**The project ended in May 2022 with residual activities being completed while the new Secretariat project is finalized/ approved during quarter 3 of 2022. The new PBF Coordinator started in February 2022 after this post had been vacant for over one year. Because of this, the COVID-19 pandemic, ongoing insecurity and a challenging electoral cycle, the preparation of the Strategic Results Framework for the PBF was delayed and will be finalized in quarter 3 of 2022. The above challenges also made it difficult to collaborate with Government counterparts since many of them were pre-occupied with the electoral process. The peaceful handover of power from former President Mohamed Abdullahi Mohamed "Farmajo" to President Sheikh Mohamud on 23rd May 2022 offers new opportunities for peacebuilding engagement.**

**The ongoing secondment by the Netherlands of a Conflict Analysis and Peacebuilding Officer supported efforts to ensure PBF programming is informed by conflict analysis. Capacity development and knowledge sharing on conflict sensitivity for staff of PBF recipients was kick-started in partnership with the UN Staff College and an informal peacebuilding group initiated, aiming at providing a space for strategic reflection on peacebuilding and exploring synergies between the PBF-funded interventions and the Good Offices of the SRSO. The secondment by Sweden of a Youth, Peace and Security Officer also supported the mainstreaming of youth, peace and security across the PBF portfolio.**

**Since 2018, when this PBF Secretariat project started, 17 projects were approved over a total amount of USD 40,984,750. As an additional overall result of this project, the SG approved a 5-year eligibility renewal for Somalia in July 2020, focusing on national reconciliation, rule of law, democratic governance, security sector reform with strong overall emphasis on Women, Peace and Security. This was the result of virtual consultations reaching approximately 400 people in the general public and more than 70 key stakeholders from government, civil society and the international community.**

**11 implementing agencies (FAO, IOM, UNDP, UNICEF, UNHCR, UNFPA, UNHABITAT, UNOPS, UNICEF, UN Women, UNSOM) and 3 CSOs (Life and Peace Institute, Saferworld, International Rescue Committee) were or are recipients of PBF funds, supported by this project. Since funding its first project in 2009, the PBF has steadily increased its investments in the country. As of June 2022, the PBF had approved USD 70.1 million in Somalia.**

**New PBF interventions approved in 2022 focus on reintegration of youth defectors from Al Shabaab, participation of women and young people in local political and peacebuilding processes.**

Preparations have begun to develop a Strategic Results Framework (SRF) to guide PBF's engagement in Somalia. In line with the UN Cooperation Framework, the SRF will formulate four portfolio-level strategic outcomes related to the priority areas identified in the eligibility process: national reconciliation; rule of law and transitional justice; democratic governance; and security sector reform and in. With the new Government coming in after the conclusion of contested elections, the development of the SRF offers new opportunities for peacebuilding engagement with Government and civil society as well as for strategic engagement between the UN and IFIs to advance joint priorities with the new government.

Working with the climate security-, youth- and gender teams of the Integrated Office of the DSRSG/RC/HC for Somalia, the PBF Secretariat is exploring measures to integrate climate security as well as age- and gender sensitivity considerations into conflict analysis, the development of the SRF, related baseline study and the development of PBF-funded interventions.

The PBF Secretariat facilitated the UNCT's engagement in PBF's 2022 Gender and Youth Promotion Initiative. Four projects were selected following a competitive process involving the UN Country Team Somalia and the United Nations Assistance Mission in Somalia (UNSOM): 1) Enhancing social cohesion between displaced populations and their host communities; 2) Addressing and preventing SGBV by security actors; 3) Promoting youth participation in parliamentary processes and constitutional review; 4) Promoting youth political participation in 2024 local elections in Hirshabelle.

The PBF Secretariat developed a close collaboration with the Somalia Joint Fund (SJF) under the Integrated Office in order to explore synergies between both funds. An example for this collaboration is the Women, Peace and Protection Programme that has attracted additional funds from Sweden and Germany that are being channeled through the SJF, using the same reporting requirements and allowing the upscaling of catalytic PBF funding. The PBF Secretariat supported the development and approval process of the "Somalia Women and Youth Peace Project" to be implemented by International Rescue Committee for \$1.5 million over 18 months, which brings the active PBF portfolio in Somalia to \$20 million.

The PBF Secretariat supported the preparation of a meeting of the Group of Friends of the Peacebuilding Fund in February 2022. During this meeting James Swan, Special Representative of the Secretary-General and Head of the United Nations Assistance Mission in Somalia shared reflections on the role of the Fund in Somalia in supporting national peacebuilding priorities, leveraging the UN's collective capacities, and fostering UN integration.

Following the approval by the Secretary-General of a new five-year eligibility period for the PBF in Somalia in July 2021, the PBF Secretariat is currently in the process of facilitating a process of developing a Strategic Results Framework (SRF) to improve the UN's ability to address the protracted peacebuilding challenges in Somalia. Of particular importance is the PBF's intent to focus on women, peace and security as defined in Security Council Resolution 1325 as a cross-cutting priority across the SRF. The protracted electoral process, and the obstacles facing women's participation in politics and peacebuilding, is a reminder of why more investment is needed in this area. Through the PBF Secretariat's facilitation of the development of the Women, Peace and Protection (WPP) Programme, approved in November 2021 and started up by UNDP and UN Women in partnership with UNSOM during the first half of 2022, the PBF is investing five million USD to promote women's meaningful participation in peacebuilding processes, at the grassroots and in leadership roles, by engaging, empowering, and capacitating women through legislative provisions, policy interventions, and strengthening and establishing infrastructures for peace at all levels of society. WPP will be an important channel to help increase political participation of women after the failure to reach gender quotas in the last electoral cycle.
