PART 1: OVERALL PROJECT PROGRESS

Briefly outline the status of the project in terms of implementation cycle, including whether preliminary/preparatory activities have been completed (i.e. contracting of partners, staff recruitment, etc.) (1500 character limit):

The National Coordination Mechanism (NCM) was officially launched on 06 November 2019, a key milestone for strengthening the capacity of the government to facilitate sustainable and holistic reintegration of returnees. Out of the 8 thematic working groups formed under the NCM, the communications platform and the labour migration thematic working group has been established and operational; policy and data, border management and migration and development thematic working groups are currently under formation. The project continues to support the Government of the Gambia (GoTG) in providing necessary technical assistance and resources. To promote economic reintegration, the toll-free helpline is being finalized following the approval by Public Utilities Regulatory Authority (PURA).

To date, 1167 community members from 7 regions has been provided with medical and psychosocial assistance through the mobile health team. Furthermore 30 communities with 2780 community members were engaged in dialogue sessions by way of small meetings known as "bantabas". In addition, 180 traditional communicators were trained for community engagements and youth dialogues.

Please indicate any significant project-related events anticipated in the next six months, i.e. national dialogues, youth congresses, film screenings, etc. (1000 character limit): The COVID-19 pandemic has significantly changed the landscape of activities in the country with restrictions and social distancing measures in place. As such, physical gatherings are minimized including film screenings, and dialogues. With this is mind, a shift to digital strategy is in place to address stigma and discrimination of migrants including returnees specifically in the context of COVID-19. The project continues to support development and airing of linguistically appropriate short videos on stigma and discrimination. Short videos were developed on stigma and discrimination in four languages (English, Wolof, Fula and Mandinka). Sensitization was also done on risk communication and community engagement in border health communities. The MHPSS trainings for local actors and health workers is currently ongoing and being rolled out across all regions in the country.

The NCM is a government-led interagency platform aimed to ensure a whole-of-government approach to migration governance. The NCM is a platform for coordination and cooperation among stakeholders on migration issues. Following the

launch of the NCM, a communications platform has also been established under the Office of the Vice President and chaired by the Ministry of Information, Communication and Infrastructure (MOICI). This will immensely contribute to coordinating messages relating to irregular migration and providing timely, accurate and updated information and support services to returnees and vulnerable youths.

The first National Framework for Migrants with Mental Health Needs as well as the Training Curricula for all stakeholders dealing with migrants' mental health needs are an institutional framework that will serve as a guide to further support the mental health and psychosocial needs of migrants the host communities.

Through the mobile health team, the project delivers comprehensive health assistance to communities with highest returnees. In December 2019, following the sinking of the vessel carrying mostly Gambian migrants off the coast of Mauritania, a mobile health team was deployed to provide assistance to 78 Gambian survivors with a focus on medical and mental health and psychosocial support. Sulayman, an 18 year old from the North Bank region of The Gambia, says that he will never forget what he saw on the day that he was caught up in a devastating tragedy: the ship he was travelling on sank off the Mauritanian coast, drowning at least 62 people who had left the country, in the hope of a better life elsewhere. One of the most distressing details for Sulayman, is the fact that other vessels witnessed the tragedy unfolding but chose to do nothing. "There were two fishing boats who saw we were sinking, but they didn't help us", remembers Sulayman. "They knew the area was deadly and yet, they did not help. You don't forget that.". The MHPSS assistance under the project together with reception assistance provided by the EU-IOM Joint Initiative helped the survivors as well as the communities members. The training of community change agents has helped the community with tools to support families in identifying symptoms of distress, as several different factors determine the likelihood of survivors needing mental health and psychosocial support.

The project in partnership with HOPE Basketball Academy (founded by a returnee) supported the Academy on their annual basketball clinic on the theme "Migration and Peacebuilding." The sports clinic provided an avenue to inspire, empower and also enlighten through discussions on peacebuilding, irregular migration and reintegration. The clinic sparked conversations from the youth participants broadening their knowledge on migration issues as well as drawing inspiration and lessons from returnees.

