EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Joint Programme (JP) in Belarus, aimed at supporting the nationalization and localization of the SDGs, plays a vital role in advancing the 2030 Agenda. In 2025, the JP continued to foster collaboration among high-level decision-makers, UN agencies, government bodies, and the private sector to advance the nationalization and localization of the SDGs in Belarus.

The High-level SC, co-chaired by the National SDG Coordinator and the UN Resident Coordinator in the Republic of Belarus, convened to approve the JP Annual Work Plan for 2025 and JP Progress Report for 2024 ensuring its effective implementation.

In 2025, the JP continued to serve as a pivotal platform for fostering cross-sectoral collaboration efforts of various stakeholders, including UN agencies, the National SDG Coordinator, MFA and other ministries, public institutions, and private sector. The JP supported the functioning of the National Institutional SDG Mechanism, enabling stakeholders to pool collective expertise and jointly advance SDG nationalization and localization.

During the reporting period, through its inclusive approach and strategic partnerships, the JP enabled:

- a comprehensive analysis and discussions of results and plans towards achieving the SDGs during three High-level meetings of the Council for Sustainable Development (CSD);
- presentation of the Third Voluntary National Review on the implementation by the Republic of Belarus of the 2030 Agenda at the High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development.

The JP also performed as a platform for strategic consultations about Belarus' development priorities till 2040 at national and regional levels by supporting the SDG seminars, forums and other SDG related meetings at national and local levels. Within the JP in 2025, an innovative tool for planning and forecasting socio-economic development of “national transfer accounts” was promoted among various stakeholders.

In 2025, the JP made a significant contribution to the SDG localization by facilitating the approval of 6 Regional Strategies for Sustainable Development and supporting the implementation of the 21 SDG Pilot Initiatives at the local level.

The JP also fostered dialogue and knowledge exchange by facilitating the participation of the high-level officials in the SDG international conferences and forums (New York, Geneva, Riyadh) where Belarus shared its experience in implementation of the 2030 Agenda.

The JP made a substantial contribution to advancing meaningful adolescent and youth participation in the promotion of the 2030 Agenda and sustainable development. Through a comprehensive set of initiatives – including the Youth SDG Ambassadors programme, annual projects and conferences – the JP created platforms for young people to build knowledge, strengthen leadership skills, and champion SDG-related action in their communities. These platforms facilitated networking and exchange among teaching professionals, adolescents, and youth from all regions of Belarus, reinforcing the central role of young people as drivers of innovation and long-term sustainable development.

Within the JP, in 2025 efforts were made to meaningfully foster a healthy lifestyle and build up the capacity of Silver Volunteers. The JP effectively strengthened national capacity for prevention of non-communicable diseases (NCD) and active longevity by integrating SDG-aligned training, workshops, and public-health education.

To reinforce Belarus SDG monitoring system, the JP continued contribution to further enhancing the national statistical capacities by aligning with international trends and best practices across a diverse range of topics, such as multidimensional poverty, well-being, national transfer accounts, statistical data, geostatistics, and SDG indicators. In 2025, the JP contributed to the modernization of the National SDG Indicator Reporting Platform, the Regional Sustainable Development Data Platform, the “Geostatistics” Information and Analytical System, and the Interactive Information and Analytical System for Disseminating Official Statistical Information, validation of the National Multidimensional Poverty Index, development of the methodology for compiling the functional account of environmental protection expenditure, environmental taxes and subsidies.

During 2025, the cooperation between UN agencies, the donor, the National SDG Coordinator, MFA, Members of the CSD, and regional administrations was enhanced to ensure effective implementation and further nationalization and localization of the 2030 Agenda.

I. Purpose

The overarching goal of the JP is to support the Republic of Belarus in 2030 Agenda implementation through ensuring the effective functioning of the National Institutional SDG Mechanism on a par with incorporation of the SDGs into strategic forecasting and planning documents at the local level and improvement of the SDG monitoring and evaluation system at the national and local levels.

The JP is aligned with strategic directions of the Participating United Nations Organizations’ (PUNOs) CPDs (BCA), particularly:

from UNDP

- measures for the development of green, circular, low-carbon economy, considering the interests of vulnerable groups, developed and introduced;
- financial and non-financial mechanisms enabling effective regional development, including in Chernobyl-affected areas and ensuring inclusion of vulnerable groups, introduced;
- the national system of collection, monitoring, analysis, and use of disaggregated data strengthened in accordance with the human rights-based approach, gender equality and ‘leaving no one behind’ principles.

from UNICEF

- children’s and adolescents’ development and safety in family environments are enhanced through social services and improved capacities of caregivers;
- children and adolescents enjoy increased protection from violence and have access to justice for children;
- children, adolescents and youth are better protected, more socially included, prepared for the employment challenges of the future, and engaged in issues of their concern;
- public-private engagement is enhanced and the efficiency of spending to better realize the potential of future generations is increased.

from UNFPA

- strengthened capacities to provide high-quality, integrated information and services for sexual and reproductive health for women and youth, especially among vulnerable groups;
- improved knowledge on healthy lifestyles and life-saving skills among women and youth, especially those with disabilities, the elderly and rural residents (including in Chernobyl-affected areas);

- mainstreamed demographic intelligence to improve the responsiveness, targeting and impact of development policies, programmes and advocacy.

from WHO

- one billion more people benefit from universal health coverage.

