ANNUAL HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. A consulting firm has been hired to develop the social protection policy
- 2. The work plan for the development of the policy framework including desk reviews and stakeholder consultations has been finalized in consultation with the Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs and Disaster Management

SITUATION UPDATE

A social protection system does not currently exist in Somalia in the traditional sense: There is no government policy and no government run programmes that could be considered to fall under the purview of a social protection (SP) system. Informal social protection systems are strong however, with systems of support founded in clan and Islamic traditions established and well followed, both domestically and from the diaspora in the form of remittances.

Under the New Deal Framework from 2012-2016, within the aid architecture of the Peace and State Building Goals (PSGs) there was a social protection sub-working group under PSG5 for Revenue and Services, co-led by WFP and UNICEF, where efforts were concentrated in growing awareness, understanding, commitment and energy for the development of social protection. Understanding of social protection was almost not present initially.

An informal donor-working group was formed in 2015 to discuss how to address the gap and the lack of progress seen under the SP sub-working group in PSG5. The most stable interest and presence in this informal group was found by a few key donors. An idea of small milestones to be pursued one by one emerged from this group, with the first being the development of a definition of SP for Somalia.

Towards the end of 2015, a definition for Social Protection in Somalia was drafted and agreed by the sub-working group, and was quickly followed by a concept note outlining initial and mid-term priorities and milestones. A training was given to approximately 25 government representatives in April 2016, building capacity and interest. There was a strong push following this by participants to include social protection in the National Development Plan, where it now features under the Resilience Chapter.²

NARRATIVE

In late 2016 and early 2017, funding from the Italian Cooperation through the MPTF was secured for a joint programme WFP is working with UNICEF to develop a social protection policy and a number of supporting activities. However, the MPTF funds were only received in September of 2017, thereby delaying the start of activities by several months. There are two main components of the programme: (1) the **development of the social protection policy and framework** in partnership with the federal and regional member states as well as (2) **identifying strategies to reach the most vulnerable** through a set of research methods (mainly focus group discussions) throughout the country. There a number of smaller, related components, that will include capacity development plan, social protection indicators linking to SDG targets, a communications strategy and mapping of service locations.

Outcome 1. Policy and institutional frameworks for social protection are developed

Output 1.1: Social protection policy for Somalia developed

- A consulting firm was contracted to work on the policy and framework (including the desk review, consultations, and finalizing of the policy) in October 2017. In December, the firm and the Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs developed a work plan for the desk review, timings of the consultations and community FGDs, presenting the draft and finalization of the policy.
- In December, the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs requested meetings with UNICEF and WFP on the Social Protection programme. The two agencies introduced the programme to the ministries and set up a follow up meeting for mid-January 2018. Ministry of Labour has since joined the programme leadership.

Other Key Achievements

Challenges (incl: Delays or Deviations) and Lessons Learnt:

There was a significant delay in receiving the funds from the MPTF: the grant started at the beginning of 2017 and the funds received in September 2017, therefore in December we requested an extension on the grant until 2019. The consulting firm to oversee the development of the policy was hired in October 2017. Soon after, the Somali capital suffered a large bomb blast with hundreds of fatalities, requiring the government to initiate an emergency response to help survivors. The Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs and Disaster Management (the government lead on this project) focused its resources on coordinating the emergency response and was not available for meetings and consultations until December 2017. The bomb blast and the emergency efforts afterwards therefore delayed the progress of the project, pushing key meetings with government counterparts to early 2018.
