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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Key project achievements:

In collaboration with the Anuradhapura District Secretariat and ground level partner SAFE Foundation, IOM delivered assistance to a total of **1,163 beneficiaries**. Out of the total beneficiaries, 666 were women (278 under 18 years) and 497 were men (228 below the age of 18).

The support comprised relief packages of dry food rations for 115 vulnerable migrant returnee families, 115 low-income families in the community and 295 individual beneficiaries in eight shelters. The food items provided were sufficient for a period of one month.

Additional support in the form of hygiene items were provided to the residents of the eight shelters. These shelters housed victims of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV), expectant mothers, orphans, differently abled persons and elders.

IOM's strategic planning and coordination contributed to this rapid response and efficient delivery of food and non-food items (NFI) assistance across the Anuradhapura district. The project activities were carried out adhering to the COVID-19 safety protocols and hygiene practices to prevent COVID -19 transmission risks.

#### I. Purpose

The humanitarian assistance project entitled: *Provision of essential food and non-food-items assistance for migrant returnees and their communities affected by COVID-19 in Anuradhapura district* was funded by the Government of Australia and implemented by the International Organization for Migration (IOM). The project is funded from under a broader COVID-19 funding pool of the United Nations Multi-Partner Trust Fund .The project aimed to provide assistance to improve safety and living conditions of the most vulnerable migrant returnees and their host communities affected by COVID-19 in Anuradhapura district, through provision of essential food and non-food items.

**Outcome 1:** Access to food provisions and hygiene kits enable protection in the short term for the COVID-19 affected migrant returnees and their host communities.

**Output 1.1**: 600 persons of migrant returnee and low-income families and 200 persons in 3 shelters worst affected by COVID-19 receive food provisions.

Output 1.2: 200 persons in 3 shelters have access to hygiene kits.

#### **II.** Assessment of Programme Results

Contributing to Outcome 1, the project achieved 100 per cent timely service delivery of essential food items and hygiene items as planned. This support provided short term relief to COVID-19 affected migrant returnees and vulnerable members of their host communities. The project contributed to the National COVID-19 response plan for migrant workers, Sri Lanka Preparedness and Response Plan (SPRP) formulated by the Government that calls for support from the UN agencies in areas of Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH), and Food and shelter and the UN Sri Lanka's framework for socio-economic response. The project primarily contributed to SDGs 2, 6 and 10.

# Output 1.1: 600 persons of migrant returnee and low-income families and 200 persons in 3 shelters worst affected by COVID-19 receive food provisions

A total of 1,163 individuals were assisted with dry rations and other food items. This comprised 392 individuals from 115 migrant returnee families, 476 individuals from 115 low income households and 295 individuals in eight shelters. The food items provided were sufficient for a period of one month for families and shelters. The contents of the relief package consisting of food items/dry rations are presented in Annex 1. The beneficiaries were selected from all 22 divisions of Anuradhapura district. Table 1 below provides a breakdown of beneficiary assistance.

Most migrant returnees among the above group have returned after January 2020 from the following countries listed below. Some are either without employment or are engaging in informal daily paid work or agriculture. The relief packages were individually handed over to beneficiary families.

All eight shelters were visited by IOM and SAFE Foundation staff and the items were handed over to the shelter managers for further distribution to the residents who include victims of SGBV, expectant mothers, orphans, differently abled persons and elders.

The SOS village Director of the Children's shelter remarked: On behalf of SOS Children's Village Anuradhapura, I want to extend my heart-felt thanks for the commitment of your organization during the COVID-19 pandemic. Your helping hands in providing dry rations and sanitary equipment were a great relief for us to cover the huge running costs of our shelter in this unexpected situation. Once again thank you so much for your generous donation to our organization and we truly appreciate your commitment to our children.

As indicated in Table 3, **295** beneficiaries in **8** shelters were assisted with hygiene items. The contents of the relief package consisted of hygiene items including household cleaning products, hand sanitizer, baby diapers, tooth brushes, tooth paste, shaving kits, towels, bedlinen, dignity kits (sanitary pads etc.). Special kits with baby *items (shown in photo right)* were provided to five expectant mothers at the shelter for SGBV victims.

