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

The Terms of References (ToRs) for the steering committee were developed in February 2022 and two calls for the first steering committee meeting were attempted, the main objective of which was to approve the ToRs and schedule subsequent meetings. Unfortunately, the meetings coincided with security instability in Blue Nile state which did not allow the government participants to attend to those planned meeting and hence the meetings were cancelled. The high turnover in the government staff at state and federal levels interrupted the formation of the steering committee.

However, the project partners collaborated with different entities of government in the rollout of the project throughout the project lifetime. This included the Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) to facilitate access to project sites by agencies and implementing partners (IPs) via issuance of local government travel permits; the State Ministry of Production and Economic Resources, including Forest National Corporation (FNC), to provide technical guidance, extension services and seedling production in the rollout of agricultural related livelihoods; the State Ministry of Welfare Affairs to provide technical guidance in the rollout of women empowerment activities of the project; and the Wali's office for regular updates on project activities and to solicit support to overcome some challenges that the IPs faced during project implementation. Some of the IPs being locals/nationals directly coordinated their activities with the police administration at State level as well the prosecutors and judiciary authorities at locality level.

The project significantly advanced community well-being, gender equality, and peacebuilding in Blue Nile State. About 71% of households reported increased income (56% men, 44% women), and 75% noted improved access to socio-economic services (46% men, 54% women). A total of 32 natural resource disputes were resolved resulting in 33.9% decline in resource conflict, 83% of residents expressed positive perceptions of other resource users, and 77% felt their interests were represented in local peace and governance processes, reflecting broad progress in inclusion and social cohesion.

Fifteen women-led organizations joined community committees, enabling 102 women to engage with local councils on women's priorities. This engagement strengthened gender-based violence (GBV) prevention networks, improved survivor referral systems, and expanded women's influence in decision-making on peacebuilding and natural resource management (NRM). Key drivers of these outcomes included targeted capacity-building workshops on leadership, negotiation, advocacy, and GBV response, along with community awareness campaigns through radio programs in local languages linking gender equality with sustainable NRM. Four policy dialogue forums with one held at State level, connected communities to justice institutions, enhancing women's advocacy and negotiation skills. Attended by 279 women (61%) and 175 men (39%), the forums showcased strong local demand for inclusive governance and women's participation in peace processes.

Communities reported improved access to justice awareness from 25% to 31.6% with 57.7% reporting better access for women, particularly for women, and a decline in resource-based conflicts through traditional mediation. GBV prevention initiatives increased awareness and reduced incidents, while socioeconomic stability improved through expanded access to health, water, and livelihood services. These gains enhanced social cohesion and community trust across the State.

A third policy dialogue brought together women's groups, police, and legal actors to address women's access to justice. As a result, government institutions endorsed a women-led initiative to support female prisoners, marking growing recognition of inclusive justice and women's rights. Due to insecurity in Bau and Geissan, planned peace centers and water yards were replaced with high-impact alternatives. The Samsur Health Centre was fully equipped to provide essential health services, and two tractors were supplied to strengthen agricultural productivity and food security. Through six cooperative committees, 300 women held monthly savings and loan meetings, investing in bread-making, food processing, and crop production. These initiatives boosted household income, strengthened solidarity, and empowered women as economic leaders and peace agents. In Deim Saad and Samsur, 50 women managed communal farms, cultivating vegetables and tree seedlings—activities that promoted financial independence, reduced GBV vulnerability, and eased pressure on natural resources.

Youth were equally engaged. In Alkaili and Gambrda, 100 young people operated Show Clubs, earning income through sports broadcasting while providing safe spaces for inter-community dialogue. Additionally, 61 youth (57% women) completed vocational and life skills training, with women preferring stove-making due to accessibility and safety concerns.

Six local women's peacebuilding dialogues, engaging 300 participants, provided platforms to address hate speech, promote social harmony, and strengthen women's leadership. Facilitated by cooperative and Community Management Committees (CMCs), these discussions enhanced women's confidence and collective action for peace. Although a planned state-level dialogue was postponed due to insecurity, the local sessions demonstrated the effectiveness of community-led dialogue in preventing conflict.

The project established Community Environmental Action Planning Committees (CEAPs), later merged into CMCs, with 145 members and an average 53% female representation. These structures, active in Kurmuk, Bau, and Geissan, became central to community governance and implementation oversight.

CEAPs developed 32 environmental action plans, implemented 11, and produced six participatory maps guiding natural resource management. These tools fostered community ownership and serve as advocacy instruments for integrating local priorities into government planning. Six Peacebuilding Committees complemented this work through storytelling, dialogues, and sports events that promoted social cohesion. Endline results showed conflict prevalence declining from 43.1% to 33.9%, and 77% of residents confirmed that their interests were represented in governance processes.

A climate-security-gender assessment revealed that women are disproportionately affected by both conflict and environmental shocks such as irregular rainfall and flooding, the report is disseminated through the official UNEP Sudan Facebook page, UNEP Africa official Facebook, official UNEP corporate X/Twitter account, and UNEP Africa Twitter account. It proposed six strategic actions: • Facilitate local peace dialogues. • Promote climate-smart, sustainable livelihoods. • Support ecosystem restoration through community conservation. • Strengthen inclusive natural resource governance. • Enhance GBV protection and legal literacy. • Foster transboundary environmental cooperation.

