I. Overview

In January 2012, UN Action awarded UNFPA and UNICEF US \$642,000 from its Multi-Partner Trust Fund (MPTF) to support on-going implementation of the Gender-Based Violence Information Management System (GBVIMS) in selected conflict-affected contexts for a 12-month period. UNFPA is responsible for overall project oversight, including hiring and housing the Inter-agency Coordinator, coordinating the Steering Committee, representing the project externally, and managing the rollout processes at the HQ and field levels. UNICEF focuses on developing and piloting the bundled Caring for Survivors Training Course and managing the Surge Team. The original proposal for this Phase 1 of this project is attached as reference.

Included in this proposal are a request and justification for an extension of the current remaining funding from the 2012 grant (a balance of US \$365,612), as well as a request for additional funds (US \$908,387.2) to cover the second phase of the project through 30 September 2014.

II. Summary of Achievements (2012)

Consultants and Inter-agency Coordinator recruitment

With funding from UN Action's MPTF, the GBVIMS team comprised of UNFPA, UNICEF, UNHCR, WHO and the International Rescue Committee (IRC), has reinforced its global structure with the recruitment of two consultants (the "Surge Team") and an Inter-agency Coordinator (IAC) for the GBVIMS. The GBVIMS Surge Team consists of two (2) consultants, Anne Kluyskens and Sunita Palekar, hired by UNICEF on the behalf of the GBVIMS Steering Committee, as well as a consultant



(Kendra Pasztor) hired by UNHCR from their own internal resources³. Their role includes providing incountry assistance through hands-on support to new rollout sites and to agencies currently using the GBVIMS as well as remote support by acting as focal points to troubleshoot implementation issues. In addition to the Surge Team, in August 2012, Céline Calvé was hired by UNFPA as the new GBVIMS IAC, responsible for implementing and/or monitoring implementation of the UN Action project outputs as well as for overall coordination of the GBVIMS Steering Committee and implementation sites.

Support on- and off-site inter-agency rollout efforts in conflict-affected contexts

Under this grant, the GBVIMS team has continued to implement the system tools in humanitarian contexts in various countries. Rollout contexts were selected based on a predetermined set of eligibility criteria already in use by the inter-agency GBVIMS team, while also taking into consideration UN Action's list of priority countries and current major crises (e.g. Syria and the Sahel). Remote support and technical backstopping have been provided on a regular basis by the Surge Team, and members of the GBVIMS Steering Committee to requests that are made by GBVIMS users and/or service providers operating in conflict-affected contexts. In addition, 10 in-country missions have taken place since the appointment of the Surge Team and seven (7) are scheduled to take place before the end of 2012. The table in Annex B reflects on the objectives and outcomes of past and future GBVIMS technical support missions.

Development of new Technical Assistance Resources

In line with commitments made within Phase 1 of the UN Action-funded project, the GBVIMS Steering Committee has initiated the development of eleven (11) guidance notes that will support GBVIMS data gathering organizations on various key issues and provide insight for non-GBVIMS users into some of the most challenging issues confronted by the humanitarian community in relation to GBVIMS usage. One of particular relevance to UN Action, is a guidance note that is being developed on the intersections between the GBVIMS and the Monitoring, Analysis and Reporting Arrangements (MARA) that will include specific information on when, how and under which conditions the GBVIMS can be used to support MARA reporting. In addition, new easily-accessible GBVIMS resources have been prioritized during the Annual Retreat to support users (e.g. how-to videos and webinars). These resources will be made available on the newly re-designed GBVIMS website - www.gbvims.org - that was launched in October 2012. The production and dissemination of the GBVIMS Facilitator's Guide and Rollout Guidelines is another key achievement of the project in 2012.

III. Justification for Phase 2 of the UN Action GBVIMS Project

UNFPA and UNICEF, on behalf of the GBVIMS Steering Committee, are requesting an extension of the remaining funds (US \$365,612) through 30 September 2014. The rationale behind this request is the necessity to have more time to complete the activities outlined in the original project proposal. These activities were delayed due to the significant lag time in hiring both the Surge Team and, especially, the IAC.

Regarding other relevant project activities, the need for conducing at least one Caring for Survivors training alongside the GBVIMS remains a priority to ensure that GBVIMS data gathering occurs in

tandem with high-quality, survivor-centred care. Additionally, although tentative requests were made by actors in both the Middle East and West and Central Africa regions for a training-of-trainers on the GBVIMS, this activity could not take place in 2012 as originally planned due to the acute need for incountry support, especially in crisis affected countries responding to Syria refugee influx, and in the Sahel region, and lack of dedicated GBVIMS human resources during the first six to eight months of the grant period. Both activities will be prioritized for 2013.

The GBVIMS Steering Committee is requesting additional funds (US \$908,387.2) to sustain and extend the initial gains made through Phase 1 of this project. Lessons learned through past rollout efforts suggest that the GBVIMS cannot truly take hold in a humanitarian context without consistent on- and off-site support over at least a 6-month period. Given the number of conflict-affected and other humanitarian contexts currently demanding support to use the GBVIMS, the GBVIMS Steering Committee requires more time to successfully catalyse use of the GBVIMS within identified priority countries. At the core of this support is extension of the "technical team" of dedicated staff and consultants within UNFPA, UNICEF and UNHCR.

As referenced above, in mid-2012, outside of the context of the grant from UN Action, UNHCR hired a consultant to provide support to their efforts to introduce the GBVIMS within key refugee contexts. This consultant has become a critical member of the GBVIMS team and vital part of many inter-agency missions (including Ethiopia, Kenya, and Uganda and, in the coming weeks, Chad). The inclusion of UNHCR as a project partner will enable an even more unified and UN-system wide approach to rollout efforts in refugee contexts, including most critically in the context of the Syria and Sahel responses. As such, UNFPA and UNICEF on behalf of the GBVIMS Steering Committee would like to expand this project to include UNHCR as a core partner, and support funding for the aforementioned consultant for an additional 16 months.

These additional funds required for Phase 2 of the project will allow greater time for implementation of project activities, while also ensuring continued support to conflict-affected countries that have just started to use (or are considering using) the GBVIMS. In addition to the in-country support missions, Phase 2 of the project will allow greater time for the development of the aforementioned guidance notes. For instance, the GBVIMS Steering Committee has already received support requests for the preparation of various countries' contributions to the Secretary–General's Annual Report on Conflict Related Sexual Violence (specifically for Mali, Somalia, and Afghanistan). Therefore there is a need for the Steering Committee to allocate more time to understand the challenges and concerns faced by GBVIMS users with regards to MARA to ensure that the team creates a relevant and useful a guidance note on the GBVIMS-MARA relationship.

New funding for UNFPA will cover the salary and related expenses (office space, communications, computer, etc.) for the IAC (US \$200,000 for a 12-month period - 1 September 2013 to 31 August 2014). New funding for UNICEF will be used to manage the Surge Team (US \$382,960 including salary and travel costs for 18 months from April 2013 - September 2014). Funds for UNHCR will be used for the full-time GBVIMS consultant (US \$266,000 including salary and travel costs for technical support missions as well as training costs). This consultant will act similarly to the Surge Team (and will be considered as a part of this core technical team with the IAC and IRC staff) but will focus on refugee contexts, in line with UNHCR's mandate.



Although UNFPA and UNICEF would need confirmation of an extension approval before the end of 2012, if approved, receipt of the new funds could wait <u>until March 2013</u>.