II. Results

i) Narrative reporting on results:

Outcome 1. Ensure effective functioning of the National Institutional SDG Mechanism

In 2025, in partnership with MFA and under the leadership of the National SDG Coordinator, the UNDP contributed to ensuring the effective functioning of the National Institutional SDG Mechanism as a platform for strategic discussions of the 2030 Agenda implementation and Belarus' development priorities beyond 2030 by supporting three meetings of the CSD, and presentation of the Third Voluntary National Review on the implementation by the Republic of Belarus of the 2030 Agenda at the High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (New York, 14-23 July 2025).

To foster dialogue and knowledge sharing among diverse stakeholders, UNDP facilitated the participation of the SDG high-level officials in SDG international conferences and forums (New York, Geneva, Riyadh) and presentation of Belarus' experience in implementing the 2030 Agenda.

To further integrate SDGs into teaching at higher education institutions UNDP also facilitated the development of an advanced training curriculum for professional development of teaching staff of higher education institutions and an educational-methodical manual on integrating the principles of education for sustainable development into the content of training of specialists with higher education.

In partnership with the Ministry of Education and leading national educational institutions UNICEF strengthened systematic and meaningful participation of children, adolescents, and youth in advancing sustainable development and the SDGs by expanding access to quality learning materials, creating platforms for networking and knowledge exchange, and supporting continuous, age-appropriate engagement in SDG-related learning and activities.

In close collaboration with the Ministry of Health, WHO strengthened national capacity for preventing non-communicable diseases (NCDs) by supporting training modules, workshops, and public-health education aligned with SDG target 3.4. It facilitated participation of Belarusian health specialists in international events and advanced local initiatives such as the "Healthy Cities and Towns" programme to promote healthy lifestyles and reduce NCD risk factors. WHO also developed and disseminated evidence-based learning and awareness materials, contributing to improved public health literacy and more effective NCD prevention nationwide.

Output 1: The National institutional SDG mechanism in the Republic of Belarus was strengthened.

The JP ensured the functioning of the National Institutional SDG Mechanism. With UNDP support 3 High-level meetings of the CSD were held on the following topics: commemoration of the Chernobyl Disaster, the results achieved by the Republic of Belarus on the implementation of the 2030 Agenda, the contribution of UN agencies in the nationalization and localization of the SDGs in Belarus, as well as the development of the Third Voluntary National Review on the implementation by the Republic of Belarus of the 2030 Agenda and the Universal Periodic Review of the Republic of Belarus within the fourth cycle of the UN Human Rights Council.

In total 320 people (144 women and 176 men, including 39 young people) took part in the meetings of the CSD, including the members of the CSD, representatives of UN agencies, public associations, NGOs, private sector, scientific organizations, and SDG Youth Ambassadors.

In 2025, JP supported the presentation of the Third Voluntary National Review on the implementation by the Republic of Belarus of the 2030 Agenda at the High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development, which was held in New York, 14-23 July 2025.

The JP continued providing a platform for the national partners to exchange experience and knowledge on the SDGs at the international level. In 2025, UNDP facilitated participation of the National SDG Coordinator, representatives of the Council of the Republic of the National Assembly of the Republic of Belarus and MFA in the Regional Forum of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe on Sustainable Development (April, Geneva, Switzerland), the High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (July, New York, USA), the 21st Session of the General Conference of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (November, Riyadh, Saudi Arabia).

With support from UNFPA, on 25 April 2025, ahead of the process of developing state programmes and budgets for the forthcoming five-year period, a seminar entitled “Integrating Gender Considerations into the Development of Legislative and State Programmes” was held. The seminar brought together 54 public administration specialists, including 48 women and 6 men. Key issues addressed included the importance of ensuring equal rights and opportunities for women and men in achieving national policy objectives, the need to integrate gender considerations into programme and budget formulation, gender analysis as a tool for regulatory impact assessment, and practical recommendations for drafting normative legal acts.

During the reporting period, with UNFPA support, practice-oriented training seminars on early detection and prevention of cervical and breast cancer were conducted in all regions of the country in cooperation with the Ministry of Health of the Republic of Belarus.

To study best practices and innovative solutions in the field of active and healthy ageing, as well as to strengthen international cooperation aimed to improve the quality of life of older persons, UNFPA, in partnership with the Ministry of Labour and Social Protection of the Republic of Belarus, the Belarusian Association of Social Workers, and the Department for Humanitarian Activities of the Presidential Administration, organised the Second International Forum on Healthy and Active Ageing “Health, Career, Leisure, Family” (<https://sdgs.by/en/results/forum-on-active-longevity-was-held-in-minsk-2/>). The Forum was attended by more than 200 participants in person (132 women, 68 men) and 500 online (425 women, 75 men), including 198 older persons, including representatives of public authorities of Belarus, Uzbekistan, Tajikistan, and the Republic of Korea, members of the diplomatic corps from more than ten countries, international and national experts, and older persons (“silver age”).

On 5 December 2025, within the JP and with UNFPA support, in partnership with the Ministry of Labour and Social Protection, a Silver Volunteers Gathering was held. The event was dedicated to the Day of Silver Volunteers and aimed to implement the National Strategy of the Republic of Belarus “Active Ageing–2030”, promoting volunteering among older persons, disseminating effective volunteer practices, and increasing knowledge in the field of cyber security. The event brought together 80 participants, including silver volunteers, representatives of public authorities, and specialists from Territorial Centres for Social Services.