These shelters were identified by the Anuradhapura district secretariat officials, namely the women development officer, social welfare officer, and child protection officer, in coordination with SAFE Foundation and IOM. The list of shelters to be assisted was also endorsed by the Anuradhapura District Secretariat.

#### **Distribution in Anuradhapura**

IOM arranged the transportation of the goods from Colombo to Anuradhapura through OVKILO International (Pvt) Ltd. Six lorries (five 14.5 ft lorries and one 20 ft lorry) were used for the transportation

and distribution of items. All six lorries, accompanied by IOM vehicles, departed Colombo one day prior to the scheduled distribution event.

IOM in collaboration with the Anuradhapura district secretariat and SAFE Foundation organized the handover of food and non-food items on 24 August 2020 to the beneficiaries and shelters covering all 22 divisions in Anuradhapura. Held at the Anuradhapura District Secretariat, the event was attended by dignitaries H.E Mr. David Holly - Australian High Commissioner to Sri Lanka, Mr. Sarat Dash - IOM Chief of Mission to Sri Lanka and the Maldives, Ms. Hanaa Singer - UN Resident Coordinator in Sri Lanka and Mr. R.M. Wanninayaka - District Secretary of Anuradhapura.

The event was attended by approximately 80 participants comprising of beneficiaries, journalists, divisional secretaries, district secretariat officials, IOM and SAFE Foundation staff.

Following the symbolic handover of items by dignitaries to selected beneficiaries at the district secretariat premises, lorries carrying the goods and items departed to identified divisional secretariat premises and distribution points to distribute goods to the rest of the beneficiaries. All beneficiaries were requested in advance to be present at the identified divisional secretariats to receive their relief aid. IOM and SAFE Foundation officers were present at each of these distribution points with relevant divisional secretariat officials. Signatures were collected from the beneficiaries to confirm and acknowledge the receipt of goods

## Qualitative assessment:

The project was highly successful meeting or exceeding the project targets as outlined in the results framework in spite of the difficult environment due to COVID-19 restrictions.

IOM together with the Anuradhapura District Secretariat and SAFE Foundation distributed additional relief packages to 15 low income and 15 vulnerable migrant returnee families on 12 November 2020 with remaining funds making a cumulative total of 115 low-income households and 115 vulnerable migrant returnee families assisted through the project.

Since most of the items were purchased by IOM from different suppliers in Colombo, IOM had to hire a warehouse facility to store food and NFI items for a few days, since the food and hygiene kits required safe storage until these were transported to Anuradhapura district. Subsequent to the purchase of all the above items in bulk, storage, packing other value additions and transport to Anuradhapura were done in coordination with the service provider OVIKLO International (Pvt) Ltd which is an international logistics and supply chain solution company possessing the global food storage safety certification and ISO 9001:2015 Certification Achievement for the provision of logistic services such as warehouse storage. IOM project staff were present to provide necessary instructions and for monitoring and inspections when

packing and loading of goods took place at the warehouse. Infection prevention control mechanisms and other safety and hygiene practices were followed during the entire process.

All the food packages and different types of hygiene kits were packed and loaded to the trucks under the supervision of IOM staff to ensure compliance with hygiene measures. The packers and the truck drivers were instructed to follow safety precautions to avoid COVID-19 transmission. Disposable hand gloves, face masks and hand sanitizers were provided to all the labourers and the truck drivers. IOM staff were present during all the stages of logistics of this project.

All the boxes were printed in white with the logos and visibility of the donor (Government of Australia), Government of Sri Lanka, IOM and SAFE Foundation. The IOM officers monitored the entire process throughout the process of unloading of food and NFI items by the suppliers to the warehouse to packaging, labelling and sealing to ensure quality delivery.

### Partner participation

On 12 August 2020, IOM facilitated the project introductory meeting with the participation of the district secretary of Anuradhapura and 21 local government officers (Women–7, Men-14) attached to district and divisional secretariats in Anuradhapura. These field level officers represented diverse areas including foreign employment, child protection, women's development and social welfare. IOM, SAFE Foundation and the district secretary explained the mechanism for the delivery of assistance under this project. IOM further highlighted the contribution made by the Government of Australia to assist the vulnerable families and shelters in Anuradhapura.

