While the Transitional Justice (TJ) Project does not have a dedicated Steering Committee, an overarching Steering Committee exists for all Peacebuilding Fund (PBF)-funded projects in South Sudan. In addition, the Access to Justice and Human Rights Program in UNDP has a Board co - chaired by the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs and UNDP. The Board met on 29 October 2025. The PBF supported project has a Technical Working Group composed of UNMISS HRD, UNHCR, UNDP and the PBF Secretariat. The Portfolio Board meeting deliberated on key issues including the gains made in different sectors including support to mobile courts, the GBV Court in Juba, the Constitution Making Process and the developments in transitional justice.

In addition to the Steering Committee meeting, the TJ Working Group also convened on 2 May, 5 September, and 27 October 2025. However, meetings became intermittent due to disruptions following the national lockdown after the house arrest of Dr. Riek Machar and subsequent conflict in Upper Nile. The first Working Group meeting, attended by UNHCR, UNDP, OHCHR, and the RCO, reviewed project progress by each entity and discussed strategies for implementation in 2025. Key among the discussions was an assessment of the Government's steps toward establishing the CTRH and CRA. The project partners reaffirmed their commitment to increased engagement with the Government to ensure progress toward these goals by the end of the project cycle. Nevertheless, the heightened political tensions were anticipated to cause delays in implementation and challenges in government engagement. The TWG meeting also reviewed important developments and follow-up actions by the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs regarding the implementation of the Commission on Truth, Reconciliation and Healing Act, 2024 and the Compensation and Reparations Act, 2024. It is hoped that as the political and security environment stabilizes, project implementation will continue more effectively and deliver on its intended outcomes.

At the technical level, two meetings were held among UNDP, UNHCR, and UNMISS Human Rights Division, with the latter meeting joined by the PBF Secretariat. Discussions focused on project implementation, acceleration, and a proposal to repurpose funds originally allocated for the establishment and operationalization of the CTRH and CRA. Agreement was reached to redirect these resources toward communications, enhanced support to victims and survivors, and further assistance to the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs in operationalizing the CTRH and CRA. The meetings also discussed strategized on the technical support to the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs. Agreements were made to secure the former Executive Secretary of the Gambia Truth Reconciliation and Reparations Commission. He was in Juba in July and August 2025 and managed to draft key guiding documents for the proposed transitional justice mechanisms.

Over the reporting period, the Transitional Justice Project has engaged extensively with the Government of South Sudan at national and subnational levels, primarily through the executive and legislative branches.

The project worked closely with the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs (MoJCA)—its principal government counterpart—alongside the Ministry of Peacebuilding and the Ministry of Cabinet Affairs. Engagements focused on advancing key transitional justice priorities, including finalizing rules of procedure for the Commission for Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) and the Compensation and Reparations Authority (CRA), and developing a national dissemination plan for both Acts.

High-level consultations were held between the Minister of Justice, senior MoJCA officials, and leadership from UNDP and UNMISS HRD. A dedicated Task Force (UNDP, UNMISS HRD, and the AU) met approximately nine times to support the selection of the three Non-South Sudanese Commissioners. A shortlist was submitted to MoJCA for onward transmission to the Revitalized Transitional National Legislative Assembly (R-TNLA) for vetting and final appointment by the President.

The project also maintained structured engagement with the National Legislative Assembly, particularly the Specialized Committees on Peace, Reconciliation, and Human Rights. These engagements supported the development of rules and procedures for the CTRH and CRA and strengthened legislative oversight. Through PBSO-supported UNDP activities, two capacity-building sessions were conducted for committee members, led by the former Executive Director of the Gambia Truth, Reconciliation and Reparations Commission. These sessions enhanced the Assembly's readiness to fulfil its role in selecting the seven South Sudanese Commissioners.

The project further facilitated dialogue between legislators, executive ministries, and civil society networks, enabling the nomination and confirmation of the Selection Committee required under the CTRH Act. Following consultations supported by UNDP and UNMISS HRD, the President endorsed the Committee in October 2025, after which MoJCA announced its formal commencement with a 30-60-day mandate.