With UNDP support, in 2025, in collaboration with the Ministry of Education of the Republic of Belarus an advanced training curriculum for professional development of teaching staff of higher education institutions and an educational-methodical manual on integrating the principles of education for sustainable development into the content of training of specialists with higher education were developed.

In 2025, UNICEF, the Ministry of Education, and leading educational establishments continued to partner to advance a sustained, system-anchored approach to meaningful adolescent and youth engagement on the SDGs. Annual events and projects supported by the JP served as a coherent platform that promotes networking and the exchange of experiences between teachers, students, adolescents, and youth from all regions of Belarus. This systemic approach underpins a continuous pathway from awareness to agency and action, prioritizing equitable outreach across all regions and promoting youth leadership through the Youth SDG Ambassadors initiative and the SDG Acceleration Platform “Future Generation Orientation: Adolescents and Youth.” Together, these efforts strengthened national ownership, expanded reach, and ensured that children, adolescents, and youth – girls and boys – could learn about the SDGs, practice leadership, and lead peer-to-peer engagement across formal and non-formal settings.

Central to this approach is a youth leadership pipeline that continues to grow in scale and visibility. The fifth cohort of Youth SDG Ambassadors was launched with more than 100 applications, reflecting growing demand for youth leadership opportunities and ensuring the continuity of peer-led engagement nationwide. The initiative is increasingly recognized and amplified through official youth channels, reinforcing sustainability and public recognition of youth action on the SDGs.

In 2025, UNICEF’s support enabled Belarus to mobilize adolescents and young people as SDG advocates and co-creators throughout the year. In March, the International SDG Volunteer Forum in Gomel brought together participants from six countries and more than 50 volunteers, serving as a catalyst for knowledge exchange and for the formation of international youth teams that will collaborate to implement joint projects expanding partnerships and dialogue among young people across the region. During the summer, Youth SDG Ambassadors and their alternates served as peer educators for the “Sustainable Summer” project in 24 children’s and school camps across the Gomel, Minsk, Brest, Vitebsk, and Grodno regions, engaging more than 600 children with hands-on, age-appropriate activities that link the SDGs to everyday life and promote inclusive participation across the country. In September, the “SDG Movement” Festival held at one of Minsk’s largest student campuses organized 17 interactive stations and engaged 119 young people aged 17-20. The closing event of the festival, with the participation of Youth SDG Ambassadors and their alternates, brought more than 2,000 students together to participate in interactive quizzes, learn about the SDGs, and receive information materials.

Higher-education engagement deepened through the “Sustainable University” project, which convened lectures, masterclasses, and roundtables on climate change, environmental responsibility, and youth roles, reaching 300 students. The initiative also launched the selection of the fifth cohort of Youth SDG Ambassadors, signaling continuity in the leadership pipeline and anchoring SDG learning within university life. The results were publicly recognized at the December award event, with the participation of the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, UNICEF, and UNDP, reinforcing institutional buy-in and inter-agency partnerships.

To scale learning and embed sustainability, UNICEF, together with the Belarusian State Pedagogical University, advanced the SDG Acceleration Platform “Future Generation Orientation: Adolescents and Youth,” which reached more than 200,000 participants through structured, repeatable formats across the education system. The national competition “Teach. Promote. Act.” engaged 286 educators from all regions and culminated in a Methodological Forum with 70 education professionals and students, elevating teacher-developed content and disseminating classroom-ready resources for education for sustainable development. The “Children on the SDGs” creative competition drew 513 children and adolescents, with results presented at the forum “SDGs: Under 16 and Beyond.” The Youth Media Festival “Young Voices for Sustainable Development” mobilized 130 teachers, students, and schoolchildren, who submitted more than

160 media products on different topics related to sustainable development. First-year students at the Belarusian State Pedagogical University participated in the “SDGs: The Way Forward” educational quest. SDG content was featured at the national “Science Festival” – one of the country’s largest science-popularization events - with about 38,000 attendees. The “Lessons on Sustainable Development” project engaged 450 learners across 19 online sessions, with 215 submitting final works to the “Young Friends of the SDGs” competition creating a bridge from classroom learning to youth-led outputs.

To broaden national awareness and synchronize outreach with global moments, materials for the World’s Largest Lesson on the SDGs were developed and made available online. In September, more than 1,000 educational establishments conducted the lesson as part of information, classroom, and curator hours during the Global Week of Action, ensuring nationwide exposure and a common reference point for schools across Belarus. Visibility of youth action and continuity of messaging were amplified through the Youth SDG Ambassadors’ social media and the Republican Youth Center website.

Collectively, these results show that youth engagement on the SDGs in Belarus is equitable and sustainable. Through a continuum of learning and leadership opportunities UNICEF and partners enabled adolescents and young people to build knowledge, exercise voice, and lead peer-to-peer action.

To raise public awareness of the 2030 Agenda and promote the SDGs, UNDP ensured the production of promotional products depicting the national SDG logos, the logos of the donor, UN and MFA (13 varieties of souvenir products a total of 1,039 pieces, including keychains, badges, bookmarks, 3D stickers, digital clocks, calendars, etc.). These souvenirs were distributed at national and international events conducted within the JP. WHO’s work in 2025 focused on strengthening Belarus’s capacity to prevent non-communicable diseases and promote healthier lifestyles, directly contributing to SDG 3.4. This included supporting the Belarusian State Medical University in implementing newly approved public health training module that integrates SDG principles and emphasizes NCD prevention. Sixteen public health managers were trained through this module, including participation in an on-site seminar in Mogilev under the “Healthy Cities and Towns” programme. WHO also helped organize a series of national and regional workshops that showcased modern approaches to creating health-preserving environments, including events held during the Healthcare-2025 exhibition, in Molodechno, and at the 10-year anniversary of the WHO Minsk Declaration on NCD prevention.