Outcome 1: Gambian society has a balanced and positive perception of return migration.

Rate the current status of the outcome progress: on track

Progress summary: (3000 character limit)

Data on migrants' perceptions on return and reintegration was collected that serve as baseline data. Data gathered is being used for a full research study on "Migrant Returnees' Perception of Reintegration in The Gambia". Data collection and first draft have been shared with relevant stakeholders to conduct a thorough review before finalizing for validation and public consumption. Proposed recommendations from the research, will serve as guide for future interventions on strengthening holistic reintegration of returnees.

The communications platform is already established under the Office of the Vice President (OVP) and chaired by the Ministry of Information and Communication Infrastructure (MOICI). The communication strategy through a consultancy is being finalized and will include a practical action plan for implementation. With the current COVID-19 pandemic, the plan is to host the validation of the strategy virtually after the submission of the first draft are put in place. Similarly, the youth toll free line with the National Youth Council is near completion. The operations centre is already equipped with laptops, desktops, printers, and internet connection; the salaries for the operator (one year) have already been paid for. The approval for the toll-free line has been granted by the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority (PURA), however the National Youth Council is finalizing with the GSM operators for the dedicated number to be allocated to the call centre. Once this is finalized, the platform will be launched and released to the public.

A documentary is currently being developed capturing the stories of ten returning migrants is currently being produced through one of the partners Activista. Once ready, this material is expected to serve as an advocacy tool to promote youth inclusion in all aspects of social development. Also through UNFPA, a peacebuilding trainer's manual have been developed on early warning peace building paradigms and dispute resolution mechanisms to standardise training on peacebuilding across the various projects through one of the implementing partners WANEP. National level trainers were recruited and trained using resources from the project on increased women and youth participation in decision making processes and as agents of community conflict prevention.

Most migrants (and returnees) are young males – approximately 97% are male and 90% are youth within the ages of 18-35

<u>Outcome 2:</u> The Government of The Gambia demonstrates strengthened capacity to facilitate sustainable reintegration contributing to enhanced social cohesion and inclusion.

Rate the current status of the outcome progress: on track

Progress summary: (3000 character limit)

The National Coordination Mechanism (NCM) was officially launched on November 6, 2019 led by the Office of the Vice President (OVP) and through IOM's technical assistance. Since its launch, 8 thematic working groups were formed. The Communications Platform (headed by the Ministry of Information, Communications and Infrastructure) and the Labor Migration Working Group (led by the Ministry of Trade, Industry, Regional Integration and Employment) are established and operational. A Policy and Data Working Group, a Border Management Working Group and Migration and Development Working Group are under formation and will also be anchored under NCM. However, the current challenge has largely to do with the suspension of activities such as the consultative meetings of the thematic working groups and the high-level Ministerial Conference that was planned for March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The project will also support in the provision of necessary equipment to the OVP.

Under output 2.2, the ITC engaged Gamjobs through the RESTART project, an initiative to enhance economic reintegration through coaching and job placement. The initiative involved 57 participants (11 female and 46 male) successfully completing the program. Through a consultancy with Jobs Consulting (Gambian Human Resource experts based in Norway) and in partnership with the Department of Labour, a total of 32 institutions (both public and private) were identified and mapped with 20 responding with information to be incorporated in the referral platform for employment opportunities. Through the consultancy assignment with Jobs Consulting, three staff of the Department of Labour (consisting of the Commissioner, Labour Officer and Assistant) were capacitated in job counselling and referral best practices. Furthermore, the support also included the purchase of furniture and electronic equipment ranging from laptops and printers with internet connection which was given to the staff of the Employment Service Unit of the Department.

