**The project has continued to strengthen engagement with government counterparts to advance women's leadership in peacebuilding. In partnership with the Peace Commissioner, the project trained 30 women peacebuilders in July 2025, equipping them with practical skills and knowledge to combat hate speech and address trauma within their communities. These women are now actively leading local initiatives to raise awareness of hate speech—one of the key drivers of the ongoing conflict—while fostering dialogue, tolerance, and social cohesion.**

**In addition, they are leveraging their new capacities to promote mental health awareness, helping to destigmatize psychosocial challenges and encouraging affected individuals to seek support. Through these actions, the project is directly contributing to the Women, Peace and Security (WPS) agenda by strengthening women's agency and leadership in conflict prevention, promoting community resilience, and advancing inclusive approaches to peacebuilding and social healing.**

**In August, the project engaged with the Directorate of Combating Violence Against Women, through which an intergovernmental technical team was established to develop an Action Plan for the implementation of the Framework of Cooperation on Conflict-Related Sexual Violence (CRSV). The drafting of the Action Plan was finalized in September 2025.**

**This Action Plan is particularly significant in the current context in Sudan, where the ongoing conflict has increased the vulnerability of women and girls to sexual and gender-based violence. It provides a concrete framework for national authorities to strengthen prevention, protection, and accountability measures, enhance inter-agency coordination, and ensure the provision of survivor-centered support services.**

**Importantly, the CRSV Action Plan also represents a key milestone in advancing the Women, Peace and Security (WPS) agenda in Sudan. It operationalizes core commitments under UNSCR 1325 and related resolutions by promoting women's protection and participation in peace and security processes, and by reinforcing state responsibility to address sexual violence as a critical peace and security issue.**

**The WPS advisor was recruited and assumed her role in January 2025. Upon assuming her duties, she engaged in developing strategic relationships with relevant actors within the UN agencies, government, the civil society organizations and the office of the UN personal envoy on Sudan among others. Further she established important inter-agency coordination structures including the Gender Thematic Working Group (GTWG), which is a technical team comprised of all UN agencies in Sudan with a mandate to enhance coordination of UN country team efforts on gender mainstreaming and women's empowerment. The working group meets monthly.**

**To ensure that the WPS agenda is accorded appropriate attention, a Women Peace and Security Task Team was formed as a specialised reference group on WPS operating under the GTWG. The task team's role is to provide a platform for strategic advocacy and positioning of the WPS agenda, and enhance integration in the triple nexus. The task team meets monthly with a current membership of 12 UN agencies.**

**To support UN response to the rampant conflict related sexual violence in Sudan, the Advisor revived the MARA working group which serves as a mechanism to ensure monitoring and documentation of CRSV cases in Sudan. In August 2025, in collaboration with the Office of the SRSG on Conflict Related Sexual Violence, the Advisor coordinated and facilitated efforts for the development of the action plan for the implementation of the framework of cooperation between the government of Sudan and the UN on the prevention and response to CRSV that was signed in April 2025.**

**A no-cost extension was granted in October 2025 to extend the project end date from 5 October 2025 to 29 January 2026 to cover the WPS Advisor's one-year contract following some initial delays to recruitment. This involved a minor re-programming of funds from activities under outputs 4.1 and 4.2, which could not be implemented due to the absence of a peace process in Sudan.**

**UNDP has potentially secured a USD 3 million grant from Norway to sustain the WPS Advisor's position in the RCO for two years following the expiry of the PBF funding on 29 January 2026.**

**The re-programmed Outcome 4, aimed at enhancing women's empowered participation in peacebuilding processes in Sudan through advancing the Women, Peace and Security Agenda, has demonstrated significant progress, underscoring the potential for meaningful impact on the ground. By enhancing gender mainstreaming within UNCT processes, notable strides have been made, including the establishment of a Gender Thematic Working Group comprising representatives from all UN agencies in Sudan, as well as the successful mainstreaming of gender perspectives in the development of the UN Interim Cooperation Framework, and Programme Criticality Framework for Khartoum – providing a critical foundation for the UNCT to address gender-specific challenges and promote women's participation in peace processes.**

**To strengthen attention on women peace and security, a Women Peace and Security Task Force was formed in May 2025 as a specialized team operating within the Gender Thematic Working Group. The Task force comprises of 12 UN agencies, designed to foster a more coordinated and effective approach to delivering on the WPS agenda in Sudan, thereby reinforcing the existing efforts to integrate gender perspectives in humanitarian, peacebuilding and development responses.**

**WPS capacities for 174 UNCT staff and partners were built within the reporting period. Sessions with tailor-made content were conducted with the PSEA network members, programme teams in UNHCR, and PBF and MPTF team members reaching 174 participants (150 women and 24 men), who received knowledge and practical skills on WPS and its importance in the current context of Sudan, including gender analysis, planning, monitoring and reporting.**