In addition, WHO strengthened the country’s public health workforce by supporting the training of additional NCD prevention instructors and enabling Belarusian participation in the WHO conference on road safety and healthy urban mobility in Morocco. WHO also helped expand public access to trustworthy health information by developing ten educational videos and online materials on priority health topics such as diabetes, atrial fibrillation, COPD, autism support, and HPV vaccination that were made available through the national Electronic Patient Atlas. These efforts contribute to a long-term reduction of NCD burden, help close the life-expectancy gap between men and women, and support healthier, more resilient communities across Belarus.

Outcome 2. Facilitate incorporation of the SDGs into strategic forecasting and planning documents at local level as well as accelerating the SDG localization

During the reported period UNDP actively contributed to the finalizing of the Regional Strategies for Sustainable Development up to 2040 (RSSDs), ensuring that the SDGs are systemically integrated in programming documents across every region of Belarus. All 6 RSSDs are finalized and approved by the regional authorities.

In 2025, to support the SDG localization the 21 SDG pilot initiatives on education, organic agriculture, digitalization, health, accessible environment and professional skills for people with disabilities following the 2030 Agenda principle “leaving no one behind” were implemented by UNDP at the local level.

Within the JP, an innovative tool for planning and forecasting socio-economic development of “national transfer accounts” was promoted to the various stakeholders.

Output 2: SDGs are included in strategic forecasting and planning documents, and the process of SDG localization is accelerated.

In 2025, UNDP ensured finalization of 6 regional strategies for sustainable development (RSSDs) and its approval by regional executive committees. The RSSDs were presented at the meeting of the Council for Sustainable Development on 8 December 2025, in Minsk. To enhance SDG localization, in 2025 UNDP supported:

- 1) the visits of the National SDG Coordinator and the UN Country Team to Brest (February), Mogilev (April), and Vitebsk (August) regions;
- 2) the SDG related events: V Mogilev Regional Forum on Sustainable Development (April 9–10, Zhilichi, Mogilev Region); Vitebsk Regional Forum on Sustainable Development (August 15, Orsha, Vitebsk Region); Gomel Regional Forum on Sustainable Development (September 18, Gomel); Workshop “Cultural Heritage as a Strategic Resource and Driver of Sustainable Development of Regions and Megacities of the 21st Century” within the XXVI International Scientific Conference “Problems of Forecasting and State Regulation of Socio-Economic Development” (October 22, Sula, Minsk Region); II Business Forum “State and Business: Partnership for Sustainable Development” (November 20, Lepel, Vitebsk Region); Mogilev Invest Day 2025 (December 18, Mogilev).

Participants included the National SDG Coordinator, representatives of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Economy, the UN Country Team in Belarus, regional and district executive committees, industrial enterprises, public organizations, educational and scientific institutions, private sector, SDG Youth Ambassadors — a total of 655 people, including 273 men and 382 women.

On 2 December 2025, with UNFPA support, a seminar “National Transfer Accounts and Practice of Their Use in Developing National Strategies and State Programmes” was held. The seminar was attended by 50 participants representing the Belstat, other government bodies, research institutes and higher education institutions. The participants became acquainted with the nature of National Transfer Accounts (NTA), their goals, objectives and unique analytical potential used in international practice for socio-economic forecasting, planning of national strategies and programmes, including social protection, pensions, healthcare and education, as well as for assessing the sustainability of fiscal policy in the context of demographic change. UNFPA also supported a meeting of the NTA working group with representatives of Belstat, the ministries of economy, health, finance, labour and social protection of the Republic of Belarus, where further steps to promote NTA in the state planning and budgeting system were discussed.

With UNFPA support under the Project, more than 150 representatives of regional administrative bodies of the Brest, Grodno and Mogilev regions enhanced their competencies in demographic sustainability and ensuring equal rights and opportunities for women and men in the planning and budgeting of state programmes.

During 2025, UNDP facilitated the implementation of the 21 SDG Pilot Initiatives across all regions of the Republic of Belarus. A total of 4,903 people (1,421 men and 3,482 women), including 693 persons with disabilities, participated in the implementation of the SDG Pilot Initiatives.

Key Results of SDG Pilot Initiatives (more information via link https://sdgs.by/en/wp-content/uploads/sites/3/2026/01/pilotnye-inicziativy_eng.pdf):