#### **Beneficiary selection**

IOM collaborated with its ground level partner, the SAFE Foundation (SF), a local NGO based in Anuradhapura district with experience delivering humanitarian assistance to communities. Several consultative meetings and discussions were held between the Anuradhapura District Secretariat (DS), IOM and SF to develop a vulnerability criterion to select the beneficiaries and plan delivery of assistance to the 22 divisions of Anuradhapura district. (See figure 1.)

Forms to collect beneficiary data (low-income households, vulnerable migrant returnee families and shelters) were developed by IOM in coordination with the DS and SAFE Foundation. Data collection was conducted adhering to IOM's data protection policy and with the informed consent of the beneficiaries.

The Anuradhapura District Secretary, through official correspondence, notified the divisional secretaries of all 22 divisions of Anuradhapura to identify and nominate the most vulnerable low-income families and vulnerable migrant returnees who returned to Sri Lanka after January 2020. The data collection included the head of household's name, address, contact number, number of family members (gender desegregated), number of children below the age of 18, main source of income/ employment details, and monthly income. For migrant returnees, additionally, the last country of employment and passport details were requested.

The divisional secretaries (DS) tasked field level government officers attached to DS offices to assess the family background and income levels of the families in each division and to carry out the necessary verification checks

*Selection of vulnerable low-income households:* Primarily, the Grama Niladharis (GN/Village administrative officers/heads) deal with grassroot level communities on a regular basis regarding their administrative matters. GNs coordinated the selection of low-income families and carried out the verification checks. Personal details such as name, age, address, national identity card number, contact details, present occupation, monthly income and number of family members were obtained by the GNs from

the head of the household of the low-income families. The GNs identified 115 low- income vulnerable families representing all 22 divisions.

*Selection of vulnerable migrant returnee families:* Concurrently, the Foreign Employment Development Officers (FEDOs) based at each divisional secretariat obtained the details of vulnerable families with migrant returnees (returned to Sri Lanka after January 2020). Each returnee's country of destination, passport number, returned date, number of family members, current source of income was obtained and verified by the FEDOs. 115 vulnerable migrant returnee families representing all 22 divisions were identified by FEDOs.

Following the completion of verification checks by the said officers, lists of nominated and recommended beneficiaries were submitted to each of the 22 divisional secretaries. Upon careful review by the divisional secretaries, endorsed lists were sent to the district secretariat.

At the district secretariat, these lists were further reviewed and vetted by a committee comprising of Foreign Employment Development Officers Coordinator, Administrative Grama Niladhari, Additional district secretary based at the Anuradhapura district Secretariat. The lists were thoroughly checked against the vulnerability/selection criteria. IOM and SAFE Foundation closely monitored the selection process.

*Selection of shelters:* Eight shelters impacted due to COVID-19 were identified by the district secretariat (with support from *inter alia* women development officers, child protection officers, social welfare officers etc. based at district secretariat) in collaboration with IOM and SAFE Foundation. These shelters accommodated victims of SGBV, expectant mothers, orphans, differently abled persons and elders. SAFE Foundation made visits to all eight shelters to assess the eligibility to receive assistance.

Upon receiving the vetted final lists of beneficiaries from all 22 divisions and shelters and with the recommendation made by the above district secretariat committee, the beneficiary lists were reviewed and endorsed by the district secretary. The endorsed lists were officially shared with IOM.

Throughout the beneficiary identification process, IOM and its implementing partner SAFE Foundation closely monitored the selection process. Random verification checks were conducted to ensure that that the assistance is delivered to the most vulnerable segments of the community and to avoid possible duplication of assistance under any ongoing government assistance programme.

IOM selected a random sample of beneficiaries from the lists provided and visited 16 beneficiary families (eight low-income households and eight vulnerable migrant returnee families) on 11 August 2020 to monitor and verify the selection. This step contributed to transparency and accountability in the beneficiary selection. IOM was joined by SAFE Foundation, FEDO Coordinator, FEDO-Thirappane division.

