The following project preliminary activities were completed: recruitment of a Project Coordinator, partnership with Talking Drum Studio (TDS) Guinea and Sierra Leone, official launch of the project in both countries, set up of the technical and steering committees and conduct of project's baseline. Under outcome 1, TDS Guinea and Sierra Leone conducted a conflict analysis of the communities targeted with livelihood support. Under outcome 2, WFP Sierra Leone formalized partnership with Ministry of Agriculture (MOA) to implement resilience building activities. 10 communities were targeted to develop irrigation systems (70% completed) in Inland Valley Swamps (IVS). Participants received agricultural working tools, trainings on improved agronomic practices and 20 days cash-based transfer (\$ 29,058 in total). 20 lead farmers and 20 community youth contractors(CYCs) were trained in improved agronomic practices. WFP Guinea partnered with two local CSOs to facilitate community participatory planning activities, resulting in 6 communities identified to implement resilience building activities. Under outcome 3, IOM Guinea and Sierra Leone conducted a comprehensive border and migration assessment to capture strategic transhumance related data and evaluate the capacity of border infrastructure. In both countries, a civil engineer company was contracted for the construction and rehabilitation of border posts. In Guinea, 60% of construction work is completed while Sierra Leone is at 20%.

FAO Sierra Leone is currently providing technical and financial support to the Ministry of Agriculture to review and validate the Cattle Settlement Policy, with regular engagements implementing partners. In April, WFP, TDS and representatives of Falaba district (decentralized government and customary leaders) participated in a district level (Koinadugu) workshop on the identification of conflict hotspots. The results of the workshop will be incorporated in the review of the Cattle Settlement Policy at the regional and national level. In Guinea, discussions have been initiated with the Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock, who explained that the Pastoral Code was revised during a previous World Bank project in 2018 but never promulgated by the government. The Minister expressed his interest and commitment to reviving the promulgation process of the code. TDS will focus its media activities on the communication around this code to generate public interest. TDS Sierra Leone will adopt the same strategy hoping that this will create a dynamic for the different stakeholders to act promptly.

TDS (Sierra Leone and Guinea) deemed it appropriate to conduct a conflict analysis ("conflict scan") to best orientate their intervention. This analysis took place in May 2022 in communities in Faranah and Falaba targeted through outcome 2. This rapid and periodic analysis captures key peace and conflict determinants, dynamics and actors in a given geographical area. The conflict scan in Sierra Leone noted the following findings:

• The age-old invasion of cattle on farmlands and the destruction of fences by roaming cattle. Boundary/land disputes between Dembeleya Sinkunia and Kabeleya Chiefdoms.

- Lack of physical demarcation that separates Guinea from Sierra Leone especially along border communities.
- Alleged land grabbing by rich stakeholders with political influence
- Alleged political tension between the All People's Congress (APC) and Sierra Leone People's Party (SLPP) supporters is latent in all the communities which could spark up during elections
- Alleged bias mediation of causes related to cattle destruction of farmlands by local chiefs

• Limited farmland for Koidukura being encircled by Gberia Fatombu, Kalhereh, and Gberia Timbakor in Sierra Leone and Helmakono in Guinea. Hence Koindukura are considered strangers in what they claim is their own land.

TDS Guinea and Sierra Leone are also finalising plans to produce a radio jingle for broadcasting on either side of the border. Scripts have been produced while partnerships with the local radio stations were formalized.

TDS Guinea and Sierra Leone are and will continue to be attentive to gender and youth dynamics. Women and youth participation in the conflict scan stressed their lack of representation in conflict management mechanisms, often citing that they do not have the right to speak because of social constraints and stereotypes. In Guinea for instance, no female leader has received training on conflict management and mediation. In the following months, TDS will dedicate its efforts in better equipping women and youth to play a role in conflict prevention and management in their communities. This will be done through training and community engagement.

Outcome 2:
Trust and economic collaboration strengthened within and between Falaba district and Faranah prefecture through climate smart livelihoods and herder and farmers cooperation

During the reporting period, participatory community planning activities were carried out in 15 villages in the sub-prefectures of Heremakonon, Songoyah and Banian (bordering Sierra Leone). This assessment culminated in the formulation of specific action plan for each village based on their main economic potentialities and priority needs. Six (6) communities were selected to develop irrigation systems in unused Inland Valley Swamps (IVS) to enable year-round cultivation with rice and vegetables. Through these processes, 1,658 project were identified, including 120 breeders, 50 ha of lowlands suitable for development assessed and 2 ha of degraded areas identified to be reforested as part of WFP Guinea's livelihood activities. In partnership with the Ministry of Agriculture and community leaders, WFP Sierra Leone identified, assessed and validated 10 viable and perennial IVS totalling 50.1ha. Through developing irrigation systems in these unutilized but high potential lands and cultivating them with improved agricultural, this support will enhance long-term food security and increase incomes through linking farmers to market. 501 working participants (49% female & 51% male) were through a participatory and community-led process, prioritizing the selection of "high risk" youth and women involved in the ongoing conflict. These participants will develop the 50.1 hectares of IVS. After successfully preparing agricultural land and developing one-third of the irrigation systems, each participant received 20 days cash-based transfers \$58 per person (\$29.058 in total), serving to economically boost households and strengthen local markets during a time of economic downturn.10 CYCs and 20 lead farmers (10 female/10 male) received 5-days technical training on irrigation system development and maintenance, in addition to 3-days training in the Technical Package in Rice Production. Agricultural working tools were pr

