HIGHLIGHTS OF KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

The Joint Programme has agreed on leadership and approach with government partners moving forward, critically with regards to the consultation processes to develop a draft social protection policy. The first Steering Committee meeting has taken place, with three Ministries, including the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs (MoLSA) who has now taken on the leadership of social protection, including the activities of the joint programme. An interministerial technical working group has been formed to support the policy development process, and the consulting agency has completed a social protection desk review which allows for lessons learning in policy and framework development for Somalia. A contract has also been agreed to develop a capacity gap analysis through the consultation process to better understand where and how these needs should be prioritized moving forward.

SITUATION UPDATE

The Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs (MoLSA) has come to the forefront and confirmed their leadership of social protection as per government mandates moving forward. This agreement was reached in conjunction with the Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs and Disaster Management (MoHADM) and the Ministry of Planning, Investment and Economic Development (MoPIED) who will both continue to have strong roles in working with MoLSA on social protection and the joint programme moving forward. All three ministries are members of the Steering Committee, with the Minister of MoLSA chairing.

Social Protection and the work of the joint programme continues to be a focus under the Resilience Pillar, with the Pillar Working Group, and the Social Protection, Food Security and Nutrition Sub-Working Group acting as key coordination bodies for the programme.

In addition to the Pillar Working Group (and sub-Working Group), and the Joint Programme Steering Committee, a government Technical Working Group has also been agreed, with membership from a wide range of ministries with a key role to play in social protection moving forward. This group will serve to advise and coordinate throughout the consultation processes of the policy development.

These developments have seen a pushing back of certain activities in the workplan, critically the consultation processes for the policy development as it was necessary to have clear government leadership, mandates and roles agreed at the federal level before this begun. These consultations are now scheduled to begin in July.

NARRATIVE

2018 has brought a strong new partner into the programme, being the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs (MoLSA). We consider this to be a very positive development, with the government mandate for social protection now clearly sitting with MoLSA it is important they are a strong part of the joint programmes activities and implementation. It also brings Somalia in-line with international practice on mandate and leadership for social protection.

This development, while positive, did bring some challenges to the programme, in the need to ensure that leadership and roles were clearly agreed before moving forward with federal member state consultations. The role of the Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs and Disaster Management (MoHADM) remains critical to the social protection joint programme, particularly in light of the importance of developing shock-responsive systems, and the work of the ministry in particular in working on joining the humanitarian and development spheres. Similarly, the Ministry of Planning, Investment and Economic Development (MoPIED) remains critical in bringing together the many ministries that need to be engaged moving forward, and of course, the federal member states.



Despite the delay in the consultations processes for the policy development, important achievements have been made in this period, with the steering committee formed and meeting, an agreement reached on the role of the government Ministries engaged, and a Technical Working Group formed with representatives from a significant number of ministries engaged to support the policy development process.

A consulting group was contracted to begin work on the communications strategy and implementation plan, a capacity assessment to be undertaken in conjunction with the member state consultations, and the development of SDG indicators and a realistic roadmap for Somalia. Recruitment processes are also underway for a specialist to assist in better understanding vulnerability, with a particular focus on exclusion and inclusion.

An IMS specialist has also undertaken two missions to map and analyze the databases utilized by the humanitarian community, with the goal of better understanding vulnerability characteristics as they are captured in these systems. A first report of this exercise is under draft.

Finally, a key senior member of MoLSA was supported in undertaking the World Bank's core course on Social Protection in Washington, D.C., significantly raising the capacity of the ministry and building new relationships with core external partners, including the World Bank.

All of these activities contribute towards the Pillar Working Group's milestone of development a social protection policy and building foundational frameworks.

Other Key Achievements

• There has been a new interest in social protection, and specifically in safety nets as the humanitarian community looks to options for sustainable transition from emergency cash transfers. The joint programme has played a critical role in raising the profile and role of the government in these discussions and providing a resource in its activities and work towards this.

Challenges (incl: Delays or Deviations) and Lessons Learnt:

The consultations process for the policy development and other key activities under the joint programme were delayed for the first quarter and more of 2018, largely due to the need to ensure government had the space and support to agree internally on clear leadership and roles in the process moving forward.

The planned capacity building session that was agreed to take place in the Sub-Working Group has been delayed due to a long break in Pillar Working Group meetings. The Joint Programme would still prefer to utilize the official coordination mechanism of experts and actors provided by the SWG, however if necessary will undertake these activities separately to avoid further delays in the second half of 2018.

• The consultation processes for the policy development are scheduled to begin in July, with key government counterparts in each member state consulted, as well as development and humanitarian partners, community members

and leaders, donors, and the private sector. This consultation process will provide the necessary information to begin the drafting process of the policy, in consultation with the government technical working group.

- Alongside the consultation process for policy development, a capacity assessment will take place to allow us to better identify and plan for capacity development activities later in the year.
- A communications strategy will be developed, building on the information gained through community and government
 consultations on social protection to ensure we are able to identify gaps in understanding and plan communication and
 advocacy pieces accordingly.
- Research will be undertaken in vulnerable communities to better understand the challenges of inclusion and exclusion, and characteristics of vulnerability in Somalia.
- The programme intends to hold an official 'launch' event at the opening of the federal level consultation event, which will include high level guests, including from the Italian Cooperation as the donor.