Through the technical guidance of WHO and in partnership with IOM and the Ministry of Health, the development of the National Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) Framework and Curriculum on migrant returnees has been completed after review meetings have been held by various stakeholders on April 2020. The stakeholders comprised the Ministry of Health, Department of Social Welfare, Academic and Training Institutions, National Youth Council, and some members of the Civil Society. In-depth discussions were held, and recommendations made to both consultants of the MHPSS Framework and Curriculum for further development before submitting the final document for validation. Upon finalization and validation of the framework and curriculum, distribution of the documents will be made on a national level to better equip care givers and local actors to enhance capacity to deliver better mental health services.

The NCM is an institutional platform for migration governance that will benefit the general population. Also, the National framework for migrants with mental health needs will provide coverage mainly to target the youth population. The RESTART project is targeting youth returnees (18-35 years old). The beneficiaries for the communications platform also ranges from youth, women and the entire general public to be informed on key messaging around migration issues. The platform though established under this project will still serve the needs of the government and the public even after the project ends.

Outcome 3:

Returnees enjoy enhanced access to psychosocial, political, social and economic reintegration of services.

Rate the current status of the outcome progress: on track

Progress summary: (3000 character limit)

The project has been providing technical support and a series of capacity building initiatives targeting key stakeholders working directly with returnees and their communities in providing MHPSS support and general health services. 152 community change agents have been trained from 7 regions; the trained actors were mobilized from communities of highest return with 6 mobile health teams deployed in the regions. 1,167 beneficiaries including returnees, their families and communities have benefitted from the outreach activities. The recent COVID-19 pandemic has posed challenges on restrictions on mass gatherings that will not enable the project to conduct outreach activities. Also, the pandemic has brought out the issue of stigma and discrimination against migrants, with migrants being branded as carriers of the disease. To address this issue, awareness raising activities under the risk communication and community engagement (RCCE) included a short video on stigma and discrimination has been developed in four languages (English, Wolof, Mandinka, and Fula). Broadcasting of audio and video content on stigma and discrimination has also been completed, including 346 minutes on 7 TV stations, 1,180 minutes on 10 radio stations, and 1,180 minutes on 10 community radios. To help communities of highest return in containing further spread of the disease, hygiene promotion initiatives are being conducted to communities of highest returns. To date, IOM supported the Upper River Region (URR) through personal protective equipment for front line officers and hygiene kits to household members.

Youth centres in Bundung (Kanifing Municipal Council) and Jarra Soma (Lower River Region) are under refurbishment. The youth centre in Bundung is near completion whilst the refurbishment of the Jarra Soma centre has projected a 7weeks completion plan. Business model and sustainability plan for the two centres are all developed and finalized.

In December 2019, UNFPA was able to engage 2,780 community members in dialogue sessions by way of small community meetings known as "bantabas". This included elders, chiefs, religious leaders and local authorities, among others, and was facilitated by Traditional Communicators (TCs) who sensitized the audience on challenges faced by returnees and the conditions leading to their choice to migrate, encouraging dialogue on ways to discourage irregular migration and support

successful reintegration. Remaining activity is being reprogrammed to support The Gambia Government Response to COVID-19. Specifically, the national surveillance and contact tracing have been enhanced with the participation of young people including returning migrants. This intervention aims to recruit community members in the various districts of The Gambia to serve as contact tracers of possible Covid 19 infected individuals and report to the national surveillance system for necessary action.

The MHPSS trainings in the various regions targeted mostly individuals within the youth bracket. Out of the total number of 152 change agents trained in the seven regions, 71 were female (46.7%). This represents a good number of female community mental health nurses and social workers. 712 women (61%) among the 1167 beneficiaries received medical and psychocosocial assistance through the mobile health activity.

(1500 character limit)	Due to the COVID pandemic, a lot of activities had to be reprogrammed. This has led to a reduction of activities and number of target people especially for outreaches, community dialogues and trainings in observance of social distancing rules. However, the use of online resources to conduct meetings and trainings has been greatly utilized. The reprogramming of some activities has also paved the way to assist the government in the COVID response through awareness raising, enhancing infection prevention control through hygiene promotion in communities of highest return. Furthermore, activities have been centered around addressing stigma and discrimination of migrants through risk communication and community engagement likewise promoting social cohesion.