At the subnational level, the project engaged the State Human Rights Commission in Malakal. These engagements increased awareness among local stakeholders—including youth groups, women's networks, persons with disabilities, and legal practitioners—on the transitional justice framework and the roles of upcoming mechanisms.

These coordinated engagements strengthened government ownership of the transitional justice agenda, improved alignment between executive, legislative, and civil society actors, and reinforced national capacity to operationalize the CTRH and CRA.

The project is not on track for the timely completion of several key outputs, despite notable progress across most planned activities. The primary delays relate to the establishment and operationalization of the Commission on Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) and the Compensation and Reparations Authority (CRA)—the two core transitional justice mechanisms central to the project's objectives.

Although important preparatory milestones have been achieved—including enactment of the CTRH and CRA Acts, formation of the Selection Committee, and development of operational guidelines—the critical step of appointing the seven Commissioners (four South Sudanese and three Non-South Sudanese) remains pending presidential endorsement. This process has extended far beyond the timelines envisioned in the workplan.

Several South Sudan-specific political and institutional challenges contributed to the delay. The nomination of Selection Committee members took longer than expected as civil society networks engaged in extended internal consultations. Once finalized, the process was further stalled by the non-convening of the Cabinet for approximately 6-8 months, which prevented the submission, discussion, and approval of the nominations. A similar situation affected the Revitalized National Legislative Assembly, which has not fully convened since the political crisis of March 2025 involving the First Vice President and subsequent clashes in Nasir, Upper Nile. These developments stalled all parliamentary business, including processes required to move the CTRH and CRA toward operationalization.

Additionally, senior government officials have publicly noted fiscal constraints affecting the State's ability to support the establishment of the two mechanisms. This, combined with the broader political volatility, insecurity in Upper Nile, Jonglei, and Western Equatoria, and shifting national priorities, has slowed government-led steps essential for meeting project timelines.

Despite these setbacks, the project continues to engage national counterparts, provide technical support, and advocate for accelerated progress. In parallel, the team is preparing for the project's close-out phase, including financial reporting, final evaluation, and the close-out meeting scheduled for early January 2026.

While the project remains on a positive trajectory overall, the delayed operationalization of the CTRH and CRA means that some intended outcomes will not be fully achieved within the current project period. Sustained engagement, targeted advocacy, and continued support to Government and civil society will be essential to ensure that the transitional justice mechanisms become fully operational beyond the project's lifespan.

During the reporting period, major progress was made in advancing South Sudan's transitional justice agenda, most notably through the passage and presidential assent of the Commission on Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) and the Compensation and Reparations Authority (CRA) Bills in November 2024. Although enacted, the two institutions are yet to be operationalized. The Government has constituted a Selection Committee—supported technically by the project—to nominate four South Sudanese Commissioners and endorse three Non–South Sudanese Commissioners. The Committee held its inaugural meeting in October 2025. Concurrently, the Government requested the UN Secretary-General and AU Commission to begin identifying the three non-national Commissioners. A Task Force comprising the AU, UNDP, and UNMISS HRD continues to coordinate support and strategy for operationalization. The project also supported development of information materials for upcoming public dissemination, and CSOs conducted advocacy trainings across several states. Parliamentary outreach is pending due to suspension of sittings.

With Peacebuilding Fund support, the project deployed an international transitional justice expert who developed a draft Transitional Justice Roadmap and ten related policy documents. The expert also prepared templates for recruitment of Commissioners and held extensive consultations with AU, UN agencies, CSOs, R-JMEC, faith-based actors, and parliamentary committees, contributing to national ownership. Most planned activities were completed, though actions linked to formal establishment of the CTRH and CRA remain delayed due to required Government decisions.

In the area of media engagement, 100 journalists received training on transitional justice reporting and survivor-sensitive storytelling, leading to the formation of an informal media network producing simplified public information. CSO partner Advance Youth Radio conducted five online programs on transitional justice, showing strong public interest in compensation, accountability, and the role of traditional leaders. A focused discussion with 20 journalists further enhanced understanding of the CTRH, CRA, and Hybrid Court for South Sudan, emphasized ethical and trauma-sensitive reporting, and highlighted media's central role in increasing public awareness.