- 48 persons with disabilities completed training and acquired skills in 3D printing, reverse engineering, and professions such as barista and coffee roaster at newly established training centers in Mozyr and Luninets;
- 21 graduating students at a special boarding school in Molotkovichi, Brest region, were trained in pizza-making at a newly equipped educational and practical complex;
- 3 inclusive tourist routes were created in Braslav district, along with barrier-free environments at the “Drivyaty” recreation center and the town beach in Braslav;
- wheelchair tire production was launched in Mozyr, during the initiative, 200 tires were manufactured and distributed to organizations representing persons with disabilities;
- an inclusive environment for physical activities was established for 450 adults and children with disabilities through playgrounds, outdoor gyms, and workout areas installed in Krichev and Pinsk districts;
- conditions for playing SHOWDOWN (table tennis for the blind) were created. 72 visually impaired persons were trained using sports equipment purchased under the initiative in Shklov, Brest, Vasilevichi, Orsha, Minsk, Grodno, and Vitebsk;
- an online platform “Resource Center for Persons with Disabilities” was developed. 25 persons with disabilities and their family members in Gomel received consultations on social rehabilitation and adaptation;
- an inclusive animation studio was established in Grodno, 16 young persons with disabilities were trained in stop-motion animation, social video production, and content promotion on social media;
- an educational online platform was developed to build competencies in ESG practices and tools;
- a specialized training site for youth in agribusiness was created in Bragin district, Gomel region, using agricultural machinery purchased under the initiative, 10,000 seedlings of berry and fruit-nut crops were planted;
- the Diabetes School at Brest Regional Children’s Hospital was supported, 65 families raising children with diabetes received consultations using medical equipment purchased under the initiative and applied skills in insulin pump therapy;
- proposals for developing the startup ecosystem and small innovative entrepreneurship were prepared and submitted to the Ministry of Economy, the Association for the Development of Technoparks and Business Incubators was established; 52 people were trained in innovative entrepreneurship in Vitebsk and Soligorsk;
- 1,019 children were trained in precision agriculture based on programs developed under the initiative in Uzda and Gorki educational institutions;
- 75 residents of Krasnopolsky district, Mogilev region, completed training on SDG localization using four specialized online courses developed under the initiative;
- an innovation hub for technical and technological skills development was created in Bobruisk; using computer equipment purchased under the initiative, 100 children were trained in robotics;
- 21 teachers from Beryoza, Ivatsevichi, and Drogichin districts of Brest region were trained to use the ShagAI educational platform; 10 game simulators and training courses were developed to enhance children’s cognitive functions; 300 children completed educational programs incorporating AI components;
- an educational platform on ESG topics was launched in Vitebsk; 121 students completed training and testing on sustainable development and ESG;
- a Gender Equality Center was established in Mogilev; over 650 people participated in 45 events on gender equality and engaged fatherhood, organized using equipment purchased under the initiative;

- an online platform “CALADRIUS” was developed with a module for data and clinical case exchange among specialists; using specialized diagnostic equipment purchased under the initiative, 300 medical students were trained to use the platform’s AI component, and 300 individuals underwent histological data diagnostics.

UNDP organized 9 monitoring visits to the regions to ensure oversight of SDG Pilot Initiatives implementation.

To promote SDGs and raise awareness about progress on nationalization and localization of SDGs in Belarus, UNDP ensured regular updates of the national portal on sustainable development sdgs.by.

Outcome 3. Improve the SDG monitoring and evaluation system at national and local levels

The JP supported the national statistical office in strengthening its capacity to integrate international trends and best practices across a wide range of areas, including multidimensional poverty, national transfer accounts, statistical data management, geostatistics, metadata, and SDG indicators. JP support ranged from targeted trainings and round tables to the development of new statistical methodologies.

In 2025, UNDP supported modernization of the National SDG Indicator Reporting Platform, the Regional Sustainable Development Data Platform, and the “Geostatistics” Information and Analytical System. UNDP also ensured validation of the National Multidimensional Poverty Index by the Oxford Poverty and Human Development Initiative and development of the methodology for compiling the functional account of environmental protection expenditure, environmental taxes and subsidies.

UNICEF strengthened national capacities for data dissemination and accessibility by developing standardized procedures for structuring microdata and practical guidelines for microdata dissemination. UNICEF also supported further enhancement of the national Interactive Information and Analytical System for Disseminating Official Statistical Information, contributing to more transparent, user-friendly, and equitable access to official data.

Output 3: The system for monitoring the achievement of SDGs at national and local levels was improved.

During 2025, PUNOs strengthened partnership with Belstat on SDG monitoring, contributed to modernization of statistical information systems, and development of methodological approaches for SDG indicators reporting.

To enhance the data visualization, expand search and data export capabilities, and optimize system administration UNDP supported the modernization of statistical information systems the National SDG Reporting Platform, the Regional Sustainable Development Data Platform, the “Geostatistics” Information-Analytical System and procured necessary computer equipment. With UNDP support, the capacity of Belstat specialists using the R programming language was strengthened.

To present the statistical information resources for youth in October 2025, UNDP provided support in organizing the seminar “The Digital Universe of State Statistics Data of the Republic of Belarus” dedicated to the World Statistics Day. More than 100 students from the Belarusian State Economic University attended the seminar.

In 2025, with UNDP support, the Oxford Poverty and Human Development Initiative validated the National Multidimensional Poverty Index of the Republic of Belarus, calculated by Belstat using the Alkire–Foster methodology.

UNDP also contributed to the development of methodological approaches for calculating the National Wellbeing Index of the Republic of Belarus as an aggregated assessment of living standards in terms of well-being. This index may serve as one of the tools reflecting the comprehensive implementation of the 2030 Agenda.

With UNDP support and Russian expertise, a draft methodology was developed for compiling the functional account of environmental protection expenditure, environmental taxes and subsidies, and an experimental calculation was carried out.

