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BACKGROUND

1. Humanitarian context analysis

Heavy rains started to fall in some parts of Central Somalia starting on the week of the 10th of May. On the 15th of May, the regional Shelter Cluster coordinator in Belet Weyne reported that already 750 households were displaced from 18 rural villages and more than 2250 households form Beletweyne town. By the beginning of June according to partners, an estimated 70,000 people have been displaced by floods in Belet Weyne in Hiraan region as a result of the rising water levels in the Shabelle River following heavy rains in the Ethiopian highlands. Nearly 60 per cent of Belet Weyne town is inundated by flood waters. The regional Shelter Cluster Coordinator reported that all settlements that were mapped out by the Shelter cluster partners in the beginning of May, have suffered from the flooding. Only three settlements were not flooded: Ex-airport, Alle-aamin and Nasiib. All settlements were fully enumerated during the exercise and more than 7,150 IDP households were mapped out. According to the local community the current floods are the worst since 1981. Most of the displaced people are reportedly staying with relatives in neighbouring Banaaney, Ceel Jaale, Faafgumarey, Ilkacado, Jawil and Shiirkaneco villages. Ceel Jaale has received the highest number of the displaced.

Increasing river levels in the lower part of Shabelle River, specifically Jowhar and Bulo Burto where river levels are already high, are expected to come as a result of the large amounts of water from the upstream areas, according to the 27 May 2016 Somalia Water and Land Information Management (SWALIM) advisory. This has the potential to put a strain on response systems now focused on the Belet Weyne area. With the reduction of rainfall projected, the river level is expected to reduce in the coming few days. The early warning system developed by partners and the local authorities was able to inform the population of raising waters and allowed them to move with their assets, so as to minimize loss of life and property. Nevertheless, the displacement could last for up to two months based on previous experience.

The situation in Belet Weyne has been worsened due to increased tension following recent fighting between Gaaljecel and Jijeele clans. The clashes reportedly left nearly 40 people dead and another 40 wounded. According to the Protection Cluster, some 6,500 people have fled their homes to Hawlwadaag neighborhood over the last three months following the fighting between the two clans. The fighting, which disrupted humanitarian and commercial operations in the town, finally subsided on 21 May 2016 through a locally brokered cease-fire.

2. Needs assessment

The floods have led to the destruction of infrastructure including roads and bridges and have destroyed farms and crops. Electricity supply and telephone communication in the town have also been disrupted. The interruption of commercial activities has directly impacted people's livelihoods. Partners have expressed concern about a possible upsurge of water borne diseases such as AWD/cholera and an increase in malnutrition due to disruption of livelihood activities, contamination of flood water and lack of adequate drinking water. An increased number of mosquitoes due to swathes of stagnant waters in the town could also lead to increased incidence of malaria. Residents say crocodiles have also been spotted in the pools of stagnant water. Humanitarian partners have raised protection concerns, especially gender based violence.

Water, sanitation services (WASH), shelter, food and health are the most urgent humanitarian needs. Humanitarian partners and civil society organizations continue to scale up response to flood-affected people in Belet Weyne based predominantly on existing stocks of supplies on hand. According to the initial assessments, there is an urgent need for emergency shelter/NFI response to the displaced flood-affected populations. The Shelter Cluster envisages that there is a need to provide emergency assistance through the distribution of Non-Food items for approximately 10.000 households . The Red Cross has already committed to provide assistance with NFIs to 4,000 households. UNHCR, as the lead agency for the Shelter Cluster, has already started to mobilize 2,000 NFIs from the contingency stocks for the refugee returnees (Yemen, Kenya and others). Looking at the current situation in Kenya regarding the closure of the camps, it will be crucial to replenish these stocks. UNHCR is in discussion with UNSOS to help with air-lifting the NFIs to Beletweyne.

3. Description Of Beneficiaries

The target estimated beneficiaries of this intervention are 4,000 households (approximately 24,000 persons). Both IDP populations and riverine (host) communities will be included in this intervention. Particular attention will go to the most vulnerable within the flood-displaced communities: female headed households, child headed households, large households and households with vulnerable persons.

4. Grant Request Justification

The grant is requested to respond the urgent needs that have arised from the flooding of Belewteyne town and the surroundings. The Humanitarian Coordinator has further emphasized that emergency WASH and Shelter/Non-Food items are critical to respond to this disaster. UNHCR as the lead agency will consider using existing contingency stocks (meant for Refugee returnees) to respond to the needs and will replenish the stocks with funding received.

5. Complementarity

As mentioned, the Red Cross has already contributed to providing emergency assistance to 4,500 households. The Red Cross will mainly be targeting Ceel Jalle. UNHCR will compliment this action by providing NFIs to the other locations where people have been displaced. Strong coordination will be necessary to ensure complementation of the Non-Food Items and the hygiene kits.

LOGICAL FRAMEWORK

Overall project objective

To respond to emergency shelter needs of 24,000 individuals (4000 HH) displaced by floods in Beletwyne.

The current floods on Hiran have displaced and exposed persons to adverse weather conditions which require immediate response to avoid further deterioration of the living conditions of the affected persons. Children, women and older person stand the greatest risk of hypothermia.

Accountability to Affected Populations

The distribution of NFIs will follow UNHCR standard operating procedures of NFIs distribution. Prior to the distribution, the beneficiaries will be informed of the contents of the NFI kits, and that that the items are free of charge. All beneficiaries will sign or thumbprint the list of distribution confirming receipt of all the items. Within two weeks after the distribution, the partner will share UNHCR the list of distribution, report along with photos. UNHCR will arrange post distribution monitoring after the distribution.

Implementation Plan

In response to the assessment received from different actors and triangulated/coordinated through the shelter cluster, will respond to the emergency shelter needs in Beletwyne. Due to the long lead time required for international procurement of NFI kits, UNHCR will use it's stocks in Mogadishu and be replenished once SHF funding is received. The composition of the kit for each family includes 1 reinforced plastic tarpaulin, 3 blankets, 2 sleeping mats, 1 kitchen set, 2 collapsible 10litre jerricans and 750 grams of soap. SHF funds under this application will be used to cover procurement, transportation distribution and PDM. These activities will be implemented in partnership with UNHCR strategic partners. Selection criteria will be undertaken on coordination and collaboration with other actors responding to the same emergency to avoid duplication.

Justify Chosen Gender Marker Code

Gender analysis is included in assessment prior to NFI distribution and the result will be reflected on activities to include more than 60% of female beneficiaries. As part of UNHCR NFI distribution strategy, priority is given to women headed households, older persons supporting children and persons with disability. Collected data during registration of beneficiaries is segregated by gender and age to ensure effective follow up. Likewise, PDM information will be gender disaggregated and will inform UNHCR on usability and acceptance of the kits.

Protection Mainstreaming

Protection considerations will be mainstreamed through out the projects circle. Persons with special needs will be accorded extra attention and the "do no harm" principle tested in all the steps.

Country Specific Information

Safety and Security

The distribution processes will be scrutinized to ensure that it does not result in security incidences. Crowd control measures will be put in place and the security personnel sensitized on the need to be calm, humanly and preserve the rights of the beneficiaries.

Access

Beletwyne is currently accessible to humanitarian actors. Appraisals will be undertaken frequently to ensure that both the beneficiaries and humanitarian staff are exposed to risks. Road access to the location from Mogadishu is currently not good posing a challenge to the transportation of kits, delivery by air is being considered.
