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BACKGROUND

1. Humanitarian context analysis

On 20 February 2017 the Integrated Phase Classification (IPC) Working Group declared famine (IPC 5) in Leer and Mayendit counties of Unity State, with the possibility of famine likely or possible in the surrounding areas (IPC 4 - emergency). Areas of Jonglei were classified as IPC 4 including Twic E. Elevated Global Acute Malnutrition (GAM) levels are worsening in these same areas. Southern Unity has the largest proportion of out of school children in the country, following the repeated devastation and displacement between 2014-17. Furthermore, the Education Cluster/ACAPS nationwide EiE Assessment in Dec 2016 found food to be the main reason why children are not in school. It is paramount that the humanitarian community scale up their interventions to reach children systematically and prevent deaths and cognitive underdevelopment due to chronic food shortages, while also keeping children in school. During this time of food shortage, children are more likely to be pulled out of school to help the family find food and will simply be kept home if they have no energy to attend. For girls in particular, earlier drop out and marriage has been an ongoing effect of the economic and food crisis, as families require the economic dowry for household survival. This current desperation will lead to greater displacement, loss of learning gains and prevent children from accessing the protective factors of school (psychosocial support, lifesaving messages and access to other services). It is now more important than ever that children and the school community are taught lifesaving hygiene and nutrition practices to avoid further complications of waterborne diseases and child illnesses in the approaching rainy season.

2. Needs assessment

According to NRC 2017 Education strategy document, access to quality learning for displaced, returnee and conflict-affected children and youth is extremely low and worsening in the current state of extreme hunger and economic collapse, with low completion and high dropout rates, lack of safe educational environments and availability of scholastic materials, high pupil-teacher ratios, poorly qualified and demotivated teachers and highly traumatized school communities. Children are increasingly suffering from trauma, malnutrition and sicknesses such as cholera, measles and malaria, which prevent cognitive development.

Based on that, the objective of the NRC South Sudan Education program is for children and youth affected by violence and displacement to continually access quality and relevant learning in safe and protected environments.

3. Description Of Beneficiaries

NRC's education interventions in South Sudan target the displaced, returnee and host community school-age girls and boys (6-17 years), including those with disabilities. Additionally, all education programs target adult male and female teaching and non-teaching personnel as well as parents and caregivers through Parent-Teacher Associations (PTAs). The State, County and Payam level education authorities are key beneficiaries and partners in implementation. The wider community is targeted through sensitization and awareness raising campaigns, in which all ages and genders are targeted including the elderly. All ethnic groups and those on either side of the political conflict in the given geographies are considered.

For the proposed project, younger male/female students (aged 6-14) in school communities in affected IPC 4/5 areas will be primarily targeted as those in need of nutritious school feeding. Teachers, PTAs members; school mothers/grandmothers and youth from the community will be reached directly with training and income-generation. The wider community will be reached indirectly through community mobilization campaigns and messaging.

4. Grant Request Justification

Based on the above, NRC proposes providing an emergency school feeding mechanism to assure children's continued access to food while continuing their learning and creating a positive pull factor which keeps boys away from fighting and enhances girls' protection. Providing food in school means that children's nutritional intake can be directly monitored, guaranteeing that food that is intended for them is indeed consumed by them. Additionally, the proposed mechanism will create income generation for School Mothers/Grandmothers who will also be a positive female presence in school in addition to training teachers/PTA to spread lifesaving skills related to nutrition and hygiene practices. The action also includes a small youth component to encourage positive community engagement while creating income and filling needed roles in the school feeding mechanism.

The proposed project will be a supplement to ongoing and planned EiE interventions in key areas. The actions will never be stand-alone but will also complement NRC's EiE support which includes the provision of temporary learning structures, teacher training, PTA training, teaching/learning materials and teacher incentive payments. For Southern Unity, the proposed action is contingent upon the EiE Rapid Response Mechanism accessing the area and setting up 90-day initial EiE intervention.

5. Complementarity

Other sectors in NRC (WASH and Food security) will be involved in providing the technical input in implementation of the school feeding in the emergencies to ensure smooth implementation of the project. NRC interventions ensures that the education, NRC embrace the integrated approach where WASH, Shelter and food and food security can be complementing Education while Education remains in center.