In 2025, UNICEF and Belstat advanced a coherent agenda to improve the availability, quality, and use of data on children by enhancing the national system for disseminating official statistics, strengthening data management, and preparing the next round of the Multiple Indicator Cluster Survey (MICS) – a global UNICEF initiative to gather internationally comparable data on the situation of children and women.

Further modernization of the national Interactive Information and Analytical System for Disseminating Official Statistical Information was initiated with JP support. In 2025, Belstat completed the first stage and launched the second stage of work with the whole modernization process expected to be completed by mid-2026. Efforts include updating the unified web portal on statistics on children to make child-related data more accessible, coherent, and user-friendly for policymakers, researchers, and the public. A central feature of the modernization is the progressive adoption of the SDMX standard, which enables structured, automated data exchange between national systems and global databases, including UNICEF's TransMonEE platform for monitoring and analyzing data on children. This interoperability reduces manual handling and errors, shortens update cycles, and supports comparability. UNICEF and Belstat maintained technical consultations with the UNICEF Regional Office for Europe and Central Asia to operationalize these exchanges.

UNICEF supported Belstat to strengthen the quality assessment of administrative data. Belstat participated in regional and tailored consultations with an international consultant and received a preliminary documentation package outlining options and next steps. This lays the groundwork for a systematic, nationally owned approach to assessing and improving administrative data quality – with direct benefits for child-focused indicators used in planning, service delivery, and SDG monitoring.

UNICEF and Belstat continued to prepare for the seventh round of the Multiple Indicator Cluster Survey (MICS). In Belarus MICS serves as a source of data on 27 SDG indicators. UNICEF and Belstat signed the Memorandum of Understanding and initiated preparatory activities, with full preparation continuing in 2026. These steps safeguard the pipeline for high-quality, internationally comparable survey data on child health, education, protection, and well-being.

To expand safe and ethical access to microdata for evidence-based decision-making, UNICEF supported Belstat to finalize procedures, tools, and documentation for microdata structuring and dissemination. This work followed a comprehensive review of existing practices – combining regular consultative webinars, assessments of methodological and technical documents, and targeted discussions with Belstat's structural units – to design a modern, consistent, and transparent microdata dissemination process that meets the needs of government, the research community, international organizations, and other stakeholders.

These integrated activities enhance transparency, quality, coherence, and accessibility of child-related data and equip national counterparts to generate, share, and use evidence that advances the rights and well-being of every child.

In 2025, PUNOs facilitated the enhancement of national statistical capacity in terms of international trends and best practices on a diverse range of topics, including multidimensional poverty, national transfer accounts, statistical data, metadata, geostatistics and SDG indicators.

During 2025, to raise awareness of Belstat representatives about international approaches and trends in SDG monitoring and reporting as well as to present the best Belarusian practices in SDG statistics, UNDP and UNFPA supported the participation of Belstat representatives (senior and middle management) in the international events including: the Meeting of the Task Force on the changing role of national statistical offices in data ecosystems (January, Vienna, Austria); the 56th session of the UN Statistical Commission (March, New-York, USA); the 73rd Plenary Session of the Conference of European Statisticians (June, Geneva, Switzerland); the Workshop on Modernizing Statistical Legislation (September, Belgrade, Serbia); the SDMX Global Conference 2025 (October, Rome, Italy); the III International Statistical Forum of the Commonwealth of Independent States (September, Baku, Azerbaijan); the 16th meeting of the Inter-agency and Expert Group on Sustainable Development Goal Indicators (November, Kitakyushu, Japan); the Global Congress “Population, Health and Human Development” (November, Cairo, Egypt), etc.

Outcome 4. Ensure effective management, monitoring and evaluation of the Joint Project

In 2025, effective management and monitoring of the JP implementation was insured by efficient work of the UNDP JP Team, UNICEF, UNFPA, WHO staff and monthly meetings of the PUNOs Coordination Group (RCO, UNDP, UNICEF, UNFPA, WHO), which continued functioning as a platform for integrating UN efforts on JP results-based implementation and for open and proactive discussion of delays, constraints, challenges.

Gender equality and women empowerment

In 2025, UNDP continued efforts to secure equal women’s and men’s representation at the High-level meetings on the 2030 Agenda to make sure that women’s interests are addressed during decision making process. During the reporting period UNDP contributed to enhance women’s professional capacity, the JP facilitated participation of 6 female representatives of Belstat in 4 international events on statistical data, SDMX, SDG indicators, etc. Therefore, more than 110,000 USD was allocated by UNDP in 2025 towards gender equality.

In 2025, UNICEF continued to apply its core principles of gender equality across all programme activities, ensuring equal access, participation, and visibility for girls and boys, young women and young men. All youth engagement initiatives were designed and implemented to guarantee gender-balanced outreach and inclusive participation pathways for adolescents and young people. The national competition for the fifth cohort of Youth SDG Ambassadors encouraged the active participation of young women reinforcing the Ambassadors’ role in promoting gender equality within the SDG agenda. The competition resulted in 21 young women and 13 young men selected as ambassadors and their alternates. Their involvement in peer-to-peer education, public events, and university-level initiatives helped integrate gender perspectives across youth-led outreach and advocacy.

UNICEF also worked with Belstat to strengthen the availability and quality of gender-disaggregated data, including through the modernization of the national dissemination system, the introduction of SDMX standards, the development of microdata dissemination procedures, and preparatory work for the next round of MICS. These efforts support national capacity to generate more complete, comparable, and accessible gender-sensitive data on children and adolescents, contributing to evidence-based policymaking and SDG monitoring.