Youth engagement expanded through university dialogues and sports-for-peace tournaments in Jonglei and Juba. These activities integrated discussions on reconciliation, coexistence, and transitional justice, fostering social cohesion and empowering youth to participate meaningfully in national processes. Feedback revealed growing youth awareness of ongoing legal reforms and a desire for greater involvement in CTRH processes. The Youth Network on Transitional Justice remains an active contributor to dialogue spaces and public discourse.

Support to victims and survivors remained central to project implementation. Through CSO partners, dialogue and trauma-healing sessions were conducted in Mangateen IDP Camp and replicated in Yei, Tambura, and Malakal. Survivors, especially women affected by conflict-related sexual violence, benefited from psychosocial support and livelihood training—such as soap and detergent production—strengthening resilience, self-esteem, and economic independence. Increased knowledge of transitional justice mechanisms has enabled survivors to participate more actively in group activities, and plans are underway to reach women, girls, and children born of rape in additional locations.

Inclusivity was strengthened through decentralized engagement with subnational actors. The South Sudan Council of Churches and Peace and Development Partners implemented activities in Western Equatoria, while the South Sudan Widows and Orphans Organization worked with the Ministry of Women's Affairs in Upper Nile to elevate concerns of widows and children born of rape. These engagements have ensured that marginalized voices shape national transitional justice discussions.

The project also provided high-level technical assistance through consultations with victims' networks, civil society, parliamentary committees, oversight institutions, and regional bodies. These efforts informed technical documents and guidance notes supporting implementation of the CTRH and CRA Acts. Once political and security conditions allow, Specialized Committees in the National Legislative Assembly plan nationwide dissemination campaigns. Preparations for information and education materials are underway, and continued support will be provided to oversight bodies such as the South Sudan Human Rights Commission.

The project is now entering its final phase ahead of closure on 6 January 2026. Planned close-out activities include final coordination meetings, recruitment of an evaluation team, and preparation of financial and narrative reports.

The project has actively mainstreamed gender equality, women's empowerment, and youth inclusion both vertically and horizontally.

At the vertical level, the project supports the Government of South Sudan to strengthen rule of law systems and implement Chapter V of the R-ARCSS, focusing on the establishment of the Commission on Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) and the Compensation and Reparations Authority (CRA). The CTRH Act (2024) mandates that at least one-third of Non-South Sudanese and half of South Sudanese Commissioners must be women, while the CRA requires a minimum of 35% female board membership. These provisions ensure women's leadership and decision-making in reparations and reconciliation processes. As of 6 October 2025, the President endorsed the members of the Selection Committee tasked with appointing the four South Sudanese Commissioners; four of the nine members (44%) are women. Additionally, both the CTRH and CRA laws include provisions addressing gender discrimination and violations against women, promoting reparations for women and girls who are survivors of past violations.

At the horizontal level, the project directly supports women and girls through Victim Support Groups (VSGs), with each group comprising at least 50 survivors. These groups receive psychosocial support, information on transitional justice, and guidance on engaging with the CTRH and CRA mechanisms. In Mangateen IDP Camp, women survivors received resilience-building and income-generating support, enabling them to generate livelihoods while participating in transitional justice processes. Similar initiatives have been extended to other areas, ensuring continuity in women-centered support.

The project has also prioritized awareness and capacity-building activities for women and girls. Community dialogues, workshops, and training sessions brought together survivors, men, and youth to discuss gender, inclusion, women's empowerment, and justice. For example, a meeting held on 21 July with women survivors of conflict-related sexual violence, organized by the South Sudan Survivors Network and Rights for Peace, allowed participants to share experiences and inform policy recommendations addressing the needs of women and children born of rape, emphasizing non-recurrence and reparations.

