- 1.The Department of Agriculture to render technical assistance in overseeing the establishment and management of three community vegetable garden schemes.
- 2. The Project has engaged the Department of Livestock Services, and a Letter of Agreement has been signed to rehabilitate livestock drinking points to strengthen and improve sustainable management of livestock grazing areas within and between Communities (host and mobile) of high tension of conflict between crops and livestock farmers, impacted by climate change.
- 3. The Project has also signed a Letter of Agreement (LoA) with the Department of Cooperative Development (DoCD) to provide technical expertise and institutional support in the formation and strengthening of farmer cooperative societies. They will provide capacity building for cooperative Societies on cooperative management, financial literacy and marketing strategies.
- 4. Within the same context WFP signed a MoU with the Department of Community Development (DCD) to carry out the following activities: Activities1.1.1; 1.1.2; 1.1.3 and 1.2.2:
- 5. WFP requested technical support from UNFPA to deliver the training for relevant government officials from the Department of Community Development and Ministry of Gender who are expected to conduct community level training. This effort effectively contributes to strengthening partnership between the UN agencies.
- 6. During the month of May 2025, IOM engaged with the National Disaster Management Agency (NDMA) for the design of the Community-Based Disaster Risk Reduction (CBDRR) training.
- 7. IOM engaged with the Department of Livestock Services in the implementation of the national stakeholder consultation on 1 July, the regional stakeholder consultations from 18 to 27 August, training for enumerators and piloting of data collection for Transhumance Tracking Tool (TTT) on 10, 11 and 15 September 2025.
- 8. In the course of the national and regional stakeholders consultations abovementioned, a wide range of government institutions were engaged, including the DLS, Ministry of Environment, Climate Change and Natural Resources, Police, Gambia Immigration Department, NDMA, National Coordinating Organization for Farmer Associations (NACOFAG), University of The Gambia, National Early Warning and Response Mechanism Coordinating Centre (NCCRM), Ministry of Fisheries and Water Resources, Gambia Bureau of Statistics (GBoS), Department of Forestry, Kerewan Area Council, Kuntaur Area Council, and the governors of the North Bank Region (NBR), Central River Region (CRR) and Lower River Region (LRR).
- 9. In April 2025, IOM conducted consultations with the Department of Community Development (DCD) to discuss design of community engagement activities on sharing knowledge and experience relating to land-related conflicts and climate change impacts.

Largely, significant progress has been registered during the reporting as engagement of communities, signing of Letters of Agreement and activity implementation and contracts with different entities have been undertaken, given the multiple-stakeholder involvement in the project. Capacity buildings, assessment of community intervention sites, and establishment of livelihood infrastructures have started in earnest.

For Outcome 1, the community dialogues and tree-planting exercises were conducted in 10 target communities to reinforce trust in and the functioning of existing local mechanisms. TTT was rolled out with the mapping of transhumance corridors and conflict hot spots at the national and regional levels, and with training of enumerators and a pilot data collection in the field. In the course of these activities, at least 8 land-related conflicts were mentioned and discussed with government parties, CSOs and the communities, reinforcing the conflict management. Through the TTT roll-out, training of 10 regional government staff members was conducted and the data collection in the field commenced on 1 November 2025, enhancing the data collection capacity of the local government of NBR, CRR and LRR. Also, through the community-based Disaster Risk Reduction ToT and step-down trainings, disaster risk management capacity of 30 staff members of the Regional Disaster Management Committees and 57 community members was strengthened.

For Outcome 2, the assessment of potential communities for the construction of dykes and causeways has been done and is under-review to pave the way for implementation of the activity. In addition the establishment of the three community gardens is in progress to enhance the lives and livelihoods of the beneficiaries.

The baseline survey and rapid assessment have both shown the impact of climate change on women in the rural communities of the Gambia. For instance, these assessments have shown that productive lands are reducing over time due to salt intrusion causing pressure on available arable land. Women and youths are disproportionately affected due to competing needs of the arable land, including climate-induced migrants for agriculture and livestock for pasture.

Therefore, subsequent reports will indicate the number of women and youth reached/participated in activities, as drivers of change. The implementing agencies will mainstream gender considerations into the training curricula and adequate representation of women in leadership positions at community levels.

In the community-based disaster risk reduction step-down training, IOM ensured at least 50% of women's participation to incorporate female participation in the disaster risk reduction effort in the communities. There were 8 male and 12 female participants in CRR, 6 male and 14 female in LRR, and 9 male and 10 female in NBR. In the community engagement activities (Activity 1.3.3), IOM encouraged female participation to ensure their voices are heard and influenced the discourse of peace between and among the communities and had 61% of the female participants in 10 target communities.
The CBPP training facilitated the participation of 35% of women from the different government institutions.

The assessment was conducted by IOM from 4 to 14 May 2025. While the 10 target communities in NBR, CRR and LRR are experiencing significant climate impacts such as extreme weather, reduced agricultural yields, water scarcity, biodiversity loss and increase in waterborne diseases, the communities are eager to adopt practical and localized solutions that will increase their resilience to climate change. The identified practices include the farming, water conservation and disaster preparedness. They are not only necessary for immediate adaptation but also for building long-term sustainable livelihoods and ecosystems. The communities identified that the necessary activities include trainings in climate-smart agriculture with provision of farming tools and seeds especially for small scale farmers. installation/rehabilitation of water infrastructure such as boreholes and distribution systems to promote efficient irrigation practices, trainings on community-based disaster risk management and improving early warning systems, reforestation and agroforestry, health education on climate change, and climate change awareness campaign. Moving forward, a collaborative approach involving local governments, NGOs and international partners is essential for ensuring that