UNFPA integrated a gender perspective into all its operations and programme activities, including the planning and execution of JP activities. In 2025, UNFPA furthered gender equality and women's empowerment by organizing educational seminars for local authorities in three regions. These seminars focused on ensuring equal rights and opportunities for women and men in the planning and budgeting processes of state programmes. A total of 150 representatives from regional bodies participated in these events, with women constituting 80% of the attendees.

WHO efforts in support to reach SDG target 3.4. “To reduce by one third premature mortality from non-communicable diseases through prevention and treatment and promote mental health and well-being” is contributing to reduce currently existing 10-year gap in life expectancy for men (69 years) and women (79 years) in Belarus. Promoting of healthy lifestyle and reduction of prevalence of smoking, harmful alcohol use, support for healthy diet and physical activities will contribute to reducing noncommunicable diseases burden and need for care in the families and therefore will support women empowerment.

Delays in JP implementation, challenges, lessons learned & best practices

The coordinated efforts enabled the JP to actively and efficiently implement the planned activities in 2025. JP activities were implemented under the following circumstances which are similar as in previous years:

- rotation of people representing the national partners entities (High-level official – National SDG Coordinator, Deputy Ministers of Economy, Health, Belstat, etc.) leads to the necessity to renew communication, review the planned JP activities to ensure their alliance with current national priorities, get necessary clearances;
- limited pool of qualified national and international SDGs experts resulted in additional challenges in hiring contractors and coordinating their work;
- complexity and comprehensiveness of tasks including all 17 SDGs, the large number of the partners engaged (UN agencies, national partners) slows down the procedures for coordinating and approving completed work;
- lack of partners’ experience in implementing international projects at local level.

The effective implementation of the JP during 2025 was ensured by constant communication and coordination of activities with representatives of PUNOs, the National SDG Coordinator, MFA, other government bodies, and local authorities. Standard internal controls were carried out with no findings or follow-up actions required.

Qualitative assessment

As of 31 December 2025, 70.38 % of the whole JP budget was delivered for the JP implementation period since 2023. In 2025, 75.20 % of the JP budget planned for 2025 was delivered, most of the planned activities were implemented. The remaining unutilized funds include cost savings resulting from competitive procurement procedures with lower costs compared to initially planned and funds for some activities on SDG monitoring which were reformatted to address Belstat needs and requests and will be implemented in 2026.

Considering that the JP fully-fledged implementation was shifted to quarter 4 of 2023, the JP implementation period was extended till 31 December 2026.

The PUNOs within the JP continue its communications and networking efforts to:

- ensure the effective functioning of the National Institutional SDG Mechanism as the strategic platform to facilitate integration and coherence for SDG implementation throughout Belarus (MFA has played an active role in promoting the JP activities and supported considerably in engaging government level stakeholders);
- lead the consultations with the national partners to proactively respond to the present-day vision of SDGs localization in Belarus, through the lens of the RSSDs’ development in the context of the new NSSD-2040.

In 2025, the JP benefited from the UN coordination mechanism. Monthly PUNOs meetings (RCO, UNDP, UNICEF, UNFPA, WHO) served as a platform to coordinate joint efforts contributing to JP results-based implementation, discussion of challenges in the implementation and developing mitigation measures.

Cooperation between PUNOs, the donor, the National SDG Coordinator, MFA, Members of the CSD was strengthened through joint activities, consultations and discussions.

Visibility

To highlight the activities of the JP and increase awareness of the population of the Republic of Belarus about the 2030 Agenda, the JP Team regularly updated the national SDG portal sdgs.by, Instagram, Facebook and X (Twitter) accounts with the latest news on the SDGs in Belarus and specifically the JP implementation. In 2025, 327 SDG related news items were posted on the sdgs.by website, including 61 about the JP implementation. In addition to that, 3 promotional videos were made by UNDP to raise visibility of the SDG Pilot Initiatives. The JP activities were also covered by PUNOs online resources and the national media. Furthermore, throughout 2025, 13 varieties of souvenir products branded with SDG and JP logos were designed and procured (a total of 1,039 pieces, including keychains, badges, bookmarks, 3D stickers, digital clocks, calendars, etc.) by UNDP.

“TAKE-OFF TECHNOLOGIES” – EMPOWERING PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES IN LUNINETS DISTRICT

Problem / Challenge faced:

In Luninets District, Brest Region, around 1,500 working-age people live with disabilities. Among them only 514 are employed, leaving nearly two-thirds without work, social connection, or a chance to fulfill their potential. Marina Rudenko, a wheelchair user, was one of them — struggling to find a job suited to her physical condition and longing for a chance to contribute and feel included.

Programme Interventions:

The SDG Pilot Initiative “Take-Off Technologies” supported by UNDP was launched in Luninets District to tackle low employment among people with disabilities and empower them with modern digital skills. The SDG Pilot Initiative introduced inclusive training and equipped with an accessible classroom for mastering 3D printing technologies. Local residents – persons with disabilities (one of them, Marina Rudenko) gained hands-on experience in designing and producing items — opening opportunities for creativity, income generation, and pathways to self-employment.