Additionally, the project has engaged female journalists and media practitioners to enhance coverage of transitional justice and gender issues. In December 2025, a training session with Advance Youth Radio South Sudan strengthened the capacity of young female media professionals to report ethically and effectively on gender, women's rights, and transitional justice issues.

Overall, by combining legislative advocacy, community-based victim support, capacity-building, and media engagement, the project ensures that gender equality, women's empowerment, and youth inclusion remain central to South Sudan's transitional justice processes, creating an inclusive and survivor-centered environment.

The PBF-supported Transitional Justice Project, implemented by UNDP, UNMISS HRD, and UNHCR over the last three years, has generated significant peacebuilding outcomes at both societal and structural levels. These results are evident in changes in attitudes, behaviors, and institutional practices across communities, government institutions, and civil society actors.

Institutional Reform and Legislative Progress

The project has supported the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs (MoJCA) in drafting and finalizing the Commission on Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) Act, 2024, and the Compensation and Reparation Authority (CRA) Act, 2024, in line with Chapter V of the Revitalized Peace Agreement (R-ARCSS) and international human rights standards. These laws reflect a strengthened state commitment to truth, justice, and reconciliation.

The Selection Committee for appointing four South Sudanese Commissioners has been established, and steps are underway to select three Non–South Sudanese Commissioners in collaboration with the UN and African Union. These milestones demonstrate institutional reform and a structural foundation for operationalizing transitional justice mechanisms. Engagement with the National Legislative Assembly, State Human Rights Commissions, and Ministries of Peacebuilding and Cabinet Affairs has enhanced coordination, accountability, and understanding of the mechanisms, embedding transitional justice into national processes and creating a model for replicating lessons across other R-ARCSS provisions.

Inclusive Stakeholder Participation and Advocacy

The project has facilitated the active engagement of over 500 stakeholders, including survivors, youth, women, persons with disabilities, and community leaders from marginalized and conflict-affected areas. Through national dialogues, legislative consultations, and policy discussions, these participants contributed directly to shaping the CTRH and CRA laws.

Civil society organizations (CSOs) played a key advocacy role, ensuring representation of marginalized groups in the Selection Committee. Stakeholders influenced the criteria for Commissioner nominations, monitored procedural fairness, and promoted transparency, thereby ensuring inclusivity and accountability. By enabling survivors, youth, and women to actively participate in decision-making, the project translated output-level activities—participation, consultation, and advocacy—into outcome-level results, including broader societal ownership, more inclusive governance, and strengthened accountability mechanisms.

Empowerment of Victims and Survivors

The project has established 82 Victim Support Groups (VSGs), each averaging 50 members, providing psychosocial support, transitional justice education, and safe spaces for dialogue. Engagement with women survivors of conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV) included resilience-building and income-generating initiatives in IDP camps.

These interventions have produced measurable impact: beneficiaries report increased confidence, restored hope, and a sense of agency, preparing them to participate meaningfully in the CTRH and CRA once operational. The VSGs have also strengthened peer support and community cohesion, allowing survivors to collectively advocate for their rights, share experiences, and contribute to local reconciliation processes.

Youth Engagement and Civic Education

The project has actively engaged youth through sports-for-peace tournaments, university forums, and Rule of Law school clubs. For example, a symposium with 84 tertiary students at John Garang Memorial University raised awareness on truth, reconciliation, healing, compensation, and reparations, empowering youth to support transitional justice processes. In Yei County, debates in public schools fostered dialogue on accountability and the rule of law. These activities have shifted mindsets, promoted tolerance, and cultivated a new generation of leaders

committed to peaceful engagement.

Promotion of Civic Space and Rights-Based Dialogue

Through support to the Transitional Justice Working Group (TJWG) and affiliated CSOs, the project has strengthened civil society capacity by providing safe meeting spaces, linking them with international transitional justice experts, and facilitating knowledge exchange. This support enabled CSOs to contribute substantively to drafting laws, defining standards for Commissioner selection, and discussing the Hybrid Court for South Sudan. Increased access to government officials has improved dialogue and collaboration, reflecting enhanced institutional responsiveness and participatory governance.