Peace Committees held Open Days for Peace in six locations, attracting 5,100 participants (two-thirds women and girls). These gatherings promoted dialogue and trust among internally displaced persons and host communities, mitigating tensions linked to conflict movements. The project's achievements are reflected in the strong participation of women and youth in peacebuilding, the creation of inclusive governance structures (CEAPs and CMC committees), sustainable livelihoods, and improved justice and protection systems. By integrating women and youth into decision-making and resource management, the project has laid a sustainable foundation for resilient, equitable, and peaceful communities across Blue Nile State.

The project significantly enhanced the participation of women and youth in inclusive, community led structures—such as the Community Environmental Action Planning (CEAP) Committees (53% women), Community Management Committees (CMCs, 53% women), and women's cooperatives (100% women). These platforms have strengthened local governance, promoted socio-economic stability, and contributed to conflict resolution and peacebuilding across the three localities in Blue Nile State.

Despite the ongoing crisis, these gender-balanced and youth-led bodies played a central role in implementing community activities and reinforcing members' leadership and decision-making capacities.

Women were trained on Gender-Based Violence (GBV) prevention, access to justice, and natural resource management, and supported through small ruminant restocking and seedling nurseries. Six women cooperatives were formed to overcome financial barriers and promote collective entrepreneurship. These cooperatives and nursery enterprises have become vital income-generating ventures, enhancing women's financial independence and contributing to household resilience and local economic growth.

Women's engagement in decision-making has expanded markedly. They now represent 38% of peacebuilding committee members, compared with previous all-male representation, while CEAP committees include over 50% women, and all cooperatives are women-led. Women's participation in traditionally male-dominated native administrations has also grown, breaking gender norms and transforming community leadership dynamics. In Geissan locality, training on natural resource management and access to justice doubled the number of women claiming their rights from 15 to 30. This created new opportunities for women and strengthened their protection and social standing within their communities.

Historically, community governance was dominated by elders within the native administration. Through CEAP and CMC structures, youth and women now play leading roles in planning, implementation, and conflict resolution. Youth leaders, once marginalized, are increasingly shaping community priorities and driving inclusive governance, introducing innovation, accountability, and collaboration at the grassroots level.

The project contributed to improved productivity and household food security through diversified livelihood activities. One-third (33.3%) of women trained in mobile maintenance reported increased income; all 25 women trained in fuel-efficient stove production established income-generating activities; and 20% of agricultural seed recipients (sorghum, okra, cowpea) were women. These interventions enhanced women's economic participation and strengthened family resilience against shocks.

Women's growing economic and leadership roles have driven broader social transformation, fostering intercommunity collaboration, reducing gender-based discrimination, and advancing peacebuilding. As a result, women's voices are now more visible and influential in community dialogue and planning.

A total of 390 women completed literacy training, gaining essential reading and writing skills that enable them to communicate effectively, express their concerns, and participate more confidently in community decision-making and resource management.

The project supported participatory two-dimensional mapping in six communities, producing visual maps that captured local resources and future development plans. The inclusive exercise brought together youth, women, and elders from all ethnic groups, combining traditional knowledge with future perspectives.

The process revealed rich but underutilized natural resources, underscoring the need for capacity building in sustainable resource management, particularly forest and non-timber products. The maps now serve as tools for joint community planning, peacebuilding, and linking communities with local authorities and credit institutions. The exercise also promoted community awareness of their resource base and strengthened collective ownership. Communities can now easily identify and illustrate their resources, development priorities, and plans, making them better equipped to engage in participatory planning and advocate for their needs.

Traditionally, local administration and peacebuilding structures in the region were exclusively male dominated, with women having little to no representation. Before the project's intervention, peacebuilding committees were 100% male. However, the project's inclusive approach has led to significant progress: women now make up 38% of peacebuilding committees across the three localities. In community-based organizations, women's representation has also drastically improved, CEAP committees now comprise over 50% women, and cooperative groups are entirely female-led. This marks a substantial shift toward women's leadership and economic empowerment.

In addition to advancing gender equality, the project has fostered youth leadership. While previously, elder community members primarily led local initiatives, young people are now taking active roles in governance and advocacy

Testimony from Gisma Omer, a 28-year-old CEAP and CMC member from Derang, Bau locality, highlights the personal and collective impact of the project:

"Before this project, women lived in fear, silenced by war, gender-based violence (GBV), and harmful social norms. There was little awareness, no support systems, and survivors were often ignored."

Through participating in training workshops and dialogue forums, Gisma gained knowledge about GBV laws, referral systems, and survivor services. She also developed leadership, advocacy, and negotiation skills, which empowered her to:

- Join community-based protection networks
- Engage in local governance
- Raise GBV awareness during public gatherings (e.g., weddings, funerals)
- Coordinate with justice actors to support survivors

Motivated by this transformation, Gisma and other women established a feminist group in Derang, creating safe spaces for dialogue, support, and strategizing. These informal coffee gatherings inspired by project dialogues—now function as grassroots platforms where women share experiences and build community resilience.

The group also aligns its advocacy with broader community priorities, such as natural resource management and social stability, making women's empowerment central to peacebuilding and development.

Gisma concludes with a call to action:

"Women in Derang have broken the cycle of silence and fear. We now advocate for our rights and support each other. I urge that these initiatives be expanded to other conflict-affected areas in the Blue Nile region, so more women can gain the tools and support they need to thrive."
