**Project Summary:** 

The project is intended to enable vulnerable households to produce their own food to prevent further deterioration of food insecurity, malnutrition and associated social crisis and child protection risks by supporting households and communities to protect and build their livelihoods. The activities of this project will include the immediate distribution of vegetable and crop seeds and tools in Torit and Yei counties located in Eastern Equatoria and Central Equatoria where Plan International has field offices and is currently implementing food assistance as well as recovery assistance, child protection, education (primary and early childhood development. The project is designed to complement and strengthen current interventions – including the current WFP funded General Food Distribution in Torit and Plan's own livelihoods intervention in Yei.

The project will target a total of 22,200 individual (52 % female, 48% male). This will support the establishment and maintenance of crop and vegetable gardens for 3,700 HHs in Torit and Yei. The project will target vulnerable farmers from host communities, especially children, women/youth-headed households and people living with HIV/AIDS, as well as people with special needs (i.e. elderly, people with disabilities) will be given priority for targeted livelihood assistance; c) children of those vulnerable communities will benefit from the livelihood intervention; and all people living in targeted areas including IDPs will benefit from the awareness campaign activities on environmental protection in Yei and Torit Counties.

### **BACKGROUND**

#### 1. Humanitarian context analysis

High prevalence of poverty in South Sudan compounded by protracted conflict (political, inter-tribal and cattle raiding) and the associated displacement, dysfunctional market and assets depletion have eroded the majority of people's livelihood and, therefore, forced many of them to live at risk of starvation. According to the IPC February 2017 update, about 4.9 million people in south Sudan will be facing severe food shortage. This is the highest in south Sudan since the beginning of conflict two years ago. In Eastern Equatoria and Central Equatoria, 41.8% of the population lives in Crisis and Emergency phase of the IPC. Market prices are becoming too high (e.g. SSP 1000 SSP for five-liter Jeri can of oil and SSP 300 for a kg of wheat flour in Torit market. The current political stalemates will likely lead to increased insecurity, and therefore, continued people displacement, loss of assets, disruption of livelihoods including market and adaption of destructive copping strategies such as cutting trees for fire wood and charcoal, child labor, abandonment and recruitment into warring parties. In order to prevent a dramatic deterioration of food insecurity, malnutrition and associated social crisis and child protection risks, the need to provide timely and appropriate humanitarian and livelihood assistance is critical in 2017. Discussion with communities and local government revealed the following needs:

The immediate need is to continue getting access to support to protect and expand their livelihood assets to enhance their capacities to cope with recurring shock and reduce their reliance on food aid. In particular the following needs have come out from the discussion and the experience so far with Plan intervention:

• In all project areas, vegetable gardening and fishing is seen as a viable way to ensure food is available to the households' level and access cash through the sale of surplus.

The immediate need is to continue getting access to support to protect and promote their livelihood assets to enhance their capacities to cope with recurring shock and reduce their reliance on food aid. In particular the following needs have come out from the discussion and the experience so far with Plan intervention:

• In all project areas, vegetable gardening and crop farming is seen as a viable way to ensure food is available to the households' level and access cash through the sale of surplus.

### 2. Needs assessment

Plan international recently led a joint inter-agency needs assessment in Torit that have informed our programming on the needs we intend to address. Plan International also participated in the FSNMS and used the outcome of the FSNMS report to make programming decision and identification of the most vulnerable beneficiaries. February IPC update is used to determine the needs in our entire operational areas and the recommended interventions. Vegetable intervention is decided based on the fact that the Household living in Yei and Torit do not have access to their farmland in the outskirts of Yei and Torit to cultivation other cereal crops that requires several fedans of farm land

### 3. Description Of Beneficiaries

Vulnerable people from host communities, especially children, women/youth- headed households and people living with HIV/AIDS and special needs will be given priority for targeted livelihood assistance. 22,000 individuals will benefit from crop and vegetable seeds and tools.

## 4. Grant Request Justification

Plan International intends to implement the project in Torit and Yei Counties. The status of food security of the populations in Yei and Torit is currently categorized as: IPC3 and 4. Torit and Yei Counties are part of the areas that were negatively affected by the July 2016 outbreak of fighting in Juba that quickly spread to the traditionally peaceful Greater Equatoria region. One of the impacts of this fighting was a disruption of a significant part of the second cropping season in Yei and Torit counties. People in Yei and Torit Counties were restricted to access their farms for the greater part of the second half of 2016 due to fighting hence no significant farming activities were done. This was worsened by inconsistent rainfall patterns in the second cropping season as well as a collapsing economic situation in the country. This intervention is designed to prevent further deterioration of vulnerable households'their food security status into famine and aims to improve the food security/nutrition status of the target beneficiaries especially children, lactating and pregnant women. The intervention will build on Plan International ongoing interventions.