**Sudanese women peacebuilders at the local and diaspora level learned and networked with women peacebuilders from similar contexts such as Libya, South Sudan, and DRC, through a virtual networking and lesson learning event. Networking is critical for enhanced coordination among WPS practitioners, and will empower the WPS agenda and women's participation in Sudan's peace processes. Lessons learned sessions will contribute to ensuring that future WPS activities have greater impact.**

**30 women peacebuilders are actively leading local initiatives to raise awareness on hate speech—one of the key drivers of the ongoing conflict—while fostering dialogue, tolerance, and social cohesion. This is thanks to a training carried out in partnership with the Peace Commissioner that equipped these women with practical skills and knowledge to combat hate speech and address trauma within their communities.**

**In addition, these women are leveraging their new capacities to promote mental health awareness, helping to destigmatize psychosocial challenges and encouraging affected individuals to seek support. Through these actions, the project is directly contributing to the WPS agenda by strengthening women's agency and leadership in conflict prevention, promoting community resilience, and advancing inclusive approaches to peacebuilding and social healing.**

**In August, the project engaged with the Directorate of Combating Violence Against Women, through which an intergovernmental technical team was established to develop an Action Plan for the implementation of the Framework of Cooperation on Conflict-Related Sexual Violence (CRSV). The drafting of the Action Plan was finalized in September 2025.**

**This Action Plan is particularly significant in the current context in Sudan, where the ongoing conflict has increased the vulnerability of women and girls to sexual and gender-based violence. It provides a concrete framework for national authorities to strengthen prevention, protection, and accountability measures, enhance inter-agency coordination, and ensure the provision of survivor-centered support services.**

**Importantly, the CRSV Action Plan also represents a key milestone in advancing the WPS agenda in Sudan. It operationalizes core commitments under UNSCR 1325 and related resolutions by promoting women's protection and participation in peace and security processes, and by reinforcing state responsibility to address sexual violence as a critical peace and security issue.**

**To commemorate the 25th anniversary of UN Security Council Resolution 1325, the project through the WPS taskforce partnered with the Ministry of Social Welfare to organize a commemoration event on 29 October 2025 which brought together 25 women leaders from different states including Kassala, Khartoum, Northern state, Gadaref, al Jazeera and the Darfur region.**

The event highlighted the pivotal role of women in peacebuilding and conflict resolution, while raising awareness of the WPS agenda among government institutions, civil society, and UN agencies. By fostering dialogue and reaffirming collective commitments, the commemoration served as a platform to strengthen national ownership and accountability for advancing the implementation of the WPS agenda in Sudan.

The WPS Advisor also facilitated women-focused consultations with the Office of the Personal Envoy on Sudan, ensuring that women's voices and priorities informed the ongoing peace process. These consultations created a critical platform for diverse Sudanese women to articulate their perspectives on peace, security, and governance, thereby advancing the principle of inclusive and gender-responsive peacebuilding.

On 12 September 2025, the WPS Advisor briefed 13 Heads of Mission accredited to Sudan on the situation of women in the country, which secured concrete commitments from participating missions to apply diplomatic leverage to promote women's inclusion in political dialogues, advocate for accountability on conflict-related sexual violence, and explore avenues for sustained support to women's organizations. It also triggered donor interest in funding the WPS Advisor position beyond the closure of the PBF project.

To further strengthen the evidence base and policy engagement around the WPS agenda, the Advisor authored two analytical papers: a policy paper on women's participation in ceasefire diplomacy and a Sudan WPS profile. These publications contribute to advancing the WPS agenda by generating knowledge, informing advocacy, and guiding strategic actions to enhance women's leadership and protection in Sudan's peace and security processes.

**The project has significantly contributed to strengthening accountability, ownership, and coordination for the implementation of the Women, Peace and Security (WPS) agenda in Sudan.**

At the UN level, the project has fostered greater institutional commitment, with an increasing number of agencies actively integrating WPS priorities into their programming. To commemorate the 25th anniversary of the WPS agenda, eight UN agencies jointly conducted consultations with 120 women from different backgrounds and states to capture their priorities and demands for peace and security. In addition, three agencies provided financial contributions, while three others offered technical expertise to support the national commemorative event—demonstrating a growing ownership, shared responsibility and collaboration across the UN system on the WPS agenda

At the government level, the project's engagement has strengthened political will and accountability for WPS implementation. This is reflected in the Government's signing of the Framework of Cooperation on Conflict-Related Sexual Violence (CRSV) and its active participation in developing the corresponding national implementation plan. Furthermore, the Government has formally requested UN support to revise its National Action Plan on WPS, signaling renewed national ownership and commitment to advancing women's protection, participation, and leadership in peace and security processes.

Through these achievements, the project has created impact by reinforcing the institutional foundations and partnerships necessary to translate the WPS agenda into tangible action and sustainable peace outcomes in Sudan.