<u>Contribution to Cluster/Sector Objectives :</u> Children in acute emergencies' access quality education in a safe and protective environment. Under this objective, the intervention will seek to reduce current barriers to emergency primary education by making learning centers/schools accessible to both boys and girls. However, provision of education is not complete without ensuring learning centers/schools have basic teaching and learning materials. The major focus in the intervention of the education under this project is to ensure the availability of food in the school provides an environment where children can concentrate for a relatively longer period in class and soon as normalcy is restored, resumption of return to the normal learning calendar will be established gradually . Once established, the schools will serve as central point for other lifesaving interventions from multiple sectors.

Monitoring & Reporting plan

Under the technical guidance of M & E Coordinator, the Emergency School Feeding project will be monitored by the M and E officer. NRC will work with already established community structures (youths, PTAs, teachers) and the feedback from the team will be used to replan and adjust where necessary during the implementation. NRC will use the standard M & E output trackers to monitor the progress of implementation and share reports quarterly with the cluster and CHF.

The project team will generate narrative and financial reports that will be used to evaluate progress and provide appropriate recommendations to ensure the implementation is on track as planned.

NRC Head of Programs as well as Education and Food Security Technical Advisors at the country office in Juba, Region office in Nairobi and Head office in Oslo will also offer technical support to ensure smooth implementation of the project.

Accountability to Affected Populations

Community empowerment will remain a key approach in implementation of the project .The community members and established structures (PTAs, Youths, teachers) will be trained on their roles so that they develop a sense of ownership in the project and also support the team to enhance smooth implementation.

The project team will hold meetings with the target beneficiaries and also the community structures to ensure accountability and deliberate feedback opportunities to the beneficiaries in a bid to ensure improved quality of service delivery.

Implementation Plan

At the project level, the implementation of Emergency School Feeding will be managed by a Food security Project Manager (PM) under the direct supervision of the Area Manager. The PM will be supported by a Project Coordinator who will work closely with the technical team composed of two (2) Project Officers and three (3) Assistants Officers, with experience in Education in Emergencies and School Feeding in Emergencies to deliver quality services the targeted beneficiaries.

The key activities to be implemented will include; Establishment of secure and hygienic food storage, establishment of secure and hygienic food storage and Conduct training of teachers/PTA to establish feeding governance structure. The school grandmothers and mothers will be trained on nutrition/ hygiene practices for meal preparation.

Justify Chosen Gender Marker Code

The needs analysis demonstrates an understanding of the different needs of women, men, boys and girls. Beneficiaries are disaggregated by sex and age. In recognition that girls' attendance needs support during this time of extreme hunger, the project has been designed to increase the presence of women in schools (School Mothers/Grandmothers) who will also benefit from gender training and income generation through cooking. School Mothers/Grandmothers in addition to teachers, will be trained on Prevention of Sexual Exploitation & Abuse in Schools. Youth women and men are also engaged in the project to bring in positive role models for young girls and boys and to support the learning environment.

Protection Mainstreaming

NRC is having regular meeting with the GBV/protection partners and seeks their advice in order to adapt the design of facilities and implement them . . Through qualified female hygiene promoters NRC reaches women and adolescent girls to understand their needs and provide sufficient protection. NRC promotes inclusion of a gender balanced team in the interventions, .

In attempt to promote protection of children and increase access to learning, psychosocial support and life skills in acute and protracted emergencies will be mainstreamed in the intervention, and the training package of the target beneficiaries will have a component of the peace activities in the schools as a long term durable solution.

Country Specific Information

Safety and Security

Safety and security situation generally in south Sudan is not satisfactory. To ensure the safety and security of the staff engaged in the project implementation, NRC has internal security and safety policy for the staff movement in and outside of project implementation area. NRC is active member of security working group and NGO Forum. Daily security updates are provided by the staff on the ground in order to act accordingly.

The humanitarian response in South Unity and Twic East will dhere to NRC security protocols. In humanitarian interventions, engagement of the local community in the implementation will be key .For Southern Unity, the proposed action is contingent upon the EiE Rapid Response Mechanism accessing the area and setting up 90-day initial EiE intervention.

In addition, NRC aims to build the capacity of local community (local teachers, mothers, PTAs) to carry on with the implementation should the security situation worsen.

Access

NRC has a education emergency response team and will coordinate ground activities to build the capacity of the key actors in the project. Since the project will be implemented during the rainy season where access of the areas via road will be difficult, air will be the most reliable means. Support staff will be to provide supplies and engage the local staff in initial set up and continuous monitoring of the implementation...
