1. Background

Nigeria has reported several cases of H5NI in poultry and confirmed the first human case due to H5N1 in February 2007. Avian Influenza can be spread not only by migratory birds but also by uncontrolled trade of poultry and movement of populations other than displaced, including religious pilgrimage.

Nigeria borders Benin, Niger, Chad and Cameroon and the borders are very fluid. Nigeria has 36 states and a Federal Capital Territory (FCT) there is constant mobility of persons across the country. Concerns have been raised over the risk of spread of the disease across the country, and into countries in West, Central, Eastern and Southern Africa.

On 18 September 2007, IOM in collaboration with the Nigeria National Taskforce, and funded by government of Japan, hosted an orientation workshop to mainstream the needs of migrants into the national avian and pandemic influenza response. UN partners and other agency representatives such as UNICEF, the World Bank and representatives from the Ministries of Health, Agriculture, Communication and representatives of the National Poultry Association were present at this meeting.

During this meeting it was identified that IOM should take the lead on migration-related issues, work in collaboration with the appropriate national sector and use the existing structures and institutions already in place.

In 2007 IOM Nigeria engaged with poultry traders and transporters who move birds across state borders on a regular basis. A survey conducted in collaboration with the National Taskforce Communication Sector revealed that this mobile population of poultry workers, traders and transporter, had very little knowledge about avian influenza prevention and control and pandemic preparedness.

IOM, in collaboration with the Nigerian national avian influenza task force, UNICEF and other UN partners proposed to conduct social mobilization activities in four states that have experienced avian influenza outbreaks among poultry.

2. Purpose of Proposed Programme/Project

The overall objective of this project is to address objective 5 of the Consolidated Action Plan by responding to meet the pandemic preparedness needs of migrant

Specific objectives are:

- 1. To conduct an avian influenza and pandemic preparedness Knowledge, Attitudes, Practices, Beliefs, (KAPB) survey among migrant poultry workers, traders and transporters;
- 2. To map and identify migratory routes of this target population;
- 3. To implement avian influenza and pandemic preparedness social mobilization activities among poultry workers, traders, and transporters at the state level in Nigeria; and
- 4. To evaluate the impact of the social mobilization activities.



Appendix B

THE LOGICAL FRAMEWORK

A. Background

- 1. IOM is committed to the principle that humane and orderly migration benefits migrants and society. As an intergovernmental body, IOM acts with its partners in the international community to; assist in meeting the operational challenges of migration, advance understanding of migration issues, encourage social and economic development through migration, and work towards effective respect of the human dignity and well-being of migrants
- 2. This project aim to strengthen the capacity of targeted migrant poultry workers, traders and transporters through the implementation of activities that provide avian influenza and pandemic preparedness information for behaviour change.
- 3. The selected geographical area is Nigeria as several cases of H5N1 have been reported in poultry and one human death due to H5N1. Nigeria has 37 states and there is constant mobility of persons across the country. Influenza can be spread not only by migratory birds but also by uncontrolled trade of poultry and movement of populations other than displaced, including religious pilgrimage. Concerns have been raised over the risk of spread of the disease across the country, the sub-region and into countries in West, Central, Eastern and Southern Africa. It is important to increase the awareness for the control of avian influenza and pandemic preparedness in Nigeria.
- 4. In collaboration with the Nigerian National Avian Influenza Task Force, UNICEF and other stakeholders, IOM Nigeria implemented a social mobilization project among migrant poultry traders and transporters in the Federal Capital Territory Abuja Nigeria in 2007. This new project will be a follow up to implement social mobilization activities at the state level. Activities to be implemented in four states possibly Lagos, Anambra, Borno and Kano. The selected four states will be confirmed after interactions with stakeholders at the national and state levels.
- 5. IOM has not been able to get funding for this project from other sources and is thus presenting this proposal to the CFIA.

Programme/project approach

- 1. Inline with the Consolidated Action Plan, IOM works in collaboration with the national Government to develop and implement behaviour change strategies for migrants and mobile populations.
- 2. By implementing this project the National Taskforce and UNCT in Nigeria will have information on avian influenza and pandemic preparedness KAPB among migrant poultry workers, traders and transporters. This information will be useful for further development of national community mobilization and capacity building for pandemic preparedness.
- This project will also provide information on the mapping of these mobile populations' migratory patterns. This information will be useful to plan for pandemic preparedness.

Problems to address

IOM has a history of working with UN and other humanitarian agencies during crisis situations.
During the pandemic there will be limited/no movement and many migrants/mobile populations will
be in locations other than their normal places of abode and will need humanitarian assistance.
Strategies to communicate with these populations during a pandemic need to be identified.
Information is needed to plan for the needs of migrants during a pandemic or any other crisis. This
project will provide information on migratory patterns, migrants needs and communication
strategies.

Proposed approach

- 1. Proposed activities, work plans and timelines to achieve the set objectives will be finalized in collaboration with the communication sector and UNICEF Nigeria.
- 2. The KAPB survey and migratory route mapping will utilize improved versions of the instruments developed and used to collect data among migrants in the FTC, Abuja. Qualitative and quantitative data will be collected.
- 3. Social mobilization activities tested during activities in 2007 will be improved upon from lessons learnt.
- 4. A consultant will be used to evaluate the impact of the social mobilization interventions.

Anticipated needs

- 1. Existing information on poultry workers, traders and transporter activity.
- 2. Collaboration of the leaders of these mobile groups.
- 3. Information and collaboration at the state level.
- 4. IOM will work within the existing frameworks of the communication sector at the sate level.
- 5. Constant liaison throughout the project will be maintained with UNSIC, PICs and other agencies participating in the UN Consolidated Action Plan.

Outputs

Nigerian government communication and behaviour change strategy for migrants

Management arrangements

IOM has an in-house project monitoring system. The IOM Chief of Mission in Nigeria with the help of national staff will liaise with national and international stakeholders in Nigeria. The project workplan and time line will be finalized with all stakeholders' inputs.

The IOM avian influenza and pandemic preparedness global coordinator based in Geneva will be in weekly contact with IOM staff in Nigeria and focal points in relevant national and international agencies. Missions to provide technical support and meet with stakeholders will be conducted. Quarterly updates will be requested from the project assistant in IOM Nigeria. These reports will be presented at national meetings.

All activities will be conducted in collaboration with the lead UN agency and the relevant sector of the taskforce.

This project will be evaluated and the impact in the targeted groups assessed.

Analysis of risks and assumptions

Information collected in 2007 during interactions with migrant poultry traders and transporters and their association leaders will be used to guide activities and contribute to successful interactions with similar groups at the state level.

It is assumed that the communication and behaviour change strategy used in Nigeria for the target group of migrants will be appropriate.

It is assumed that the KAPB of the targeted population in the four states that have had outbreaks in poultry will be representative of that population in all affected states in Nigeria.