From a total of 501 work participants in IVS development activities, 49% are young female participants. This creates more equity women and youth to be gainfully employed in agricultural activities, including tasks that are not usually undertaken by women, transforming perceptions and enhancing livelihood. Youths at higher risk were identified and selected to participate in asset creation activities, giving them an opportunity to build their knowledge and skills of improved agronomic practices. WFP Sierra Leone adopted its community youth contractor scheme, an initiative targeting energetic youths selected by their communities to be trained to technically oversee livelihood activities in their communities and serve as knowledge transfer channels. This approach increases community ownership and paves the way for long-term sustainability.

Assessments have been almost completed under this outcome, however data analysis related to transhumance flow counting is not yet finalized. IOM-Sierra Leone conducted an assessment entailing participatory transhumance mapping across seven cross border chiefdoms in Falaba district bordering with Faranah, in Guinea. Through this mapping more than forty (40) transhumance crossing points were identified, marking the first time that such comprehensive data has been documented in Falaba and Sierra Leone in general. A comprehensive map on transhumance corridors showing movement patterns has been developed and is currently undergoing final review. IOM Sierra Leone team selected, trained and deployed twenty-eight (28) enumerators to collect data focusing on transhumance (flow monitoring) movement patterns between Sierra Leone and Guinea (project location areas). IOM Guinea recruited and trained 10 enumerators on Transhumance Tracking Tool data collection methodologies, after which they were deployed in the field for a period of 40 days. Around 9,665 animals in total were observed at the counting point of the sub-prefectures of Songoyah, Heremankon and Sandenia in Guinea. 15 community agents were trained on alert tools and deployed in the field in the three sub-prefectures. Once the data collection exercise is finalised, the data will be analysed for early warning and shared, providing an important empirical tool that can be used to design responsive policies to mitigate conflict between crop farmers and cattle herders and to enhance border management. A comprehensive need assessment was conducted by IOM Sierra Leone in collaboration with the government of Sierra Leone at the project onset, targeting major crossing points in Falaba district. Through the assessment key points of entry were identified for construction or rehabilitation based on needs . A border post will be constructed in Koindukura (Sulima chiefdom) while the sites of Walia and Gbentu were selected for rehabilitation activities. IOM Guinea also conducted a needs assessment in collaboration with the Guinean government targeting two sub-prefectures, Songoya and Heremakono in Faranah. During the assessment, two points of entry were identified for construction. A civil engineer was recruited to assess technical needs and supervise construction works. In both countries, construction companies were contracted through a competitive bidding process. In Guinea, overall construction works is 60% completed and expected to be finalized before the end of June 2022 while Sierra Leone, is at 20% of work completion. Bilateral consultation activities will be implemented at a later stage of the intervention while data collection activities will guide strategic discussions in the next reporting period. A road map will be developed to consider local needs, challenges and opportunities linked to peaceful management of transhumance.

IOM Sierra Leone and Guinea seek to mainstream gender sensitivity and equality across all programming steps. Indeed, the construction plan for the border posts in Koindukura, Heremakono and Songoya takes into account gender-specific needs, such as designated restrooms for women and men. Women and youth have also been considered during the planning stages of the activities. For instance, during the selection of enumerators and participants in workshops and focus group discussions, specific attention was paid to ensure balanced representation. Saio Mansaray is from Lensenia village, one of the PBF cross-border project communities in Falaba District, Mongo Chiefdom. Saio is a widow with 5 children that are alive and another three that have passed. Saio Mansaray is one of the farmers that offered their IVS to the Lensenia FBO for the implementation of the PBF cross-border project. She has been actively involved in the project since its inception in February 2022. Faced with the challenge of cattle destroying their farms every season with little to no justice being done, Saio and other participants are very excited about the IVS work especially with the possibility of working three times in the year. WFP completed its first CBT in Lensenia, when asked how the cash impacted her livelihood she said, "I used half of the money to buy groundnut seed and the other half am going to pay for additional labour so I can make a much bigger farm this year." The IVS that she leased to the FBO has been fully developed and after fencing, it will be an invaluable asset for Saio and her children.