Impact and Peacebuilding Outcomes

- Collectively, the project has achieved tangible peacebuilding results:
- Structural Level: Legislative frameworks established; government institutions strengthened; transparent processes for CTRH and CRA operationalization.
- Societal Level: Increased inclusion of marginalized groups; empowered survivors; strengthened community cohesion; youth actively engaged in transitional justice awareness.
- Accountability and Inclusivity: Advocacy and participation by CSOs and survivors influenced decision-making, ensuring inclusive and transparent selection processes.

These outcomes demonstrate that output-level interventions—participation, advocacy, dialogue, and empowerment—have translated into outcome-level peacebuilding results, contributing to a foundation for sustainable reconciliation, social cohesion, and trust in South Sudan's transitional justice institutions.

Security forces, parliament, media, religious institutions, and civil society in Western Equatoria

More than 20 community influencers drawn from security forces, parliament, media, religious institutions, and civil society in Western **Equatoria State completed a** one-day Training of Trainers (ToT) workshop on Transitional Justice. The training, organized by the Centre for Inclusive Governance, Peace and Justice (CIGPJ) in partnership with Rights for Peace and in coordination with the Young **Women Christian Association** (YWCA), was supported by the **Kingdom of the Netherlands** through the UNDP and UN Peace Building Fund. Officiating the opening session, Rt. Hon. Ann Tuna Richard, **Speaker of the Transitional** Western Equatoria State Legislative Assembly. "Our communities have endured untold suffering families torn apart, lives lost, property destroyed, and people traumatized. Justice cannot be delayed, the lawmakers and government officials must ensure that perpetrators are brought to book, and communities are given the chance to heal through truth and reconciliation." For participants, the training offered both a learning opportunity and a platform to reflect on the country's troubled past. Western **Equatoria State has been** among the regions hardest hit by conflict and intercommunal violence, leaving behind scars of mistrust and broken social fabric. According to Igale, follow-up activities will include radio programs, sensitization materials (including a pictorial guide and a citizens' handbook) and community dialogues to

ensure ordinary citizens engage in the transitional

Ms. Veronica Igale, Advocacy Coordinator with Rights for Peace, said the training was part of an outreach effort to raise awareness on two transitional justice laws. "This workshop is not just about sharing knowledge but about empowering key players in Yambio to become messengers of justice, truth, and reconciliation within their communities, the transitional justice process in South Sudan is meant to be transparent, and feedback from the grassroots is critical," Igale explained.

Mr. Karim Justine Makasi, a participant from Men's Alliance for Women and the Needy, said transitional justice is the missing link in consolidating peace in South Sudan.

The project has managed to mobilise additional resources for transitional justice activities in South Sudan through at least two new funding streams. The UNDP Funding Windows opportunity has provided up to 300, 000 USD to support civil society organisations to continue collaborating with victims and survivors providing them pyscho social support and giving them information on transitional justice. In addition, the African Development Bank through the Transitional Support Facility has approved a grant of US 1 million for South Sudan which will be effective for two years from 2026 - 2027.

The project partners with local CSOs that are active in transitional justice and peacebuilding. Most of these are women-led organizations, and the project leverages their strong connections with victims and survivors, as well as their ability to navigate local political and cultural dynamics, to ensure effective implementation of project activities.

There have been at least 2 key interactions between the project and IFIs such as, the African Development Bank and the World Bank on issues concerning transitional justice. There has been traction with the AfDB although UNDO is yet to receive the anticipated funds. Bilateral discussions with other international partners such as the World Bank and the EU continue on the need to support the TJ processes in South Sudan. The two institutions have noted that there is no support planned for transitional justice, however they continue to assess the situation in South Sudan.

The project leverages the Transitional Justice Working Group (TJWG) platform, which brings together UNMISS, UNDP, UNHCR, and the Resident Coordinator's Office (RCO) to deliberate on issues related to project implementation, monitoring, evaluation, and strategic improvement. Through this forum, the project continuously takes stock of progress, identifies challenges, and explores innovative approaches to enhance delivery.