Plan International is currently implementing a number of activities in food assistance and livelihood recovery in the proposed target areas in collaboration and funding from WFP and Plan National Offices such as Plan Australia, Germany and Plan Spain) with relevant state/county level local government departments. Plan International has the necessary infrastructure and staffing, knowledge of the target areas and has already established a positive relationship with communities, local government and aid agencies that will be necessary for project effectiveness. Although Plan has existing infrastructure and staffing, it is taking concrete steps in strengthening its organizational capability and establishing a full-fledged field offices in target areas (adding human resources, logistics, M&E, etc.) to enable Plan scaling up and improvement of program quality. Plan Regional Office and International Head quarter teams as well as Plan National Offices team will provide technical and required additional inputs for the country office in improving the planning and quality of project implementation. The proposed project intervention will be integrated and become complementary with food assistance project supported by WFP in Torit and Plan's own Livelihoods Intervention in Yei to enhance the effectiveness and impact of the intervention. The WFP supported Food Assistance project in Torit is offering short term immediate food needs of households through general food distributions and Food for Assets while this proposed project provides opportunities for improving harvests and nutritional diversity of households by distribution of crop and vegetable seeds and tools. This is expected to have long term effects of improving household food security through improved harvests. In Yei, Plan Interational with support from the Dutch Foreign Ministry is implementing a crop seeds and tools project and Lainya county. This project will complement the existing project by increasing coverage of households benefiting from a food security and livelihoods intervention. The two projects will also leverage on each other on coordination platforms in the State.

### 5. Complementarity

Plan International will work closely with FAO and its partners to complements each other's activities in the areas of our operation as much as possible as well bridge gaps that exist within the partnerships especially in ensuring that protection and rebuilding of livelihoods is achieved in these project locations.

### Monitoring & Reporting plan

Project monitoring will be guided by a monitoring and reporting framework as part of the Emergency response plan where this project is contributing to within Plan International South Sudan. A pre planting baseline survey will be conducted to assess targeted beneficiaries' vulnerability, needs and access to enable land and farming tools. After distribution and planting of seeds and tools, a post planting survey will be conducted as a form of post distribution monitoring to ascertain household use of seeds and tools as well as crop condition. A possible post-harvest survey will also be conducted depending on budgetary allowances to assess yield attributable to the inputs provided. In all these monitoring processes, communities will participate through the use of participatory approaches like FGDs, participation in enumeration and sampling processes as well as joint monitoring missions with community leadership and RRC. Monitoring tools such as pre planting, post planting and post harvest survey tools will be used in this project.

### **Accountability to Affected Populations**

Plan international is keen to make the community and people affected by crisis participate in decision making on issues that concern them. This means that a feedback mechanism will be in place for beneficiaries to raise their complaint to be addressed. A feedback mechanism will enable us improve on implementation of the project in addressing the people's needs. This will be achieved by establishing a complaint desk during our distribution and other activities. Committees will be set up in all the location of our work to hear from the community members who feel more comfortable talking to their own community members and in turn convey the message to Plan staff.

## Implementation Plan

This project will be implemented by Plan international in Yei and Torit Counties. Once the recruitment of new staff is completed, Plan international will embark on community mobilization process to sensitize the community about the importance of the project, this will be done in collaboration with the local authorities and local chiefs with active participation of the community members so that they own the project. After the mobilization process is done, a routine needs assessment will kick off to inform decision making and the identification of beneficiaries which in turn will be registered, after the registration of the beneficiaries, a verification exercise will be carried out to ensure that these are the intended beneficiaries. When verification is done, crop and vegetable seeds plus tools will be prepositioned in the distribution sites where they will finally be distributed to the intended beneficiaries. When the distribution is done, a distribution report will be generated and shared.

### Justify Chosen Gender Marker Code

The project will use an assessment and prioritization tool primarily to maximize inclusion of vulnerable women and adolescent girls. Promotion of the provision of crop and vegetable seeds and tools to the most needy will be proactively pursued through coordinated interagency response. Overall beneficiary selection will be made with the active participation of women and adolescent girls as groups to minimize the influence of men/chiefs due to culture and power relations. The project will take affirmative action to increase women's participation and membership in the management of the distribution of crop and vegetable seeds and tools.

### **Protection Mainstreaming**

Protection of all people affected and at risk does inform our program decision making and response including engagement with local authorities. It is central to our preparedness efforts as part of immediate and lifesaving activities and throughout the duration of our project and beyond. In practical terms this means identifying who is at risk, how and why at the very outset of our project and therefore taking into account vulnerabilities that underlie this risks including those experienced by men, women, boys and girls and groups such as internally displaced people, older people, people with disabilities and people with special needs.

### **Country Specific Information**

### Safety and Security

Plan International has established safety and security procedures that includes SOPs for staff, transport and journey management procedures as well as regular assessments and security updates for all our operational areas. Plan International always work with the security cluster in getting and sharing security updates for all our operational areas. In this project, Plan International will collaborate with all organizations working in both Yei and Torit in joint planning of activities and convoys to the field to ensure enhanced access and security. Plan International will also ensure conflict sensitive programming where our distributions will be based on a detailed security analysis and will be held in conditions and timings that do not worsen or expose beneficiary communities to further risk of violence. Other associated activities like trainings and assessments will adopt the same approach.

#### Access

Plan International has both road and air access to Torit and Air Access to Yei. At this time, insecurity is high in some counties of Eastern Equatoria and Central Equatoria states. However, Plan International monitors the situation on daily bases through Plan International field offices in Torit and Yei.