Equal participation of men and women was ensured throughout project implementation. From planning stages to receipt of food and non-food item assistance. Special consideration was given to incorporate gender-based needs for women, men and children. Hygiene kits were specially designed to meet the requirements of women and children including the victims of SGBV. When assisting the eight shelters different groups were selected for assistance such as SGBV victims, orphans, elders. Baby kits and hygiene items were provided to expectant mothers at the shelter for SGBV victims.

### iii) Evaluation, Best Practices and Lessons Learned

No project evaluation was budgeted or requested for this short project.

The humanitarian assistance was successfully delivered to targeted beneficiaries despite the following challenges encountered during the project period:

Obtaining government approvals for project activities is typically a lengthy process. This was made even more challenging due to the parliamentary elections which took place on 5 August 2020 as most government officials were involved in election related duties. However, IOM was able to successfully garner the support of the district secretary and additional district secretary through discussions and by highlighting the importance of this emergency humanitarian assistance. The said officers promptly issued instructions to field level local government officials to expedite beneficiary data collection and identification. The officers at the Anuradhapura District Secretariat played a key role in the successful and timely delivery of assistance to the beneficiaries.

IOM has continued to make field visits to Anuradhapura district during the COVID-19 health crisis to monitor beneficiary selection and attend essential meetings and consultations. Some locations in Anuradhapura were declared as isolated areas due to COVID-19. However, with necessary safety precautions, government approvals and in coordination with SAFE Foundation and the Anuradhapura district secretariat, IOM was able to promptly implement the project within the project period.

This emergency assistance project was implemented during COVID-19 risks and challenges. Procuring items / services during lock down periods and organizing field visits to Anuradhapura district was challenging and took a considerable amount of time. However, owing to prior planning and close coordination and linkages with the relevant senior local government officers. IOM was able to successfully deliver assistance within the project period.

#### iv) A Specific Story (Optional)

# A helping hand in trying times

Mrs. Sujatha Kumari Anuradh is from Anuradhapura district. She is a mother of four children and found herself destitute. Her husband is physically disabled and in their desperation, he pushed her to extremes to find an income to survive. Two of her children were ordained as monks and placed in a temple and she was left with responsibility to care for her other two children and husband without any means of income. Their half-built house, limited living space and a meager income through daily wage work, put Sujatha and her family in dire straits. Therefore, she decided to go in search of greener pastures abroad and decided to work as a domestic aide in Saudi Arabia. Sujatha left Sri Lanka in May 2019 and worked for nine months abroad. During her foreign employment she had to switch between three households and had to toil day and night to complete her daily tasks. She suffered continuous physical and mental abuse in the houses she worked and sought the help of Saudi police to escape from her abusive employers. She was handed over to the Sri Lanka safe house in Saudi Arabia and was returned to Sri Lanka.

As a returnee mother with no savings and a job she had to face the economic difficulties during the COVID-

19 pandemic. She struggled to make ends meet. During the pandemic, Sujatha was informed of the IOM food ration assistance supported by the Government of Australia, through her local government officers attached to Medavachchiya Division. Through a vulnerability assessment conducted by the government officials in Anuradhapura and verified by SAFE Foundation, a local NGO and a grassroots level partner organization of IOM, Sujatha was deemed eligible to receive assistance through the project. IOM and SAFE Foundation delivered and monitored the distribution of items to beneficiaries.

#### With profuse gratitude Sujatha expressed the below:

"I went abroad with lots of hope and dreams to work there for two years. I couldn't send a penny to my family though I worked abroad and had to endure physical and mental abuse. I couldn't find any work after my return due to pandemic. My neighbors and relatives helped in ways they could, but it didn't keep the fire burning so long in my house. Through the Divisional Secretariat my family was selected to benefit from the food assistance supported by Australia. We consumed the dry food with thrift and the food pack lasted for three months in my household. It was a help which will never be forgotten by my family. It kept hunger away from my poor family for an entire quarter of last year which was the most difficult period for my family and myself. We pray and wish well to all the organizations who supported my family during these trying times of the pandemic."