On more strategic matters, the project has successfully elevated key issues to the United Nations Country Team (UNCT) for collective action and guidance. For instance, in March 2025, the UNCT convened a meeting involving all UN agencies in South Sudan to deliberate on the formation of the Selection Panel for the African Commissioners under the CTRH Act. This coordinated engagement ensures that the UN system remains interconnected on critical aspects of the transitional justice agenda, which is intrinsically linked to broader priorities such as resilience, peacebuilding, gender equality, education, health, food security, and durable solutions for IDPs and returnees in South Sudan.

The project continued to strengthen partnerships at multiple levels to advance South Sudan's transitional justice agenda. Collaboration among UN agencies was reinforced through the Transitional Justice Working Group (TJWG), which brings together UNMISS, UNDP, UNHCR, and the Resident Coordinator's Office to coordinate implementation, review progress, and harmonize technical approaches. Strategic issues were elevated to the UN Country Team (UNCT), ensuring system-wide coherence. In March 2025, the UNCT convened to discuss the establishment of the Selection Panel for African Commissioners, demonstrating strong inter-agency alignment on priorities linked to peacebuilding, resilience, gender equality, and protection of vulnerable populations.

Civil society remained central to project implementation. Twenty-seven CSOs received direct funding to engage communities, facilitate consultations, and connect victims and survivors to the transitional justice process. Platforms such as the South Sudan Civil Society Forum and the South Sudan Transitional Justice Working Group, together representing nearly 200 CSOs and CBOs, played a key role in sustaining dialogue, driving advocacy, and ensuring inclusive, community-driven engagement across the country.

The project also expanded partnerships with academia to strengthen knowledge creation and youth participation. Symposia, debates, and moot court competitions were organized through CSO partners, including Advance Youth South Sudan and Women for Agency, Resilience and Transformation (WART). Activities reached students from more than ten universities and included events at John Garang Memorial University. A key milestone will be the December 2025 launch of the Transitional Justice Compendium, produced through collaboration between FIDA-SS, the University of Juba, and UNIPOD, accompanied by an academic symposium.

At the sub-national level, the project engaged state-based institutions such as the Upper Nile Human Rights Commission, providing training on transitional justice and community-level monitoring ahead of the CTRH's operationalization. State-level RRC offices also supported field coordination by identifying priority locations, facilitating local authority clearances, and overseeing CSO-led activities.

National-level collaboration remained strong, particularly with the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs, Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs, Ministry of Peacebuilding, and other relevant ministries, including Finance, Education, Health, and Gender. The project also engaged the National Legislative Assembly to advance thematic discussions and support progress on legislative actions linked to transitional justice and broader rule-of-law reforms.

The project has been able to keep the different stakeholders at the national government level, the victims and survivors, CSOs as well as international partners engaged on the transitional justice docket. The continued engagement and interest reflected thus far within the Cabinet of South Sudan reflected by the most recent meetings between CSOs and the Minister of Cabinet Affairs as well as the engagements between UNDP and the Minister of Justice and the continued talks between the African Union and the UN Country Team about the 3 African Commissioners shows that the issue of transitional justice remains key. In addition, the continued interest by CSOs in engaging communities as well as victims and survivors has kept peoples hopes for justice, reconciliation and the search for truth about past atrocities alive.

The PBF-funded Transitional Justice (TJ) project has generated a significant non-financial catalytic impact in South Sudan. By establishing TJ mechanisms and legal frameworks, the project has laid a foundation that will remain with the country regardless of the political or transitional path it follows. These mechanisms and laws are critical for the state-building process because they provide institutional structures for accountability, reconciliation, and the protection of human rights. They help address past grievances, promote social cohesion, and strengthen public trust in governance. In the long term, having these frameworks in place supports the rule of law, enhances the capacity of state institutions to manage conflict, and creates a predictable legal and political environment conducive to sustainable peace and development. Essentially, even in the absence of ongoing external support, the structures and norms established by the project serve as enduring tools for governance, citizen engagement, and the promotion of justice, which are all pillars of a resilient and legitimate state.

