion of women's organizations, including pastoralist women, in peacebuilding platforms at local and state levels.

## Section 2: Executive Summary

This project was designed to foster peaceful coexistence and strengthen sustainable social cohesion among displaced populations, returnees, nomadic groups, and host communities in El Geneina Rural. Through a community-driven approach, the initiative implemented a series of integrated interventions aimed at addressing the root causes of conflict and promoting resilience.

Key achievements included:

- Establishment of 20 Community-Based Conflict Resolution Mechanisms (CBRMs) to mediate local disputes and foster reconciliation.
- Provision of livelihood support to women and youth groups, enhancing economic stability and reducing vulnerability to conflict.
- Rehabilitation of critical water sources and construction of market shelters to improve access to basic services and stimulate local trade.
- Development of a tree nursery with 30,000 gum Arabic seedlings, contributing to environmental restoration and income generation.

Despite ongoing tribal tensions and security challenges, SCO demonstrated adaptability by leveraging strong community engagement and strategic partnerships with El Geneina University and local authorities. These efforts not only ensured the successful implementation of project activities but also laid a solid foundation for long-term peacebuilding and sustainable development in the region.

## **Key Achievements**

- Formation and operationalization of CBCRMs in targeted administrative units.
- Successful village-level peace dialogue conferences engaging diverse community members.
- Inclusion of marginalized voices—especially youth, women, and elders—in conflict resolution discussions.
- Initiation of reconciliation efforts between farmers and pastoralists in highconflict zones like Gelow.

## **Key Challenges**

- Deep-rooted mistrust between tribal groups due to historical grievances and recent violence.
- Marginalization of native administration structures, weakening traditional conflict resolution pathways.
- Limited access to basic services (e.g., water, veterinary care, grazing land) fueling resource-based disputes.
- High criminal incidents in areas like Gelow, including the loss of key community leaders.

### **Lessons Learned**

- Bottom-up approaches are more effective than centralized peace conferences in fostering genuine dialogue.
- Community ownership of peace processes increases participation and sustainability.
- Addressing livelihood and service gaps is essential to reducing conflict triggers.
- Empowering local mediators and traditional leaders can restore trust and strengthen reconciliation efforts.

#### Section 4: Inclusion

The project prioritized inclusive participation across all community segments to ensure equitable access to peacebuilding and development benefits:

- Women: 78 women were actively engaged in Community-Based Conflict Resolution Mechanisms (CBRMs). They also received goat loans and support for income-generating activities (IGAs), enhancing their economic resilience and leadership roles.
- Youth: Young people were supported through access to farmland and vocational tools, empowering them with productive livelihoods and reducing their vulnerability to conflict.
- **Pastoralists & Farmers**: Both groups were intentionally included in peacebuilding dialogues and livelihood interventions, fostering mutual understanding and reducing resource-based tensions.
- **Environment**: A tree nursery was established, producing and distributing 30,000 gum Arabic seedlings to promote environmental restoration and sustainable land use.

## Section 5: Partnerships

Strategic partnerships were instrumental in the successful implementation and sustainability of project activities:

- Local Authorities: Collaborations with El Geneina locality and administrative units in Eish Bara and Tendalti ensured alignment with local governance structures.
- **Academic Institutions**: El Geneina University's Peace & Development Research Center provided technical guidance and research support for community engagement and conflict analysis.

- **Technical Partners**: The National Forestry Corporation (NFC) contributed expertise in environmental rehabilitation and tree nursery development.
- **Community Stakeholders**: CBRMs, women and youth groups, and resistance committees played central roles in mobilization, facilitation, and local ownership of project outcomes.