Result:

The “Take-Off Technologies” initiative opened long-closed doors for people with disabilities in Luninets. For the first time, participants gained hands-on experience with 3D printing, creating decorative and functional items for everyday use or sale. Marina Rudenko saw the participation in the initiative as “a real chance” — and after training, she and another participant secured jobs at a new additive technologies workshop at the Social Rehabilitation and Abilitation Department of the Luninets Territorial Center for Social Services. The initiative not only taught technical skills but also boosted confidence, reduced isolation, and created pathways to income and independence. A partnership with Belarusian State Pedagogical University was established to retrain educators in teaching 3D printing and reverse engineering to people with disabilities. Future plans focus on monetizing 3D printing services by expanding offerings for the public and enlarging barrier-free environment at Luninets Polytechnic College through integrating 3D modeling courses into vocational curricula.

Lessons Learned:

The SDG Pilot Initiative demonstrated that modern technologies are powerful enablers for inclusion, opening new opportunities for people with disabilities. Providing access to equipment and inclusive training not only builds practical skills but also creates sustainable income streams. Beyond technical knowledge, such programs foster social interaction and peer support, strengthening community integration. Importantly, the experience revealed a strong need to promote remote employment in the digital sector, allowing people with disabilities to learn and work online without requiring additional physical infrastructure.

Problem / Challenge faced:

In Belarus, where overall unemployment rate is about 3.5%, the rate among people with disabilities is 16.5% — nearly five times higher. Addressing this disparity requires targeted interventions that equip people with relevant, modern skills. Moreover, young people with disabilities often experience isolation and limited opportunities for socialization. This lack of integration into community and professional networks reduces their confidence, weakens soft skills, and further hinders their employability.

Programme Interventions:

The SDG Pilot initiative “Inclusive animation” in Grodno created a barrier-free learning space that equips young people with mental disabilities with practical, market-relevant skills in video animation. This place has a supportive and adaptive environment, which fosters creativity and collaboration. “This is an unusual place — it’s inclusive,” says Karyna Nasytko, one of the 12 students. “It helps people with disabilities fulfill their potential. Some may even go on to become bloggers.”

Result:

The SDG Pilot Initiative “Inclusive animation” created the first inclusive animation program in Grodno equipped with professional tools, marking a significant milestone for young people with disabilities. This initiative has had a transformative impact, offering both creative and social opportunities. Over the course of the program, 12 participants — girls and boys — attended training sessions twice a week, learning the fundamentals of screenwriting, filming, and editing, as well as how to communicate their ideas effectively within their communities. As a result, they produced 12 animated social videos, tackling topics such as child protection, inclusion, and environmental awareness. Beyond technical skills, the workshop fostered teamwork and problem-solving. Participants practiced sharing responsibilities, supporting one another, and finding creative solutions together. For many, the process became a way to express personal feelings and stories — an experience that was both therapeutic and a catalyst for building friendships. Volunteer Elena Kondratova highlighted the Initiative social impact: “Our program helps with socialization. Here, they bond over shared interests and collaborate to produce videos on social issues.” Looking ahead, the group plans to create social advertisements for local organizations and businesses, continuing to use animation as a tool for advocacy and inclusion.

Lessons Learned:

Practical skills are most effective when paired with social interaction. Learning digital tools alongside teamwork and creative collaboration helps participants feel more confident and included. Creating safe and welcoming spaces is essential, as they allow young people with disabilities to express themselves freely, build resilience, and form meaningful friendships. Creativity proved to be an effective tool for empowerment. Through animation and storytelling, participants were encouraged to share experiences, propose new ideas, and solve problems in innovative ways. Leadership emerged naturally when participants were entrusted with responsibility. Individuals like Karina Nasytko stepped into key roles, guiding their peers and organizing group efforts. Finally, community engagement amplified the impact. Producing videos on social issues not only empowered participants but also raised public awareness, demonstrating how inclusive projects can benefit society as a whole.

BELARUS' FIRST WHEELCHAIR TIRES PRODUCTION IN MOZYR

Problem / Challenge faced:

Until 2025, Belarus had no domestic production of wheelchair tires. All components had to be imported, which was costly, time-consuming, and required bulk purchases. These barriers created serious difficulties for people with disabilities, limiting their mobility and access to quality products.

Programme Interventions:

With UNDP support, LLC "Eberbach-Polesie" implemented the SDG Pilot Initiative and launched the country's first production of cast polyurethane tires for wheelchairs in Mozyr (250 tires were produced within the implementation of the SDG Pilot Initiative). The Pilot Initiative was led by Anna Shevko, a woman - wheelchair user, who emphasized the social responsibility of entrepreneurship. The initiative focused not only on manufacturing tires but also on creating new jobs, including for people with disabilities.

Result:

During implementation of the SDG Pilot Initiative, proprietary production technology was developed, and polyurethane density and strength were optimized. The initiative established an import-substitution manufacturing, ensuring the availability of tires on the domestic market. LLC "Eberbach-Polesie" has employed one person with disabilities ensuring contributions to the regional inclusive community. As a result, Belarus now has its first wheelchair tire production facility, reducing dependence on imports, creating jobs, and promoting inclusive business practices. Anna Shevko plans to expand the product range to include armrests, headrests, wheelchair boosters, and orthopedic soles, as well as explore export opportunities to EAEU countries.

Lessons Learned:

Local production of essential components significantly improves their accessibility and affordability for people with disabilities. Socially responsible business models can combine innovation with inclusion, creating jobs, and reducing import dependence. Partnerships and community engagement are key to building sustainable, inclusive enterprises that meet both social and market needs.

Within the reporting period, no assessment or evaluation was undertaken.