The use of the University of Juba School of Social work students who provide free pyscho social support was an innovation that was introduced by the CSO – Vision for Humanity in collaboration with UNDP. The young students have an opportunity to provide their expertise from their studies, and the victims and survivors also have an opportunity to interact with the psychotherapists. In a country where there is a scarcity of pyscho social therapists and experts, this becomes an important resource.

The training of women in small income generating projects was also important. This had not been done in the previous transitional justice project interventions when the project started in 2022. However, after a learning visit to Rwanda funded by UNDP in 2023, the CSO – Vision for Humanity managed to bring back the ideas and apply them to the Mangateen IDP Camp . This has proved to be a special intervention for the women as they have leant new skills that will also build their resilience and help them income boost their chances of income generation.

The project has taken deliberate steps to ensure the sustainability of peacebuilding gains by strengthening legal, institutional, community, and civil society capacities that will endure beyond the project's duration. The enactment of the CTRH and CRA laws provides a statutory foundation for transitional justice, even though the Government is not yet fully prepared to operationalize these mechanisms independently. These laws anchor truth-seeking and reparations within the national justice architecture and enable continued engagement with international partners, including the AU, AfDB, and World Bank, to secure long-term technical and financial support. Prioritizing renovated national buildings for the mechanisms further enhances sustainability through cost-effective use of existing assets.

At the civil society level, sustainability is driven by capacity-building initiatives targeting financial management, procurement, reporting, and project administration. These efforts have strengthened CSO systems, improved accountability, and allowed many organizations to diversify funding sources beyond UNDP. CSOs now constitute a more resilient network capable of sustaining peacebuilding outreach and community engagement across the country.

The project also supports community-level sustainability through Victim Support Groups, which provide financial literacy and empowerment training to victims and survivors—particularly women and girls in IDP settings. These groups serve as channels for disseminating knowledge on transitional justice, peacebuilding, and the roles of the CTRH and CRA. Despite political uncertainty, the skills and awareness built within communities help preserve momentum and readiness for future engagement once mechanisms are fully functional.

Institutionally, the transitional justice mechanisms are embedded within the broader justice system. The CTRH and CRA laws align with existing criminal and civil procedures, creating clear legal pathways for investigations, reparations, and accountability. Institutional linkages with ministries, local authorities, and community structures ensure that transitional justice processes can be implemented across multiple governance levels. Technical sustainability is reinforced through codified operational guidelines, case management systems, and standardized protocols that preserve institutional memory and reduce dependence on political leadership.

The project further promotes durability by integrating transitional justice within wider judicial, security, and constitutional reforms. Area-based approaches such as mobile courts, engagement with traditional leaders, and support to VSG members strengthen the connection between communities and formal justice processes. Recognizing the political nature of transitional justice, the project also invests in political economy analysis and mental health and psychosocial support, which helps build trust and goodwill among victims and survivors.

The CTRH and CRA are key mechanisms for advancing the transitional justice agenda in South Sudan. The laws establishing these mechanisms were assented to by the President in November 2024, paving the way for their formation. In January 2025, the Cabinet approved the Minister of Justice and Constitutional Affairs to initiate the processes for setting up the CTRH and CRA, including the appointment of local and international Commissioners, signalling significant political will from the Government.

The government has officially endorsed a Selection Committee composed of nine nominees, which has begun its work, alongside a Task Force made up of the AU, UNDP, and UNMISS HRD tasked with selecting the three South Sudanese Commissioners. However, the volatile political and security environment may jeopardize or delay the formation of these mechanisms. In such cases, the project will explore alternative approaches to expedite implementation.

Once established, the CTRH and CRA will require additional technical assistance and logistical support from donors and partners to operate effectively. While the project has focused primarily on these mechanisms, beneficiaries have also expressed interest in the status of the Hybrid Court of South Sudan (HCSS). The project's Technical Working Group has raised these concerns with the MoJCA and the African Union Commission accordingly.
